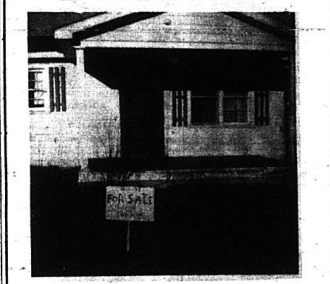



Sustained as far as a need for a water supply is concerned, and the necessary money to buy land and re-locate roads expected to be covered by the water. About the only hitch that could stand in the way of such an engineering firm finds the valley would not hold water because of caves and crevices.  
A report from the engineering firm is expected any day.  
Should the firm stamp its approval on the Renfro project, a public hearing would be allowed to check the State Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, at which time the city would be asked if it would like the department to proceed with engineering a dam across the creek.  
Adults are asked to sign the petition approving the dam as soon as the petitions have been circulated.

### FEDERAL GRANT FOR PLANNING

The Kentucky Department of Commerce has applied for \$49,312 in federal funds to assist the planning programs of 54 cities and ten counties, including Mt. Vernon.

fee directly. The fee will be taken out of the \$25 sewer connection fee already established. The council members want to increase the sewer connection fee.  
But all residences connected after the end of the sewer construction period will have to pay the fee directly to the State Health Department, which will all future new residences.  
It was the council's opinion that most residents building new homes probably would want the inspection in order to make sure the plumber was doing good work, and using proper materials.  
The code will be adopted by ordinance. A fine will be imposed on home owners failing to comply.  
Work on the council's agenda will probably be acceptance of the State Electrical Code, and in the future, a zoning code.

### Crops Need Water For Good Yields

Farm and garden crops depending on proper amounts of water. A recent rain shower has helped matters.  
Most of this, says Lyle Leonard, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service conservationist, comes from water stored in the soil.  
Amounts needed vary by plant. In respect to corn, a single corn plant uses 35 gallons of water. A tomato plant also uses 35 gallons. Grasses and clovers are heavy users of water, too.  
This must come from the soil, or too much dependence is placed on timely rains, Leonard says. Soils fill with water in winter and spring. Deep soils can store water for later crop use. Shallow soils however, store much less water here, timely rains are critical.

Here are some things to do to help water-storage in soil:  
1. Grow crops on deep soil where possible; save rain fall with contour tillage; plow deeper to break up topsoil and add to loose surface layer of soil; use crop residues and manure as part of soil's organic matter, nature's sponge; fertilize well to stimulate root growth; irrigate if the added yield will pay irrigation costs.

George Corder, Extension Specialist in Soils, will deal with feed production and soil. Mr. E. C. Wills, Extension Specialist in Dairying, will discuss various phases of milk production.

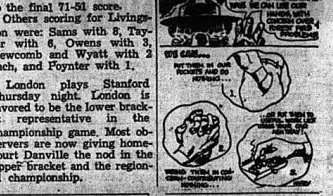

"If the Rockcastle teams are going to be re-districted, I'd rather we go into the Boyle - Garrard district," Coach Parrett said.  
Mt. Vernon Coach Jack Lasswell was also of the same mind, but somewhat more subdued than Coach Parrett.  
I say, let's stay in the same district we're in now. We'll have a much better chance of going to the regional tournament. If Laurel consolidates, Bush and Lilly, then let them bring in McKee or Annville into the Laurel District. Frankly, I don't think our district is too large. As far as I can see, any shift of teams in the 12th Region will benefit only Somerset."  
Coach Riddle said he was not in favor of switching Rockcastle teams to the Laurel District.  
"I simply don't think it solves the problem of team equalization, which is what the KHAAs is trying to do. Why create a seven-team district out of Laurel and let a six-team district for the 46th? It doesn't make sense when the time is approaching when districts will be four teams each."

Vernon, Livingston, Brodhead, and Crab Orchard into one district, work out, Lincoln, Garrard, Boyle and Caducaud and manure as part of soil's organic matter, nature's sponge; fertilize well to stimulate root growth; irrigate if the added yield will pay irrigation costs.

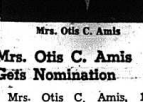
