

**BOND ORDINANCE**

or Trust Company as payee bank, depository, alternate paying agent and - or bond registrar and may enact any other ordinance for any other purpose not inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance, and which shall not impede the security of the same, for the purpose of curing any ambiguity, or of curing, correcting or supplementing any defective or inconsistent provisions contained herein or in any other ordinance or ordinance pertaining hereto.

**SECTION 24. BONDSHOLDERS' REMEDIES.**  
That any holder of said bonds, or of any of the coupons, may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus, or other proceedings, enforce and compel performance by said City and its officers and agents of all duties imposed or required by law, or by this Ordinance in connection with the operation of said project, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates, the segregation of the income and revenues and the application thereof in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

If there be default in the payment of the principal or interest on any of said bonds, then, upon the filing of suit by any holder of said bonds or coupons, any court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a Receiver to administer said project on behalf of said City, with power to charge and collect rates and charges for the services and facilities provided by said project sufficient to provide for the payment of the bonds and obligations outstanding, and the interest thereon, and the expenses of operation and maintenance, and to apply the income and revenues in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance, and of the applicable statutes of Kentucky, and to take such other action as may be appropriate for the protection of any such holder, within the applicable legal provisions.

A default shall automatically be deemed to exist within the meaning of the foregoing whenever any principal or interest payment required to be made by this Ordinance remains unpaid for more than thirty (30) days. If and when there is over an insufficient amount to pay principal and interest when due, any amounts available shall be used first and applied in pro rata payment of all interest due, with past due interest having first priority, and the balance shall be applied in payment of outstanding bonds, provided that no holder shall be compelled to accept payment at any time of less than the full amount of any individual bond, and that the amount of any defaulted bond and any other defaulted coupon shall continue to bear interest after maturity until the necessary funds are made available for the payment thereof, at the legal rate of six percent (6%) per annum.

**SECTION 25. ORDINANCE REQUIRING CONNECTIONS IS CONTRACTUAL.**  
It is hereby represented that the City Council of the City has enacted an Ordinance requiring that all sources of flowable sewage be connected to the municipal sewer system if and when connection is available, or as soon as the same may be made available, declaring that all unconnected sources of flowable sewage, where sewers are or may hereafter be made available, shall constitute a public nuisance, and that the making and establishing, penalties and effective dates; and it is hereby covenanted that no changes which may adversely affect the rights of bondholders shall be made in the requirements specified in said ordinance so long as any of the bonds authorized or permitted to be issued under the provisions of this Ordinance are outstanding.

**SECTION 26. PROVISIONS IN CONFLICT REPEALED.**  
That all ordinances, resolutions and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith, are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed, and it is hereby specifically ordered and provided that any proceedings heretofore taken for the issuance of other bonds payable or secured in any manner by all or any part of the income and revenues of said public project, or any part thereof, which have not heretofore been issued and delivered, are hereby revoked and rescinded, and none of such other bonds shall be issued and delivered.

**SECTION 27. SIGNATURES OF OFFICERS.**  
If any of the officers whose signatures or facsimile signatures appear on any of the bonds or coupons cease to be such officers before the delivery of the bonds, such signatures shall nevertheless be valid for all purposes the same as if the officers had remained in office until delivery, as provided in KRS 83.0-0 and KRS 83.0-10.

**SECTION 28. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.**  
If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 29. EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE.**  
That this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its adoption, approval and publication as provided by law. Introduced, adopted, approved and ordered published by the City Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, at a meeting held on March 18, 1965.

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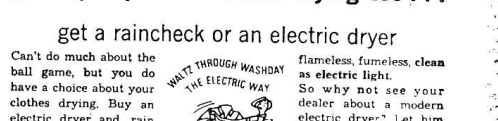

## Fire Damages Motel Here

A fire at the Twin Maples Motel at Mt. Vernon did an estimated \$9,000 in damages early Sunday.

The fire, of undetermined origin, destroyed five units of the motel before firemen brought it under control. Three units were burned completely. Two other units were heavily damaged.

The fire started about 2:30 a. m. in unit 11 occupied earlier by a family from Detroit, Mich. They have not been located. It apparently smoldered for considerable time before burning through the walls. A Chicago couple in an adjoining unit told motel owner, Ed Winstead, they were awakened by a muffled explosion and saw the flames.

Minutes earlier, about 3 a. m., George Pittman saw the fire and turned in the alarm.

No one was injured, although the motel was filled with guests.

Mr. Winstead said he had no idea how the fire started. It could have started from a cigarette or an electric shaver.

When firemen arrived, the units were burning furiously and guests were milling around in night clothes.

The source of the fire was in the central, east section of the motel, and firemen sprayed water on units on either side to halt the spread of the flames.

Mr. Winstead said the units, which are aluminum trailers, were only partially insured. Workers this week began rebuilding the burned out section.

Early Saturday morning a fire in a flue did some damage at the home of Charlie Nicely on Town Hill. The fire department extinguished the fire.

## Name Sam Jones to Develop County Federal Aid Projects

Sam Jones, social science teacher at Mt. Vernon High School, has been appointed program developer for the Rockcastle County Economic Opportunity Council.

Mr. Jones is a native of Rockcastle County the son of Champ and Mary Ann Martin Mullins.

The Appalachian Act has to do with physical

and material development. The Economic Opportunity Act has to do with human development.

Mr. Jones will continue to teach until his appointment has been confirmed.

A watershed project on the Rockcastle River, which includes two dams was shelved as "economically unfeasible" by the Army Corps of Engineers at a seven-county meeting Thursday at Somerset.

Col. James B. Newman, Nashville District Engineer, told the county delegations the Rockcastle River project would be shelved in a "delayed action category" so that the project could be reactivated in the future without Congressional approval.

(An editorial on the dam will be found on Page 5 of this issue)

In explaining the shelving of the Rockcastle survey, Col. Newman said that under the Appalachian Act—with its emphasis on water resources might be reclassified as economically feasible.

Newman reported the Rockcastle project came up about 29 per cent short of justifying under the present standards set forth for such projects.

Newman recommended a project if the benefits do not exceed the cost of the construction of the project.

The total project for a dam at the Rockcastle Narrows and another at Parker's Branch above Livingston in Rockcastle County was estimated to have cost about \$62 million.

We have two alternatives with the present program and our recommendation would be to leave the project on the shelf for the time being.

The other alternative would be for the Corps to submit a negative report on the project. This alternative could possibly jeopardize the chance of getting the project reactivated.

He told the group that under Federal services were conducted March 23 at the Red Hill Baptist Church with Bro. J. William Hall officiating.

In determining the cost-benefit ratio of such projects, "This may possibly be a year before these standards are established. Therefore, we recommend that the project be shelved until we can determine the new standards."

The district engineer said the Corps had considered the possibility of other programs to help make the project feasible. These included the Appalachian program, the Economic Opportunity Act and the Area Redevelopment Program.

Newman said Washington program ruled out the inclusion of these programs.

During the meeting Newman said he had discussed the project with Sen. Sherman Cooper who stated he had discussed the project with the Representative Tim Lee Carter and in view of the findings of the Corps, they recommended the project be shelved until the new standards are developed.

At the meeting, Col. Newman said hearings are to be held soon on the Devil's Jump project in McCracken County.

Each year the Corps reviews the estimates of projected in January 1984.

BOND ORDINANCE

This Bond, payment of the principal installments and interest due shall be made at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, Richmond, Virginia, or at such other fiscal agent as the Payee shall designate herein called the "Fiscal Agent." During the term of this Bond, the Registered Owner hereof, said payments shall be made at the Bank of Mt. Vernon, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, or at the option of the City, to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, New York Trust Company, New York City, New York Bank (herein called the "Alternate Paying Agent").

Payments of principal and interest, including prepayments of principal or interest, shall be made to the Payee as noted on the Payment Record made a part of this Bond. Upon final payment of principal and interest, this Bond shall be submitted to the City Clerk of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, for cancellation and surrender to the City.

This Bond, designated as the (a) "City of Mt. Vernon Waterworks and Sewer Improvement Revenue Bond" (hereinafter referred to as the "Bond"), is one of a duly authorized issue of revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$410,000, issued by said City for the purpose of defraying the cost (not otherwise provided) of constructing a new municipal sewer system, consisting of a new sewage treatment plant, outfall lines, lift stations, sewage gathering lines and appurtenant facilities for the City. This Bond and the series of which it is a part were issued pursuant to an Ordinance of the City duly adopted and published according to law hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Ordinance." The nature and extent of the security hereby created, and the rights and limitations of rights of the City in respect to this Bond, and the rights, obligations and duties of said City, said City and its officers, and said waterworks system and said sewer system be combined and consolidated into a single public project and hereby provided for in the Ordinance, and the full contents of which it is a part (are) outstanding, said municipal waterworks and sewer systems shall be operated as a single, combined and consolidated revenue-producing public project and this Bond shall be issued under and in conformity with the Constitution and Statutes of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, including among others, Sections 48.010 to 48.040 inclusive, of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, as amended.

As provided in said Ordinance, this Bond is exchangeable at the sole expense of the City at any time, upon ninety days' notice, at the option of the City, for a new series and upon surrender of this Bond to the City at the office of the Paying Agent in the City of Mt. Vernon, Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for a new series of bonds to be issued to bear, registrable as to principal only, of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each, in an aggregate principal amount equal to and maturing in conformity with the terms and conditions of the original issue of this Bond of such Coupon Bonds as provided in said Ordinance, with semi-annual coupons annexed representing the accrual of interest corresponding to the original issue of this Bond.

In addition to the installments of principal required to be paid by the City, as hereinabove set forth, the City, at its option, shall have the right to prepay, on any interest payment date on and after January 1, 1976, in any amount, in whole or in part, any or all of the principal installments, in the chronological order of the aforesaid installments, the entire principal amount hereof then remaining unpaid, or such portion thereof as the City may determine, at a price in an amount equivalent to the principal amount so called for redemption, plus accrued interest to the date of prepayment, plus a premium in an amount equal to the principal amount of the principal amount of such prepayment, as follows:

- 3% If paid January 1, 1975, through January 1, 1979, inclusive;
- 2-1/4% If paid July 1, 1979, through January 1, 1984, inclusive;
- 2% If paid July 1, 1984, through January 1, 1989, inclusive;
- 1-3/4% If paid July 1, 1989, through January 1, 1994, inclusive; and
- 1% If paid July 1, 1994, through July 1, 1997, inclusive.

Notice of any such optional prepayment shall be given at least thirty days prior to the prepayment date by mailing to the registered owner of the bonds a deposit of money. Notice fixing such prepayment date, the amount of principal and the premium, if any, to be prepaid. Thereupon, the Payee shall present this Bond at the office of the Paying Agent, and the City Clerk shall note on this Bond the amount of principal and premium so prepaid and make a part of this Bond. If notice of prepayment be given as herein provided, and if on the designated prepayment date the amount of principal and premium so prepaid is not received by the office of the Paying Agent in accordance therewith, the identified installments shall be deemed to have been prepaid whether this Bond is presented for notation on the Payment Record or not, and interest on such installments shall cease to accrue after the designated prepayment date; and any subsequent assignee shall take this Bond subject to this provision.

Anything herein to the contrary notwithstanding, so long as this Bond shall be registered in the name of the Payee, payment of the entire principal amount or such lesser amount hereof as may be prepaid, and the interest thereon, and payment of interest due hereon, shall be made by the City at the office of the Fiscal Agent, and without presentation or surrender of this Bond to the Paying Agent, and said payments shall be noted on this Bond and said Fiscal Agent on the Payment Record attached to and made a part of this Bond, and the Fiscal Agent shall send to the City at the office of the Paying Agent a copy of the Payment Record of the making of such notations, provided that if the Payee shall assign this Bond by execution of the form of assignment attached hereto, the Alternate Payee shall present this Bond to the office of the Paying Agent for a certification of the notations made hereon of the portions of the principal amount hereof and interest hereon paid or prepaid, or in exchange for Coupon Bonds in the denomination of \$1,000 each as permitted in the Ordinance, and every such assignee hereof shall take this Bond subject to such condition.

It is provided in and by said Ordinance that additional bonds ranking on a parity with this Bond (and the issue of Bonds of which this is one) may be issued and outstanding, and this Bond (and the issue of which it forms a part) do so, to such amount and on such terms and conditions as may be issued and outstanding, under the conditions and restrictions of said Ordinance, is (are) and will continue to be payable from and secured by an exclusive pledge of the City's portion of the net proceeds of the Ordinance derived from the operation of said combined and consolidated public project, which fixed portion of said income and revenues shall be used to pay the principal and interest on this Bond. The portion of the net proceeds of which this Bond forms a part, and on any additional bonds ranking on a parity herewith, as may be issued and outstanding under the conditions and restrictions of said Ordinance, as and when the same become due and payable, and which shall be set aside as a special fund for that purpose and identified as the "CITY OF MT. VERNON WATERWORKS AND SEWER IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BOND AND INTEREST SINKING FUND."

This Bond (and the issue of which it forms a part) does so constitute a part of the debt of the City of Mt. Vernon, and shall be subject to the provisions of any constitutional or statutory provisions or limitations. Said City covenants that so long as any part of this Bond and the issue of which it is a part is outstanding and unpaid, the City shall cause the consolidated public project to be continuously operated as a revenue-producing undertaking and that the City will fix, and if necessary adjust, the rates of charges for the use of the plant and facilities of said project and collect and account for the income and revenues therefrom so as to maintain in said Fund an amount sufficient to pay promptly the principal and interest on this Bond and the issue of which it forms a part) and of all other bonds ranking on a parity herewith as may be outstanding from time to time, and also to pay the cost of operation and maintenance of the project.

This Bond is exempt from taxation in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

conditions and things required to exist, happen and be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this Bond (and the issue of bonds of which it is one), have existed, have happened and have been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law, that the amount of this Bond together with all other obligations of said City, does not exceed any limit prescribed by the Constitution or Statutes of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and that a sufficient portion of the income and revenues of said public project has been pledged to and will be set aside into said special fund (Bond and Interest Sinking Fund) by said City for the prompt payment of the principal and interest on this Bond and on all other bonds ranking on a parity herewith that may be issued and outstanding, in addition to proper provision for the costs of operation, maintenance and depreciation of said project.

SECTION 8. ISSUANCE OF FULLY REGISTERED BOND; CONVERTIBLE INTO COUPON BONDS.

In the event that when the Bonds herein authorized and referred to be offered to the public in the United States of America, Housing and Home Finance Agency shall become the purchaser of all or any of the blocks of said issue of Bonds, and shall so request, the City shall, at the option of such purchaser, issue a single Bond hereinafter referred to as a "Fully Registered Bond", amounting in the aggregate to the principal amount of the Bonds so purchased, the principal maturity of the Coupon Bonds represented by the Fully Registered Bond shall be the latest maturity thereof. Such Fully Registered Bond shall be numbered R-1, of type composition, on paper of sufficient weight and strength to prevent deterioration and the latest date of maturity of any installment of principal as stated therein, and shall conform in size to standard practice. Such Fully Registered Bond shall, upon execution on behalf of the City and as prescribed herein, constitute a Fully Registered Bond, constitute a part of the (or the entire) \$410,000 bond issue herein authorized, and referred to, shall be non-negotiable, without interest coupons, registered as to principal and interest, payable as directed by the Payee, and be substantially the form hereinabove set forth.

The City hereby covenants and agrees with the Registered Owner and holder of such Fully Registered Bond that the City will, as the request of such holder, at the City's own expense and within ninety (90) days of such request, issue its registered bearer Bond (registrable as to principal only), in form as set forth in Section 7A hereof, in the denomination of \$1,000, in aggregate principal amount, maturing as to principal on the date of maturity of the Fully Registered Bond, and shall conform in size to standard practice. Such Fully Registered Bond shall, upon execution on behalf of the City and as prescribed herein, constitute a Fully Registered Bond, constitute a part of the (or the entire) \$410,000 bond issue herein authorized, and referred to, shall be non-negotiable, without interest coupons, registered as to principal and interest, payable as directed by the Payee, and be substantially the form hereinabove set forth.

SECTION 9. COUPONS AND INTEREST PAYMENTS DATES MATURING BEFORE DELIVERY.

Before executing any Coupon Bonds, the City Clerk shall detach and cancel all matured coupons, if there are any such matured coupons thereon and any coupons which have been printed, and shall deliver to the Paying Agent and to the Purchaser a certificate as to such cancellation. Before attaching a Fully Registered Bond, said City Clerk shall make or cause to be made an appropriate notation thereon as to any interest payment date or dates which have matured prior to such attachment.

SECTION 10. SALE OF BONDS  
The entire \$410,000 of Bonds authorized by this Ordinance shall be offered for sale, which shall be publicly bid, and shall be sold to the highest bidder, and the City Council, to that end, the Mayor and the City Clerk are authorized to sign an appropriate form of notice soliciting bids to cause the sale, the same to be published in the Official Notice of Sale of Bonds, and to be held in conformity with Chapter 424 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, at least one time, not less than seven days nor more than twenty-one days prior to the designated sale date in the MOUNT VERNON SIGNAL, which is the news-

paper having the largest Bond sale circulation which is published in the City of Mt. Vernon, and is the newspaper meeting the requirements of KRS 424.110-120, for publication, in which official publications of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and having general circulation in the Louisville, Kentucky, and having general circulation in the Louisville, Kentucky, and having general circulation in THE BOND BUYER, a periodical of general circulation among bond issue purchasers.

The published Notice and the Official Notice of Sale of Bonds and the Official Notice of Sale of Bonds shall be in the customary form or forms and shall identify the bonds offered for sale, shall designate a day and hour for the receiving and public opening and consideration of the bids, which time will be the date of a regular, adjourned regular, or called, special meeting of the City Council, as the Mayor may determine; shall require that bids be upon the basis of cash at not less than face value plus accrued interest; shall permit bidders to stipulate one or more interest coupon rates; and shall require bidders to specify in capital the exact net interest cost of their bid for each of the bonds; and the exact separate net interest cost, respectively, for any separate bid made by such bidders for any separate blocks of bonds; provided that bids for said \$410,000 of Bonds shall be considered for the following blocks of bonds, subject in each instance to the maximum net interest cost as respectively stated:

- (1) All maturities in the years 1976 through 1975 - 3-3/4%
- (2) All maturities in the years 1976 through 1980 - 3-3/4%
- (3) All maturities in the years 1981 through 1985 - 3-3/4%
- (4) All maturities in the years 1986 through 1990 - 3-3/4%
- (5) All maturities in the years 1991 through 1995 - 3-3/4%
- (6) All maturities in the years 1996 through 1998 - 3-5/8%
- (7) All of said \$410,000 of Bonds - 3-5/8%.

(b) That all bidders may submit bids for the purchase of one, all, or less than all, of the above blocks of bonds, and that a bid is submitted for more than one of the above blocks of bonds, such bid may be considered for the award of all of the blocks of bonds bid for in such bid or upon the award of any one or more of such blocks or bonds bid for in such bid.

(c) That all bids of the same maturity must bear the same and a single interest coupon rate from the date thereof to final maturity. Bids will be required to be made in multiples of 1/16th of one percent, with a minimum net interest cost of 1-10/16ths. If a bid carries two or more interest coupon rates, an average interest rate shall be computed on the basis of the total amount of the bid, and the average interest rate or combined blocks covered by the bid at the offered rate; and if the average rate so obtained is not greater than the maximum acceptable rate herein provided, the bid shall be qualified for consideration.

(d) That bids for the entire bond issue will be accorded preference over bids for individual or combined blocks, except where the sum of the bids for such individual blocks results in a lower net interest cost for the maximum amount of the bond issue than the sum of the bids for the lower bidder, calculations of net interest cost will exclude the bid of the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

(e) That the Housing and Home Finance Agency has entered into an Amended Loan Agreement with the City, pursuant to which said Agency proposes to purchase said \$410,000 of Bonds at par plus accrued interest at an interest rate of three and one-eighth percent (3-1/8%) on all, or on any one or more, of the above-designated blocks, providing bids are not received from other bidders for any one or more of such blocks of bonds designated blocks, on the terms hereinabove indicated. That in the event that any such other bid or bids are received, the bid of the HIFA as to such bonds, or as to the block or blocks of bonds so designated, shall be qualified for consideration.

(f) That subject to the foregoing, at the public sale, the bonds will be awarded to the bidder or bidders offering to purchase the combined blocks of the blocks of such bonds at the lowest net interest cost to the City of Mt. Vernon to be determined by deducting the total amount of any premium from the aggregate amount of interest upon the bonds of the blocks of such bonds, and the amount of the latest interest payment date to their stated maturities.

(g) That if said bonds are not ready for delivery and payment within sixty (60) days from the date of sale, the successful bidder or bidders shall be relieved of any liability to accept any of the bonds, except that additional time may be required for delivery of any bonds purchased by the HIFA.

(h) That bidders (except the HIFA) shall be required to deposit a good faith check by cashier's check or certified check in the amount of the bid, which shall be held in escrow until the date of the public sale, and if the bid is irregularly and to reject any or all of the bids.

The Mayor and the City Clerk are additionally authorized in connection with such sale, to sign, cause to be signed, and to deliver to the purchaser, a copy of the Official Notice of Sale of Bonds and a Statement of Essential Facts, giving a more detailed description of the Bonds, and an appropriate certificate of the City Clerk, shall bring about uniformity in bidding. No particular bid forms (or uniform bid forms) shall be required, but all bids must conform in form and content in conformity with the provisions of the Official Notice.

Suggested forms of a "Notice of Bond Sale," and the "Official Notice of Sale of Bonds" and "Statement of Essential Facts" shall be prepared and approved by the City Council, the same having been examined by the City Clerk and found to be in order, the same are hereby approved and may be used for the purposes of this section.

If the United States of America, Housing and Home Finance Agency, shall become the purchaser of the entire issue of any block or blocks thereof, it may elect that the Bonds so purchased be issued either in the form of negotiable, bearer, Coupon Bonds, of the denomination of \$1,000 each, in aggregate principal amount, maturing as to principal on the date of maturity of the Fully Registered Bond, and as advertised; or, in the form of a single "Fully Registered Bond" in the form prescribed in Section 7B of this Ordinance and as advertised in this Ordinance.

VERNON PUBLIC SEWER PROJECT CONSTRUCTION ACCOUNT," and the amount of the Construction Account, said deposit in said bank, to the extent that same may cause the aggregate deposits of the City in such bank to exceed the amount of the amount to be held by the FDIC, shall be secured by a surety bond or bonds furnished by a surety company or companies, qualified or authorized to do business in Kentucky, or the excess of such deposit over such insured amount shall be collateralized by bonds or notes of the United States of America, having a market value equivalent to such excess; or to the extent that such excess exceeds the amount to be insured by the Engineers to be required for disbursements during the governing body of the City, in United States Government obligations maturing at such one time as to make such funds available when needed for construction purposes, and in any event not later than eighteen (18) months from the date of such investment. Prior to the expenditure of such proceeds, same shall be subject to a first and paramount lien and charge in favor of the holders of the bonds authorized herein (and of any partly bonds), and said funds shall be held in trust and security for such holders until paid out as herein provided.

Payment from said Construction Account for such construction project shall be made to the payee designated by the Engineers having charge of supervising such construction, and approved by the Regional Administrator of the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States of America, and the amount of the amount to be designated, so long as said Agency may hold any of the bonds; such certifying in each instance to recite that the City's such expenditure of the amount of the amount of the proposed payee under a contract with said City for work performed and - or materials furnished in connection with said construction project, or represents a sum necessary to be expended for such work, and that the same payments made on the costs of the construction project through interim financing for land and - or rights-of-way necessary for the construction project, or for any other related portion of the cost of said construction project as set out herein, provided all checks drawn against said Construction Account shall be signed by the City Engineer, the Superintendent of the project and countersigned by the Mayor of the City and by the City Clerk of the City, or by such other City officer as may be designated by the Mayor of the City, and accompanied by such voucher before being honored by the depository of the Construction Account, except that such vouchers need not be required in connection with any checks issued to liquidate the City's financing in anticipation of the sale of the bonds.

In the event that any unexpended balance shall remain in said Construction Account, the City shall cause the same to be deposited in a special account entitled "CITY OF MT. VERNON WATERWORKS AND SEWER IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BOND AND INTEREST SINKING FUND," and held and applied as a part of the Reserve Fund.

SECTION 12. CITY OFFICIALS TO BE BONDED

The City will cause each municipal officer or other person having charge of any money administered under the provisions of this Ordinance (including the Construction Account) to be bonded at all times in an amount equal to the maximum amount of such moneys in his custody at any one time. The amount of such bond shall be in conformity with this Ordinance, in such manner as to enable the City to obtain the benefit of the lowest possible surety premium rates on such surety bond or bonds. Each such officer or other person shall be required to obtain such qualified or authorized to do business in Kentucky, and approved by the governing body of the City, and the price of such bond shall be paid by the City, and the expense of operating and maintaining the project, and may be paid from the moneys available in the "CITY OF MT. VERNON WATERWORKS AND SEWER IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BOND AND INTEREST SINKING FUND," and hereinbefore mentioned.

SECTION 13. ADOPTION OF BUDGET OF CURRENT EXPENSES

The City covenants and agrees that prior to the delivery of the bonds herein authorized and prior to the completion of the construction project, the City shall cause to be prepared a Budget of Current Expenses for the operation of the combined and consolidated public project for the remainder of the current year, and for each year thereafter, and shall cause the first day of January of each year prior to the year of final maturity of said bonds, or of any bonds ranking on a parity therewith, the City will adopt an Annual Budget of Current Expenses for the current year, and shall cause to be prepared and will furnish a copy of such Budget or amendments thereto, upon request, to any bondholder. Current Expenses shall include the cost of the operation, maintenance, repair, maintaining and insuring said project, but shall exclude payments into the Sinking Fund and the Construction Account. The City further covenants that the current year's Budget of Current Expenses shall be prepared in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance, and that the City will not expend any amount or incur any obligations for operating and maintaining the project, or for the amounts provided for Current Expenses in the current Annual Budget, except on proper justification and resolution by the governing body of the City, that such expenditures are necessary to operate and maintain the project.

The City further covenants that at the same time and in like manner, the City shall prepare an estimate of the project's revenues to be derived from the operation of the project for said CALENDAR year, and that sufficient Gross Revenues shall be provided, through the maintenance of proper rates and charges (and through the increase thereof if necessary), to satisfy the requirements of the provisions contained in this Ordinance, including the accumulation and maintenance of all required reserves specified herein.

SECTION 14. CREATION OF SPECIAL FUNDS

The City covenants that beginning with the first day of the beginning month, as defined in this Ordinance, and thereafter as an annual basis, the City shall cause to be issued and shall maintain in said bank, to the extent that same may cause the aggregate deposits of the City in such bank to exceed the amount of the amount to be held by the FDIC, shall be secured by a surety bond or bonds furnished by a surety company or companies, qualified or authorized to do business in Kentucky, or the excess of such deposit over such insured amount shall be collateralized by bonds or notes of the United States of America, having a market value equivalent to such excess; or to the extent that such excess exceeds the amount to be insured by the Engineers to be required for disbursements during the governing body of the City, in United States Government obligations maturing at such one time as to make such funds available when needed for construction purposes, and in any event not later than eighteen (18) months from the date of such investment. Prior to the expenditure of such proceeds, same shall be subject to a first and paramount lien and charge in favor of the holders of the bonds authorized herein (and of any partly bonds), and said funds shall be held in trust and security for such holders until paid out as herein provided.

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## Decisions On Dams Based On Static Policy

After about four years of guessing, the Army Corps of Engineers ended the game Thursday with the announcement that the Rockcastle River watershed project, including two dams, is not economically feasible. The Corps shelved the program indefinitely, or at least until some change in the method of determining feasibility is made.

In its announcement, the Corps left only one avenue open for consideration of the dams. It said, "It would not be the Corps' policy to build a project above the level of the newly enacted Appalachian Program sets, unless, if such criteria as recreation and industrial developments could be applied to the project, the Corps would re-examine the survey."

There is little consolation in the Corps statement. One is inclined at this stage to use a worn-out explanation: Don't hold your breath!

Not being Army engineers, we cannot understand the reasoning of the Corps in this project. We doubt that we could, if we lived to be a hundred.

The Corps simply tells us it has the responsibility of developing the water resources of the Cumberland River Valley in terms of flood control and kilowatt production, and that flood control and kilowatt production are used as the most important criteria to measure the feasibility of a project.

When these two criteria are of no consequence—and they apparently aren't along the Rockcastle River—then building dams is a waste of time and money. About the only real use of the two Rockcastle River dams, the Corps has said, is to furnish a reservoir of water that can be turned into Lake Cumberland when the dry season brings down the Lake Cumberland water level. And that, once again, apparently, is not reason enough to build the Rockcastle dams.

So be it. But we fail to see how the Corps can declare the Rockcastle River project unfeasible, and in the same breath declare the 151 million dollar Devil's Jump Dam, feasible. Both are based on the same need—a reservoir for Lake Cumberland in the dry season. Or how the Corps could declare the 125-million dollar Cumberland Falls State Park project feasible, when the Corps dam that these things are of the most beautiful parks in the nation, and furnish only a pittance of electric power to an area that does not need the power.

There are things we could say about the Rockcastle River project: It would provide needed water to a five-county area; open the areas to recreation and industry, and add to the scenic beauty of Interstate 75 which would cross the lake formed by the two dams. But these things are of no consequence to the Corps as far as criteria in the development of water resources.

In turning down the two dams, we think the Corps missed a golden opportunity to score a break-through in its anti-poverty battle. We have always said, and we say it again, what is needed in Eastern Kentucky is a constant and reliable source of energy. There are more things in the world than commodities. But then, anti-poverty is of no consequence to the Corps as far as criteria in the development of water resources.

It now becomes obvious to us that there is no chance what-so-ever of reaching the Corps through pleas and permission. If the Corps does not like a water project, then it's a dead pigeon.

With so much of the future economy of the area riding on the feasibility decisions of the Corps, it is time the static policies and criteria are changed to meet the ever changing needs of the "poverty" region. We hope for a start in this direction through the Appalachian Bill.

If not, then the decisions for development of water resources should be taken from the military and put into the hands of a civilian agency, where we think it belongs anyway.

## Going To Malaysia

She said that although her early years in China, were "filled with the uncertainties of war," her childhood was "very secure" because of her parents' faith

in God (Kweilin was bombed repeatedly during World War II and fell to the Japanese not long after the Bausums left).

After living in the states for seven years, she went with her parents to Taiwan (Formosa) in 1951. "The adjustment was hard on me, a teen-ager, but God was working out his plan," she said. "The scenes I saw and the things I experienced there made an indelible impression on my mind and heart. In the summer of 1953 I stood before 100 Chinese young people at a Christian camp and told them, in Chinese, how God was definitely calling me to foreign mission service."

She and Mr. Evans met while students in Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City, Tenn. Married in 1958, they now have four children. They were among 28 missionaries appointed during the Foreign Mission Board's March meeting, bringing the Southern Baptist overseas mission staff to 1,923.

jects that have not been authorized.

"We found in our review that the Devil's Jump project is still very sound, and we still recommend that it be built," Newman said.

Two years ago the construction of Devil's Jump was approved by the Senate, but failed to pass the House. The House agreed during the 1963 session to reconsider the project. It was reconsidered in 1964 and again failed to pass.

"It may be a good chance to hope it will pass this time. The Corps has done all it can do. We have recommended it as a sound project. Now, the ball is in your hands," Newman explained.

Newman stated the cost estimate of Devil's Jump still remains at about \$151 million.
