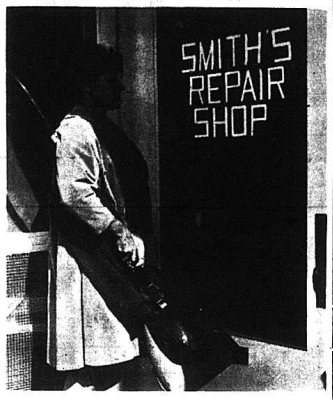

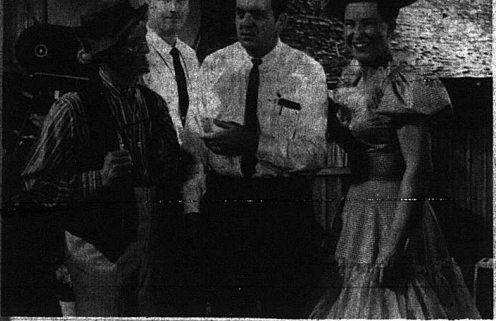
During the course Asher received training in the use of business machines and in facets of the Army personnel management program.

## We Get 100 Percent Federal Aid

# Water And Sewer Rate Ordinance

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, ESTABLISHING RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE MUNICIPAL WATERWORKS SYSTEM AND THE MUNICIPAL SEWER SYSTEM OF SAID CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF SUCH RATES AND CHARGES.**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, has heretofore determined that the promotion and preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare of said City and of all its citizens and inhabitants require the construction and installation of a new municipal sanitary sewer system, including a sewage treatment plant, outfall lines, lift stations and appurtenant facilities, and

WHEREAS, the City owns the existing municipal waterworks system serving the City, and is by concurrent proceedings providing for the issuance of its Waterworks and Sewer Improvement Revenue Bonds, for the purpose of defraying the costs (not otherwise provided) of said construction, and in that connection, is providing that said municipal waterworks and sewer systems are combined and consolidated into a single, revenue-producing public project, all in the manner provided by Chapter 58 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and

WHEREAS, in and by said Statutes, it is required that rates and charges for the services of a combined and consolidated municipal waterworks and sewer system of the City be prescribed and maintained so as to provide for the payment of the interest upon and the principal of said bonds; and it is also provided that, in order to pay operating and maintenance costs, as well as to create a depreciation fund, and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish all of the purposes aforesaid, it is necessary at this time that a schedule of rates and charges be established for the water and sewer service, and that provision be made for the collection thereof,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- SECTION 1. MONTHLY WATER AND SEWER RATES.** That there shall be and there are hereby established from and after the effective date of this Ordinance, monthly rates and charges for water service and for sewer service furnished by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, as follows:
  - A. **MINIMUM MONTHLY WATER BILL.**

The minimum monthly bill for water service, which minimum monthly bill entitles each customer to 2,000 gallons (or less) in each month for such minimum charge, shall be Three Dollars and 50 Cents (\$3.50).
  - B. **MONTHLY WATER RATES.**

Number of Gallons (or Less) Monthly Charge per 1,000 Gallons of Water Per Month.	Monthly Charge
For the first 2,000 gallons (Minimum rate for the first 2,000 gallons)	\$3.50
For the next 8,000 gallons	90
For the next 10,000 gallons	90
For the next 20,000 gallons	65
All over 100,000 gallons	50

(Minimum Charge, \$3.50)

**C. FIRE HYDRANT RENTALS.** All Standard Fire Hydrants (public or private) shall be billed at the rate of Seventeen Dollars (\$17.00) per year, and the City will pay the sum to be deposited into the same fund as the fund into which all other revenues of the municipal waterworks and sewer system will be consolidated with the municipal sewer system are deposited. Said payment shall be made in twelve equal monthly payments on the first day of each month.

**SECTION 2. MONTHLY SEWER RATES.** The rates or charges for sewer service rendered by the municipal sewer system shall be based insofar as possible upon the quantity of water supplied each month to any residential premises, and shall be an amount equal to fifty percent (50%) of the face amount of such water computed according to the rates hereinabove specified; bill shall be One Dollar and 65 Cents (\$1.65) per month.

**SECTION 2. CONNECTIONS AND CONNECTION CHARGES.** New customers of the waterworks system shall pay a connection charge of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) for any water connections. New owners of the sewer system will also pay a connection charge of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00).

**SECTION 3. RIGHTS ON PAYMENT OF CONNECTION CHARGES.** The payment of a connection charge by a property owner entitles the holder of such property to have water line and sewer line, as the case may be, brought to a point in the edge of his property line or easement.

**SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE FOR WATER CHARGES.** The foregoing rates and charges shall be effective as to existing water customers for the next monthly billing beginning immediately after the effective date of this Ordinance, and shall be effective as to the respective new water customers beginning on the date on which each customer connects his premises to the water line made available to such premises.

**SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE FOR SEWER CHARGES.** The sewer system shall be considered "available" to any premises which but upon any street, road, alley, public or private way or easement in which there exists a sewer line, main, lateral or other structure of the municipal sanitary sewer system of the City, capable of receiving flowable wastes, in which there has been brought to the edge of the property line or easement of the owner of such premises.

The foregoing sewer rates and charges prescribed in this Ordinance shall be effective as to existing water new sewer lines are made available as above defined, upon the date of actual connection thereto, or upon a date not later than sixty (60) days after the Superintendent of the sewer system furnishes notice to such property owner either by personal written notice or by notice published in a newspaper of general circulation throughout the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, to the effect that sewer service is available to such premises, as defined above, whichever date is earlier.

**SECTION 6. RATES ARE EXCLUSIVE OF SALES TAX.** The foregoing rates are rates to be charged by the City of Mt. Vernon, and any applicable State sales tax shall be added to each bill as a separate charge.

**SECTION 7. ALL CUSTOMERS METERED; RATES UNIFORM IN AND OUT OF CITY.** It shall be mandatory for all customers of the waterworks system to be metered, and the schedule of rates herein prescribed shall be uniformly charged to all customers of the waterworks system and of the sewer system, regardless of whether such customers are located within the City limits of the City or elsewhere. No one shall receive a meter or be entitled to free water or sewer service or to any such service without paying the full rates herein specified.

**SECTION 8. METERS READ MONTHLY.** Water meters shall be read monthly commencing on the fifteenth day of each month, and thereafter after after as weather and other conditions and circumstances may reasonably permit, and such readings shall continue as frequently as possible until all of the meters have been read.

In the event that upon the occasion of a monthly meter reading, it is found that the meter of a customer is defective or non-operative, the water bill of such customer shall be computed on the basis of the average monthly water consumption of such customer shown by the three preceding monthly meter readings, provided that if no such readings are then available, the applicable water bill may be computed on the basis of the average monthly water consumption as estimated by the Superintendent of the waterworks system, subject to adjustment upward or downward according to the average of the next three succeeding monthly meter readings.

**SECTION 9. DEPOSITS.** A deposit of \$5.00 shall be made with the City by any applicant for water service for residential property, before said applicant shall be entitled to such service. A deposit of \$10.00 shall be made with the City by any applicant for water service for commercial or industrial property. No such separate deposit shall be required for sewer service, except for such customers, if any, as shall desire sewer service without also being customers of the municipal water system. When the City, through its water controllers must make separate satisfactory arrangements with the Superintendent of the municipal sewer system for separate metering of such service, use comparable to the charges based on water consumption, and the amount of deposits required, less any unpaid charges, shall be refunded to the customer paying same, or to his heirs or assigns, whenever the City is duly notified, in writing, to disconnect or terminate service to such customer.

**SECTION 10. OWNERS PAY CONNECTION CHARGES; OCCUPANTS PAY MONTHLY RATES.** Connection charges, where applicable, shall be the personal obligation of the owners of the respective properties. All water and sewer rates and charges, other than connection charges, shall be the personal obligation, collectible by law, of the occupant of the lot, or other building receiving the benefits of such use and service. No liability shall continue, provided that the satisfaction of the liability for such use and service shall be a discharge of the liability for which the payment is made.

**SECTION 11. MULTIPLE USERS.** Where two or more tenants or occupants (of different tenements) of a property are served by a single water meter, the water and sewer rates and charges shall be the personal obligation, collectible by law, of the person or persons who apply for such service and, where applicable, each of the occupants of such property. Each such customer shall be billed his proportionate (to the number of users and not to the quantity used) share of the water and sewer charges for such service, and each such customer shall constitute a separate user and be billed accordingly. No user shall be billed less than the minimum rate herein prescribed. The computation of the water (and sewer) consumption above the amount allowed in the minimum bill to such water (and sewer) users shall be made the same as if only one customer occupied the entire property; provided, however, that upon the filing of an application for a separate water meter and upon payment of the applicable rate and deposit therefor, the City shall install a separate water meter for each such customer, in which event such applicant will be billed only for the water and sewer rates and charges applicable to water and sewer service disclosed by such separate meter.

**SECTION 12. REVISION OF RATES.** The schedule of rates and charges prescribed in this Ordinance shall be revised from time to time, and whenever required shall be subject to the approval of the City and revenues from the municipal waterworks and sewer systems, adequate to comply with such covenants and agreements which may be made in connection with the Revenue Bond Issue financing referred to herein.

**SECTION 13. SPECIAL RATES.** In the event that the sewage, water or other liquid wastes being discharged into the municipal sewer system from any premises shall contain unduly high concentrations of any substances which add to the operating costs of the municipal sewer system, then special rates, rentals or charges may be established, charged and collected as to such building or premises, or the owner or other interested party may be required to treat specially such sewage, water or other liquid wastes before it is discharged into the municipal sewer system.

**SECTION 14. BILLING; COLLECTIONS; PENALTIES.** The rates or charges aforesaid shall be collected monthly on or about the first of each month, and all bills for such service shall be considered due and payable twenty (20) days after rendition. If a bill is not paid as aforesaid within such 20-day period, such customer shall be delinquent, and there shall be imposed a penalty on each bill not so paid, in an amount equal to ten percent (10%) of the amount of such bill, for each month of such delinquency (30 days thereafter that same remains unpaid. If a bill is not paid as aforesaid within such 20-day period, the City is hereby authorized and directed to enforce and collect any such delinquent charges.

**SECTION 15. DELINQUENCY; DISCONNECTION OF WATER SERVICE; RECONNECTION.** If a bill is not paid after rendition, the Superintendent of the municipal waterworks system shall thereupon turn off the water of such delinquent customer, and may further enforce the use of the water facilities said customer and may enforce customer until payment in full is made. If any deadline day, such deadline shall not exceed 30 days after the end of the next secular day thereafter. If such water service is disconnected by the City, reconnection of such service shall be made on the next secular day unless the user pays all charges and penalties owed plus the amount of Five Dollars (\$5.00) as a disconnection and reconnection charge.

**SECTION 16. DEPOSIT IS EXCUSE FOR DELINQUENCY.** The foregoing provisions are intended to and shall apply regardless of the availability of any initial deposit

required by this Ordinance.

**SECTION 17. RECORDS AND AUDITS.** The rates, rentals and charges for the use of and service rendered by the municipal waterworks and sewer systems shall be billed and collected by the City and the full amount of the proceeds of each service shall be deposited as received and set aside into the appropriate fund or account as directed by the City Council. The records of the project may require, but subject to any different determination which may be made in any ordinance relating to the project. The records of the City with respect to charging, billing, collecting and accounting for water and sewer service shall be audited at least once each year by an Independent Certified Public Accountant, and a report thereon shall be filed with the City Clerk, or shall be filed in such manner and at such other time or times as may be stipulated in any ordinance relating to the issuance of Revenue Bonds. The cost of such audit shall be classified and paid as an expense operation and maintenance of the municipal waterworks and sewer system.

**SECTION 18. SEVERABILITY.** If any clause, provision, paragraph or section of this Ordinance be ruled void or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder hereof is intended to be enacted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.

**SECTION 19. ALL FORMER PROVISIONS REPEALED; EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE.**

All City Ordinances, orders, resolutions, motions, or parts thereof, insofar as same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed, and the Ordinance shall take effect from and after its adoption, approval and publication as provided by law, except that the rates herein prescribed shall be effective on the respective dates herein provided. Adopted and approved on this 18th day of March, 1965.

## Sewer Connection Ordinance

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, TAKING NOTICE OF CONSTRUCTION OF A MUNICIPAL SEWER SYSTEM AND REPEALING ALL SOURCES OF FLOWABLE SEWAGE CONNECTED THEREWITH IF CONNECTION IS AVAILABLE, OR AS SOON AS A CONNECTION IS MADE AFTER BEING MADE AVAILABLE, TO CONSTITUTE A PUBLIC NUISANCE WHICH SHALL BE ABATED, ESTABLISHING PENALTIES; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT THEREOF.**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, has heretofore determined that the promotion and preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare of said City and of all its citizens and inhabitants require the construction and installation of a municipal sanitary sewer system, consisting of a new sewage treatment plant, outfall lines, lift stations, sewage gathering lines and appurtenant facilities, and

WHEREAS, the preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare of said City, and the abatement of all existing unsanitary methods of sewage disposal in said City be terminated as soon as practical and that to the municipal sanitary sewer system as soon as a sewer connection is made available to same,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1. Definitions.** As used in this Ordinance, the following terms have the following respective meanings unless the context indicates otherwise:  
(a) "City" means the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and where the context so indicates, actions on its behalf by the City Council of said City, or such other body as shall be vested with authority over the municipal sewer system of the City.  
(b) "Sewer system" or "sewers" means the City of Mt. Vernon municipal sewer system which now provides, or as may hereafter provide, for the drainage, treatment and disposal of liquid or flowable sewage wastes within the City.  
(c) "Premises" means and includes all structures and improvements in the City, having flowable waste disposal which should be drained, treated or disposed of in the interest of the public health, safety and general welfare, and which are under the control of any person, including, but not limited to, hotels, motels, trailer camps, manufacturing, business, commercial and other establishments and other structures of any and every nature whatsoever.

(d) The sewer system is "available" as that term is used in this Ordinance to any premises in the City which abut upon any street, road, alley, public way or easement in which there exists a sewer pipe, main, lateral or other structure of the municipal sanitary sewer system capable of receiving flowable wastes in which the City has brought a sewer line to a point located at the edge of the property line or easement of the owner of such premises.

**Section 2.** All owners and occupants of premises which are now available and occupants of premises which are not available in the City, shall, within sixty (60) days from the date that the Superintendent of the sewer system, or other duly authorized officer of the City, furnishes notice of availability to the owner of such property, either by personal notice or by notice published in a local newspaper of general circulation throughout said City, that such sewer line is available to such premises, connect therewith all sanitary sewerage drain pipes of such premises.

**Section 3.** All connections shall be made under such regulations as the City may establish. Failure to effect such connection as aforesaid shall constitute a nuisance, and shall remain connected or be connected with any separate san-

tary sewer, or horizontal structure, or made as part of the sewer system of the City, shall any steam boiler, shall otherwise introduced to any such connection sewer system.

**Section 4.** No person, partnership or entering into the City, shall be permitted to connect with the City sewer lines of the City, shall be permitted to connect with the City sewer and run a lateral to the property line or easement of any applicant where sewers are available, and any and all connections therewith, shall be subject to the approval of the applicant under the direction and supervision of the City, provided that nothing herein shall be construed as requiring the City to furnish a sewer connection or sewer service to any premises where a City sewer line is not available at the time that the application is made.

**Section 5.** That all architects, contractors, builders or other persons who shall hereafter erect new premises where sewers are available in the City, shall, before erecting the same, be provided for connecting the sanitary sewerage drain from such building or structure with the municipal sewer system.

**Section 6.** Each owner of a house, building or property used for human occupancy, or for employment, or other purposes, situated within the City and to which sewer service is made available by the City, is hereby required to connect with the City sewer line, and facilities therein and to connect such facilities directly with such available public sewer in accordance with the requirements of this Ordinance.

**Section 7.** All costs and expense incidental to the installation of such sewer connections, and the expense which shall be borne by the owner, which shall indemnify the City from any loss or damage that may directly or indirectly be sustained by the City as a result of such installation. All connections shall be made under the supervision of the Superintendent of the sewer system or other duly authorized official of the City.

**Section 8.** It shall be unlawful for any person to construct or install, privately, well, vault, cesspool, septic tank or similar collection or the reception of flowable sewage, where sewers are available in the City, and such privies, vaults, cesspools, cisterns, septic tanks, or similar collection or reception of flowable sewage, or disconnected by the owners and the occupants of premises to which sewers are made available by the City, as such privies, vaults, cesspools, cisterns, septic tanks, or similar collection or reception of flowable sewage, facilities and other means of casting or depositing sewage into a container above or below the surface of the ground, or upon or into the soil or into any running or standing stream, or into any water body, or where, whether the soil is contaminated with such sewage, are hereby declared to be unlawful and to constitute a nuisance.

**Section 9.** It shall be unlawful for any person to place, deposit, or permit to be deposited in any unsanitary manner upon public or private property within the City, any garbage or other objectionable waste, or to discharge into any natural outlet within the City, any sewage, industrial wastes, or other polluted wastes, except when suitable treatment has been provided under the supervision of the Superintendent of the municipal sewer system or other duly authorized City officer.

**Section 10.** No substances shall be placed or discharged into the municipal sewer system which will create a combustible, gaseous, explosive or inflammable condition or which will create any substance or objects to be placed or discharged into the municipal sewer system which will not dissolve and will thus cause an obstruction and clogging within said system. No petroleum products shall be placed or discharged into the municipal sewer system.

**Section 11.** This Ordinance may be amended at any time to provide more detailed regulations as to the requirements for the use of the sewer system, and any such amendment shall be subject to the approval of the City, provided, however, that no amendment cannot be amended in any way which may adversely affect the interests of holders of outstanding bonds constituting an encumbrance on the municipal sewer system or against the revenues thereof.

**Section 12.** Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or failing or refusing to comply with same, whether or not he, she or it is a resident or owner of such premises, shall be liable to a fine, which shall be not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) for each offense. Each day that such person, firm or corporation fails to or refuses to connect the sanitary sewer drain from any property or building owned or occupied by him, her or it with an available sewer line, each day any privy, well, vault, pool, cistern, septic tank or similar contrivance into which such sewage is cast or permitted to be disposed of, is kept or maintained in violation of this Ordinance, each day that the holder of such property or building or other separate sanitary sewer, and each day that such violation hereof is violated, shall constitute a separate offense.

**Section 13.** If any clause, provision, or section of this Ordinance be ruled void or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder thereof is intended to be enacted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.

**Section 14.** All ordinances, orders, resolutions, motions, or parts thereof, insofar as same may be in conflict herewith, are repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its adoption, approval, and publication as provided by law.

## Sweeney Is Ready But Is The Bill Ready For Him?

President Johnson made an obvious choice and a sound one when he selected John L. Sweeney to head the Appalachian Development Program. Mr. Sweeney has the vigor and energy to push the program with which he has been associated since its inception. He has the confidence of the President and of the people in the War on Poverty.

As far as Kentucky is concerned, the Appalachian Act seems work John Wiseman, state bill is merely an enabling act, and that the program it makes possible has not yet been developed. When it is, he says, it will be equal to Appalachia's needs. We hope so, but it isn't easy to know such a broad program can be developed from such a relatively narrow bill.

For example, there is nothing in the bill to permit any real resource development. The President insisted on leaving in the bill the Lausche amendment requiring all strip-

mine reclamation money to be spent on public lands; this rule, Kentucky, the state which probably needs it most. There are only token funds for reforestation and erosion control.

Further, the Army Engineers, who have shown all the speed of snails in developing Appalachia's rivers, have been left in charge of river projects, and given the job of re-surveying and re-evaluating the entire Appalachian river network. But they have not been directed to ease the criteria with which they have repeatedly ruled out development of Kentucky's mountain rivers.

For example, last weekend the Engineers announced that they had just turned down two dams on the Rockcastle River as "economically unfeasible." These dams are desperately needed for the economic revival of one of our most depressed areas. The Engineers have also proposed that local communities contribute to construction costs of dams that their regions had hoped to get through all of these communities are in the center of the area this bill is supposed to help.

Mr. Whiteman says that the commission which will administer the Appalachian program will be able to ease the criteria which govern the construction of dams, and thus make possible the development of our mountain rivers. We'll have to wait and see. Right now, listening to the reports of the Army Engineers, things don't sound too rosy for Mr. Sweeney.
