AN ORDINANCE NO. 279

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That _____, the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representatives, successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser," be, and is, subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, purchase, construct, maintain and operate in and through the City a system of works for the generation, distribution and transmission of television cable service from points either within or without the corporate limits of this City, to this City and the inhabitants thereof, and from and through this City to persons, corporations and municipalities beyond the limits thereof, to erect and maintain poles, wires and other apparatus necessary or convenient for the operation of said system in, upon, across and along each and all of the streets, avenues, alleys and public places, within the present and future corporate limits of this City, to have and hold, as by law authorized, any and all real estate, easements, water and other rights necessary or convenient for said purpose, to use any and all such streets, avenues, alleys, and public places while constructing or operating said television cable service or works; and to cross any and all streets and streams in this City for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or extending such poles, wires and other apparatus as may be necessary or convenient for the proper distribution of television cable service in and through this City.

SECTION 2. The purchaser shall indemnify, and save harmless the City from any and all damages, judgments, decrees, costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fee, which the City may legally suffer or incur or which may be legally obtained against the City for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley, or other public place in the City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or legally resulting from the exercise by the purchaser of any of the privileges herein granted; and if any claim shall be made or suits brought against the City for damages alleged to have been sustained by reason of the occupation of any street, avenue, alley or public place of the exercise of any privileges herein granted, and if any claim shall be made immediately notify the purchaser in writing thereof, and the purchaser is hereby given the right and privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.

SECTION 3. The purchaser may furnish television cable service to any person or persons residing along or near the aforesaid streets, avenues, alleys and public places, and may make such lawful contracts for the use thereof as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and the said person or persons.

SECTION 4. The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.

SECTION 5. This franchise and all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall be in full force and effect for a period of ten (10) years from and after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.

SECTION 6. The franchise may be transferred by the purchaser and the word "purchaser" whenever used in this franchise shall include and be taken to mean and apply also to all the successors and assigns of the purchaser.

SECTION 7. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk, as soon as practicable after the introduction of this ordinance, to sell at public auction, to the highest and best bidder, the within franchise at the City Hall on some day to be fixed by her after advertising the proposed ordinance and the time and place of sale thereof once a week for three consecutive weeks, in the Mount Vernon Signal, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and in making said sale, she shall receive no bid for less amount than the total expense connected with the making of said sale including the cost of advertising, and she shall report her actions hereunder at a subsequent meeting of this Council. This Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

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Our Sympathy

The death of Frank Dees last week end brought to an end the career of one of the county's most colorful figures. Although we did not always agree with him over the years on all matters affecting the county, we liked him. He was a fighter, and one of those rare people who whet the public interest and take the drabness out of everyday life.

One of his most controversial years came in 1958 when he fought in Rockcastle Circuit Court, the Kentucky Court of Appeals, and before the Kentucky Public Service Commission the efforts of the present Kentucky Telephone Company to establish another telephone system in the county. The long battle came to an end when he sold the cranky telephone system to Kentucky Telephone after a stormy hearing before the commission that was filled with ingredients of suspense and drama.

Mr. Dees often found himself the subject of editorials and feature stories in national magazines. One of his off-and-on disagreements with the Signal came during the telephone hearing before the Public Service Commission. When asked a question by the Signal editor on his feeling about the hearing, he said: "I didn't have any comment for you yesterday. I don't have any comment today. And don't come back tomorrow, because I won't have any comment for you then."

His disagreement with the Signal over the case apparently was not deep. He came to the Signal office often after that to compliment a stand on an issue, or to "tell us" whichever was his pleasure.

His illness retired him from public life two years ago, and at that time we felt things hereabouts would never be quite the same again. We extend to his family our sincerest sympathy, and like George Bernard Shaw's remark about his Chaplain: "We feel sure 'the likes of him will never see this way again.'"

Fendant denies that Robert Matthews, attorney general for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, has authorized the institution of this action, and defendant further states that said authority is not granted to the maintenance of this action.

In short, Mr. Mullins admitted that Matthews is the attorney general, but that someone other than Matthews started the removal action by questioning his education, therefore, if the case is to be pressed, it is required that the persons instigating the suit be named.

To date it has not been reported who, if anyone other than Matthews, asked that the suit be filed. Any three voters in Mr. Mullins' district could have questioned his authority to serve on educational grounds.

In his third defense, Mr. Mullins said the defendant (Mullins) denies each and every other allegation contained in the complaint, and affirmatively states that he did complete the eighth grade in the common schools, and that the records of Rockcastle County so reflect.

Mr. Mullins then demanded "that the complaint be dismissed at plaintiff's cost."

In a statement reported last week, Assistant School Superintendent J. Saylor said that Mr. Mullins did not complete the eighth grade. He entered the eighth grade but withdrew.

To date, there has been no indication from Circuit Judge R. T. Tartar whether he will hear the case, or whether it will be in open court, or in chambers. Only attorneys for both sides present. Judge Tartar could postpone it until the July

term of Circuit Court.

If Judge Tartar rules against Mr. Mullins, the Board of Education will appoint a member to serve the remainder of the three-year-eight-month term.

school that we may be able to take care of all our rural schools without an additional building. For example, there are 800 children in our three high schools. If these 800 children were moved into a central high school we would have more than adequate space in our present buildings for all of the children who are now attending rural schools—less than 500 children are now attending rural schools.

"Since our county should have another educational facilities survey by the State Department of Education, I do not think Mullins should be wise to make a commitment which might very well be contrary to the recommendation of that survey."

Mr. Nunnelley did not report when the survey team is expected in Rockcastle. Last week, Assistant Superintendent John L. Saylor reported the survey team probably would come to Rockcastle when it could work the county into its schedule.

New High Expected In Feed-Grain Signup

Current figures for the 1965 feed-grain program sign up indicate a new high in participation, the University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service said today, on basis of returns from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. In Kentucky, 56,577 producers signed for the program, compared to 52,650 for 1964. Acreage is 772,295 for 1965, against 718,412 for 1964.

Nationally, there are 1,378,138 producers signed up so far, about 41,000 higher than the previous high in 1962. Base acreage on enrolled farms is 798 million acres compared to 777 million acres in 1964. These figures include milling barley farms, the USDA said. Without the latter, the program now has 1,373,709 producers signed who intend to divert 341 million acres, within one percent of 1964's 343 million acres.

The signup was extended one week beyond March 26 in most states because of inclement weather. Returns still are being tabulated.

Of the 34.1 million acres for diversion, 23.3 million are in corn base acreages, 3.9 million in sorghum and 3.9 million in barley.

Forest Fires Down First Part of '65

State Natural Resources Commissioner J. O. Matlick has reported that 1965 may be Kentucky's best year so far for forest fire control.

The record of the first three months of the year, Matlick said, shows a decrease of 162 in the number of fires and a 42.4 per cent reduction in acreage destroyed by fire.

"Last year, by the end of March, 690 fires had burned 12,865 acres," Matlick said. "What was a good record, but now we have surpassed it with only 538 fires and 7,294 acres burned during the same period of time."

Matlick pointed out that the official Spring fire season began March 1 and lasts through May 15.

The state's organized fire-protection system covers 101 of the counties and a total of 10.6 million acres of woodlands. The 19 less-wooded counties, not included in the organized system, are protected under a 1,670-man "citizen firefighter" volunteer program, conducted by the Natural division of forestry.

As the system's "backbone," the division currently maintains 50 major pieces of forestry equipment, 154 manned fire-watch towers, 10 fire-weather stations, 60 air-planes, and nearly 60 miles of access roads or fire trails. Firefighters include about 1,100 warden crews and a force of 8,800 men across the state.

"If we are to maintain and, we hope, even improve the record," forestry director Gene

Butcher said, "we will need the cooperation and help of very citizens. For the most part, we have gotten it."

"In particular, that means strict observance of the fire laws and reporting of any violations that anyone might come across."

The basic laws, he noted, are that:

During the spring fire season (March 1-May 15) the only time when fires—for debris burning or other lawful purposes—may be set in the vicinity of woodlands is between 4:00 p.m. and midnight, according to Central Standard or "sun" time.

At all times, persons starting fires must observe all responsible precautions, including a distance of at least 150 feet in all directions from any woodlands or brushland. Fires should be started during prevailing high winds.

Although tobacco farmers and certain others may burn off land, and certain others at any time during the day, they must also comply with the vicinity of woodlands rule and must keep watch over any fires started.

Wood mills and processing plants of any kind which are not entirely closed by fire-proofing or shielding must observe reasonable precautions, start no fire within a distance of 150 feet from woodlands or 100 feet from any sawdust or "slab" (wood reject) piles.

No lighted match, cigarette or other flaming or glowing substance is to be thrown from a moving vehicle or left within the limits of a road right-of-way.

No backfire may be started without the direct supervision and authorization of the forestry officer on private or public property.

Fires to capture or destroy wildlife are forbidden.

Clearing and improperly supervised fires, Butcher emphasized, "needlessly cost human lives as well as property loss. It is important to obey these laws."

"A farmer might see this lower damage and think he had to spray," said Miller, "but probably this lower area feeding was done by weevils that hatched in February and fed for a while and then were killed by a late March cold snap."

Control measures: Use one of the following: Malathion, 50 percent emulsifiable concentrate, one quart in 10 to 12 gallons of water per acre. There is no waiting period after treatment before the crop can be cut or grazed. Methoxychlor, 25 percent emulsifiable concentrate, two quarts in 10 to 12 gallons of water, with a seven-day waiting period before grazing or harvesting.

Guthion, two pounds per gallon emulsifiable concentrate strength, one quart in 10 to 12 gallons of water, with a 21-day waiting period before grazing or harvest.

Diazinon, four pounds per gallon emulsifiable concentrate strength, one quart in 10 to 12 gallons of water with 10-day waiting period before

What to do: (1) Inspect all alfalfa fields now, whether they are newly planted (last fall or old, established). (2) Check the top inch of plants for feeding damage, and check at least four locations in each field; (3) If 10 to 20 percent of the tops of these plants show feeding damage, treat within 10 days; else, the plants likely will never get beyond the top inch of plants.

I met many people through being employed at the funeral home. People seemed to like me because many encouraged me to study and take training for the funeral business. I took their advice and started regular employment after I had completed two years of college at Berea and Eastern Kentucky State College. While I was in college I worked at night and during the summer months. After my two years of college I served two years of apprenticeship and entered The Kentucky School of Embalming at Louisville, Ky. I received my funeral directors and embalmers license and returned to Sparks Funeral Home to follow my profession.

In the years I have worked here I have come in contact with all kinds of death including murders, accidents and natural causes. After studying the human body for a number of years and not being a doctor, I feel that many have died from a cause different than what was put as the cause of death signed by the coroner.

In the State of Kentucky the only qualifications for the office of coroner are: 24 years of age, a resident of Kentucky for 2 years; a resident of the county 1 year, and the precinct for 6 months. There is no requirement for any education. I think the people of this county as well as the state want someone with more than just the bare essentials to be their coroner.

I am asking that you elect me your coroner for the next four years. I am 28 years old, in good health and able to go where ever and whenever I am called. When time comes to appoint a deputy I will appoint a person who is a Republican and not one who changed politics to be appointed deputy.

So I say that I want to be coroner for the qualifications that I think I have over my opponents. Here is my oath to the voters of Rockcastle County:

"If elected to the office of Coroner of Rockcastle County, I swear to perform the duties to the best of my ability. To go when I am called and to thoroughly investigate any death where there is suspicion of foul play or death from any unknown cause."

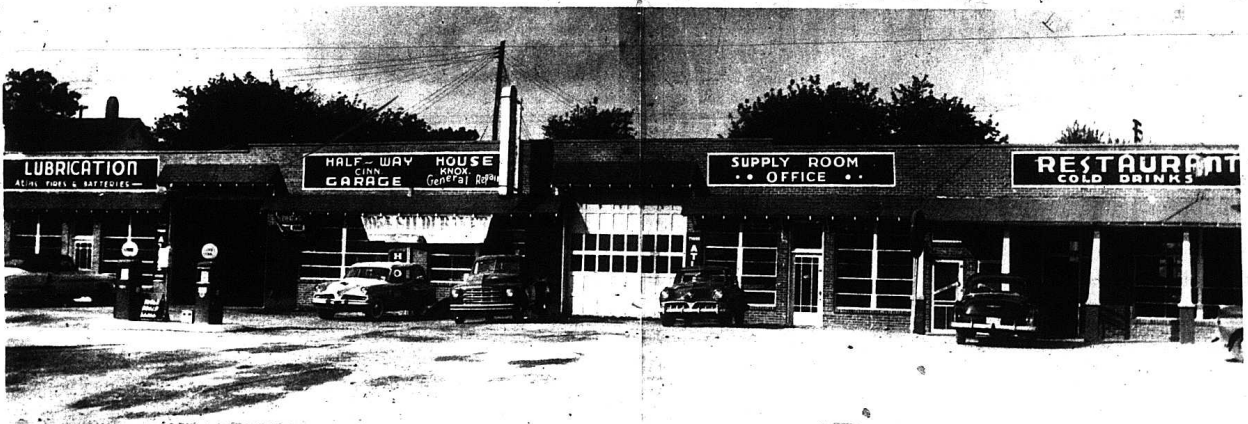

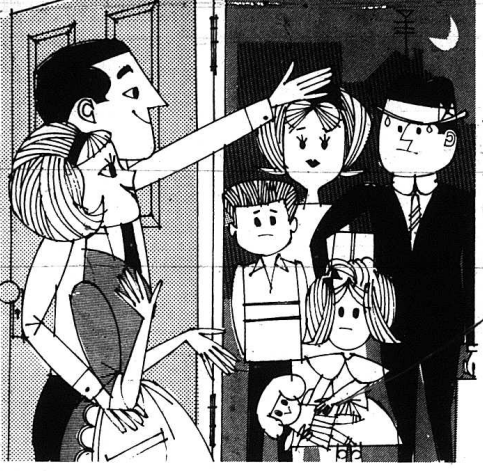
