Notice Of Sale Of Franchise

By virtue of a resolution heretofore passed by the City Council of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, directing the undersigned to advertise for bids and sell a franchise to use the streets, avenues, alleys and public places of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky, for the purpose of owning, operating, equipping and maintaining a system for the distribution of television cable service, the undersigned, as City Clerk of the said City, will on Thursday, the 29th of April, 1965, at or about the hour of 2:00 P. M., sell at public auction to the highest and best bidder at the City Hall in said City, a franchise for the purpose about set out.

Said franchise is more particularly described and fully defined in a proposed ordinance granting and creating the same and said proposed ordinance defines the terms and conditions upon which said sale will be made, and is it full as follows:

Mar A. Bullock City Clerk, Mount Vernon, Kentucky AN ORDINANCE NO. 278

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That

the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representatives, successors, and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser," be, and is, subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, purchase, construct, maintain and operate in and through this City, a system of works for the generation, distribution and transmission of television cable service from points either within or without the corporate limits of this City, to this City and the inhabitants thereof, and from and through this City to persons, corporations and municipalities beyond the limits thereof, to erect and maintain poles, wires and other apparatus necessary or convenient for the operation of said system in, upon, across and along each and all of the streets, avenues, alleys and public places within the present and future corporate limits of this City; to have and hold, as by law authorized, any and all real estate, easements, water and other rights necessary or convenient for said purpose, to use any and all such streets, avenues, alleys, and public places while constructing or operating said television cable service or works; and to cross the streets, avenues, alleys and public places for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or extending such poles, wires and other apparatus as may be necessary or convenient for the proper distribution of television cable service and through this City.

SECTION 2. The purchaser shall indemnify and save harmless the City from any and all damages, judgments, decrees, costs and expenses, including a reasonable attorney's fee, which the City may legally suffer or incur or which may be legally obtained against the City or any of its officers, agents or employees, by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley, or other public place in the City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or legally resulting from the purchase by the purchaser of the exercise of the privileges herein granted, and, if any claim shall be made or suits brought against the City for damages alleged to have been sustained by reason of the occupation of any street, avenue, alley or public place of the exercise of any privileges herein granted by the purchaser, the City shall immediately notify the purchaser in writing thereof, and the purchaser, it being given the right and privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.

SECTION 3. The purchaser may furnish television cable service to any person or persons residing along or near the aforesaid streets, avenues, alleys and public places, and may make such lawful contracts for the use thereof as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and the said person or persons.

SECTION 4. The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.

SECTION 5. This franchise and all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall be in full force, and effect for a period of ten (10) years from and after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.

SECTION 6. This franchise may be transferred by the purchaser and the word "purchaser" whenever used in this franchise shall include and be taken to mean and apply also to all the successors and assigns of the purchaser.

SECTION 7. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk, as soon as practicable after the introduction of this ordinance, to sell at public auction, to the highest and best bidder, the written franchise to be sold at the City Hall to be fixed by her after advertising the proposed ordinance and the time and place of sale thereof once for every three consecutive weeks in the Mount Vernon Signal, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and making said sale; she shall receive no bid for less amount than the total expense connected with the making of said sale including the cost of advertising, and she shall report her findings to the City Council at a subsequent meeting of the Council. This Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

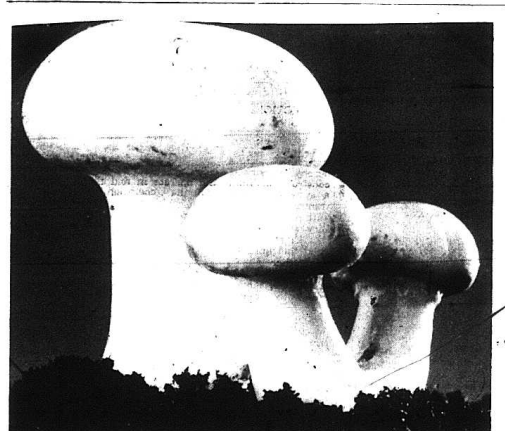

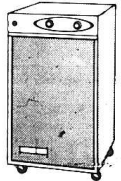

Suit Is Filed To Oust Mullins From Seat On School Board

Wins First Test Vote On New School Survey

Virgil Mullins, member of the Rockcastle County Board of Education from the Fourth Educational District, won test of strength at the April meeting of the board, when he voted 3 to 1 to go along with a motion made by Mullins concerning an elementary school in Eastern Rockcastle County.

Mr. Mullins is currently under fire from the office of the Attorney General. A suit has been filed to oust him from the board on grounds of educational qualifications.

Mr. Mullins called for the board to go on record asking a state facility survey team to consider an elementary school in his district, probably at Clinax.

The motion carried. Voting "yes" were: Mr. Mullins, Coleman Mink, Mrs. Vashli Mullins-Voinovich and Preston Nunnally. Chairman John E. Harris did not vote. He is not required to vote in other school matters.

The proceedings started when Mr. Mullins strongly urged that the board go on record favoring the building of a consolidated elementary school in his district.

At this point, Neureul Mink, a clerk, interjected, pleaded with the board not to take any official action regarding further consolidation until a state facility survey team comes from Frankfort to make recommendations.

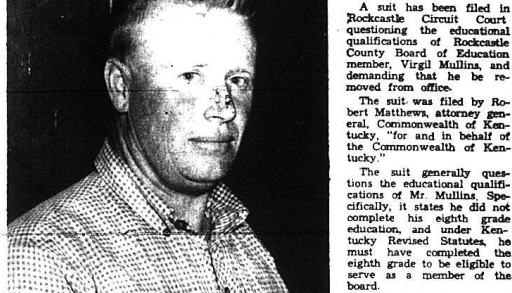
This team, Mrs. Miracle explained, "we have no right to grind, are specialists in their field, and will give us a plan which will be best for the children."

She stated further that the State Department of Education has the final say, and we cannot build anything without their recommendation and approval.

At this point, Mr. Mullins insisted that he be allowed to make a motion. His request was granted.

His motion, seconded by Coleman Mink, to ask the state facility survey team, when it comes to Rockcastle, to consider a consolidated school in his district.

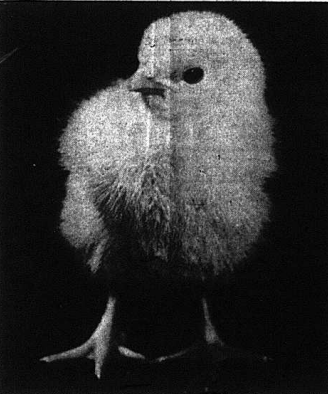

school board did not know that any legal proceedings questioning the qualifications of Virgil Mullins had been instituted. The board was very surprised at the attorney general's filed.
 Just who filed affidavits with the attorney general questioning the qualifications of Mr. Mullins was not learned. Any three residents and/or voters in the Fourth District could have questioned his right to serve.
 The suit cites Chapter 14 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and says:

 "Wherefore, the plaintiff respectfully demands judgment of the court removing the defendant from said office and for his costs."

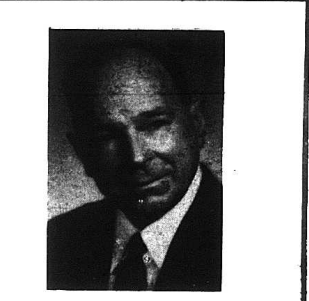
