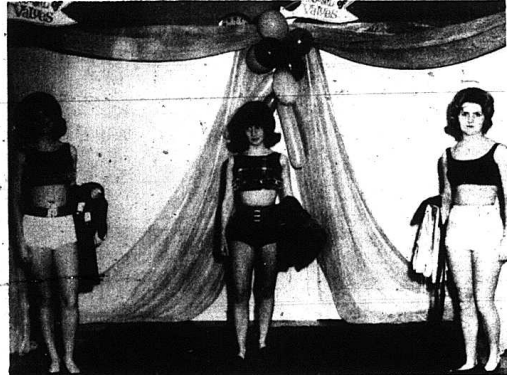

We wonder if the town board really has the interest of its water customers at heart in sponsoring the huge Renfro Lake at a price of untold thousands of dollars. Is it the need for more water for a desire for a pleasure lake that is uppermost in their minds?

Is it fair to dispossess us of our farms and homes, and to take away a means of livelihood for such a reason?

If an additional source of water must be had by the water-works, it seems to us that the Town-Branch would be the ideal setup. It was the first lake proposed and surveyed by the state department. It would have an area of about 67 acres and would be fed by a number of all-weather springs and streams.

The water source of supply would be about the same as for the Renfro Lake - even more dependable in a dry season. The present reservoir is already drawing from the Renfro Water Shed.

The few property owners affected by the Town-Branch Lake express a willingness to sell at a reasonable price. The total cost of this lake would be only a very small fraction of the cost of the big one.

Mar. 26 Feed-Grain Sign-up Deadline

Friday, March 26, is the last day farmers may file applications to take part in the 1965 feed grain program. Shelley Mullins, chairman of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today.

He reminded farmers that only those who participate in the feed grain program will be eligible for price support and their 1965 barley and grain sorghum crops. Last year, the support is made available through loans and price-support payments. Besides qualifying for price support, the participating farmer also earns a diversion payment for shifting part of his feed grain base to a conserving use. Minimum diversion is 20 percent of the individual farm's total feed grain base. Maximum diversion is 50 percent of the base or 25 acres if this is more. For diverting more than the minimum, the diversion payment will be figured at a higher rate. If the actual diversion is 40 percent or more, the higher rate applies to the entire diversion.

The chairman reports that farmer interest in Rockcastle County is higher than in past years. Indications are that 1965 participants will run well ahead of that under the 1964 feed grain program.

He urges farmers who are interested in taking part in this year's program to call at their ASCS County Office as soon as possible, since there are only seven working days left of the estimated 26 sign-up deadline and signing up is the first step in program participation.

"We don't want anybody to be disappointed because we waited too long," the chairman said. "There's also the advantage of being able to get a higher diversion payment in advance at the time of sign-up or as soon afterwards as possible."

The ASCS office is open from 8:00 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. from Monday through Friday.
