

Fertilizer On Field No Crop Guarantee

Pouring the fertilizer onto a tobacco field isn't a guarantee of good quality, says Dr. Joe Smiley, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension tobacco specialist.

"If too much nitrogen is used, you may get a rough, thick, late-maturing tobacco with a heavy midrib. Too little nitrogen often causes small leaves, slender stalks, premature firing and low quality. To determine the amount of nitrogen best for the crop, consider past crop performance, fertilization practices, and cropping history."

Barnyard manure and legume cover crops add nitrogen for the crop. The amount applied in this form must be reckoned in determining the total fertilizer requirement. One ton of barnyard manure provides about 6 pounds of available nitrogen to the crop.

Insects Can Attack Your Seed Corn

Corn producers need to know about and control a number of insects that attack seed corn, seedlings and roots of established corn, says Dr. R. L. Miller, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service entomologist.

Not all these pests are a problem every year, he says, but control measures should be known. The insects that are troublesome are the (1) seed-corn beetles and wireworms around seed, and (2) corn rootworms, grubs and certain cutworms that attack roots.

Soil insecticides usually are helpful against these pests. Fields that have been in sod three years or more, or planted to corn several years in succession, are most vulnerable.

Control materials are Al-

drin, Dieldrin, Heptachlor and Diazinon. Two pounds per acre (actual material) of any one of these should be broadcast, then disked in immediately into the top 3 to 4 inches of soil. Row applications require only one pound actual material per acre, put it a little above and not in contact with the seed, nor below the seed.

Insecticide-fertilizer mixtures are not recommended. Placement for fertilizer is different than that of soil insecticides. Insecticide-fertilizer mixes placed two inches above and two inches below the seed will not protect the seed or seedlings stalks from soil insects.

Also, seed-treatment materials will control insects attacking the seed itself but will not control root-or-stalk-feeding insects.

Termite Time

Spring may be the time for romance, but there's one kind of "courtship" that makes homeowners feel anything but romantic. That's the spring-time swarming of termites, which is part of their court-

ship prior to setting up house-keeping, says Dr. Richard Miller, UK Extension entomologist. The only good thing about termites is that it warns homeowners termites are living nearby—and may be moving near you. In spring, some of the winged, reproductive members of each termite colony decide to start their own families. They swarm to locate a place to settle down, and they may pick your home as a likely spot.

If you see termites swarming in or around your home in future weeks, take advantage of the warning, Dr. Miller recommends. Find out if your home has a termite infestation. If so, start control measures immediately—or you'll end up supporting a termite family that may number in the hundreds of thousands.

Termites live in the soil and the workers leave the colonies, by way of earthen tubes, to look for their only food—the cellulose in which wood is the chief and most common source. When they run up against a house foundation, they search out any possible openings and move

into and do necessary control work, he emphasizes.

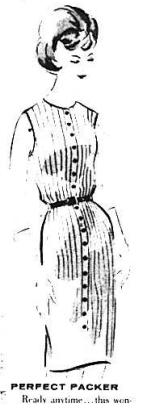

## Storm Damages Area Barns

What may have been a small tornado swept over southwestern Rockcastle County Sunday about sundown causing heavy rains, wind, and damage to property.

The storm caused considerable damage to barns and houses in the area of Level Green.

A short time earlier, extensive damage was reported in several communities of northeastern Pulaski County.

Once the storm left the Level Green area and got into the hills around Mt. Vernon, it became only high winds and rain.

Bill Cox, who keeps the Weather Bureau station at Mt. Vernon, reported 91 of an inch of rain fell as the storm passed. There were no reports of property damage at Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, and Livingston.

Bradley Saylor reported that possibly a small tornado touched down briefly at one area at Level Green.

He reported Junior Denney as saying he heard a roaring sound and saw swirling rain, but that the roar stayed well aloft, possibly indicating the tornado funneled did not touch ground. Visibility in the

area was poor.

Deputy Sheriff Tip Reppert, who investigated, said entrance was gained by breaking a hasp on a door.

## Direct Dialing By July 30

Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston telephone users will be able to dial directly to most points in the Continental United States and Canada this year.

J. H. Crawford, division manager for the Kentucky Telephone Company, said Direct Dialing (DDD) will be introduced here July 30. Crawford said the DDD equipment is presently in the process of being installed in the London Exchange.

The new service will mean Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston persons can call friends or relatives in many cities without the aid of the operator. "It makes long distance calling almost like a local call," Crawford said.

Only station-to-station calls can be made by DDD. If you want to place a person-to-

person call, you still have to work through an operator. To operate DDD, a caller dials "12" to be connected to the new equipment. Then the one digit identifying code which will be assigned to each customer. This one digit "Identifying Code" serves to identify the telephone number from which the call is being placed. Crawford stated, and the call cannot be completed until such code has been dialed. Then the three-number area code of the city to be called is dialed if other than 606. After the specific telephone number is dialed, the called telephone will begin ringing.

The area code here is 606. A map of dialing areas in Kentucky will be included in the November 1965 Telephone Directory.

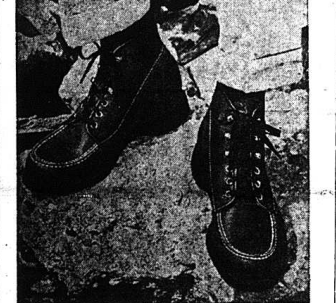

### Mrs. Davis Writes On Library Week

National Library Week has been scheduled to be observed April 25 through May 1, according to Mrs. Phillip Davis, librarian.

Below, Mrs. Davis discusses the library and what it means and could mean to the public.

"April 25 to May 1 has been proclaimed as 'National Library Week.' I wonder if you have stopped to consider just what your library could mean to you. Your library provides in-

formation, recreation, education and peace of mind. Whatever you want to do in life, you can do it better if you draw on the experience of others, as recorded in books.

The accumulated knowledge of the human race is added to with each new book to help you get more from your life.

Remember knowledge is power—every library has a reference section—w o r d s, you'll find them in dictionaries—facts—you'll find them in encyclopedias and almanacs—people—you'll find them in Who's Who and directories—places—you'll find them in atlases.

Books bring the world to your arm-chair. When you want to relax and have fun, you can do anything you want, be anybody you want, go any place in the world you want, live at any time in history—by books. When you feel mentally or emotionally upset, you can use books to achieve a peace of mind. Reading about other people's troubles sometimes helps. Reading exciting stories sometimes gives us an outlet for pent-up desires to "kick over the traces". But more than

this, books can bring you the advice and wisdom of the world's greatest thinkers, philosophers, scientists.

Books are your best friends—they'll help you—they'll entertain you—they'll make you feel good—and they are always there when you want them.

If you read only 15 minutes a day, you would read half a book a week—two books a month—20 books a year—1,000 books in your lifetime—and this is equal to going through college five times—making you a world authority on any subject you choose—taking a trip around the world.

Your library protects one of your most precious possessions—the freedom to know. Its real goal is to provide everyone with access to all the recorded knowledge of mankind.

The slogan for National Library Week is "know what you're talking about—read." Visit your library and get better acquainted with the books."

### Tobacco Beds Need Regular Watering

Tobacco plant beds need water regularly if dry weather marks the period after seeding, says Dr. Joe Smiley, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service specialist.

Seed germination time and immediately after plants are up are the critical times, Smiley says. Unwatered beds during dry weather at these periods frequently result in poor stands. Windy weather, a characteristic of plant-bed seeding time, helps form a soil crust, therefore, plant bed soils may need frequent watering even though fields are too moist to plant.

Frequent watering at germination time is recommended. If the soil surface of the plant is dry, 150 gallons of water per 100 square yards will moisten the surface adequately.

"After plants are established, from 300 to 500 gallons per 100 square yards of bed may be needed each week, Dr. Smiley says, during dry seasons. If fertilizer injury begins to show, and the stand begins to disappear, it is an indication that beds need watering.

### Tobacco Fungus Attacks Plant Beds

Anthracnose, a fungus that attacks tobacco plant beds, probably comes in through surface water running over the site.

This means a well-ditched plant bed has better protection than unditched one, says Dr. Joe Smiley, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service specialist. Best procedure is to have the plant bed raised slightly above surrounding ground, too.

The fungus causes small spots on leaves, reddish brown at first, then papery white. Brown elongated spots appear on the undersides, making the leaf pucker or break. If not killed, plants remain stunted and inactive for long periods. Clear, dry weather checks anthracnose but the fungus can stay active with-in a wide temperature range.

Control: Fungus use 5 level tablespoons per gallon in a spray, or use a 15 percent strength dust. Zincite: Use 2 1/2 level tablespoons in a gallon or a 10 percent strength dust. Manco: Use one level teaspoonful per gallon or a two percent strength dust. Use all sprays at 400 pounds per square inch pressure. Dusts should be applied with a hand-powered crank duster. Spray or dust twice a week until setting.

### New Recruit Program Initiated By Navy

Chief Charles R. Cokerham, local Navy recruiter, has announced a new enlistment program designed to assist young men in the transition from civilian life to military life.

The purpose of the new program is to eliminate doubt of qualification from the minds of interested young men and to provide vocational assistance and direction in choice of technical training prior to being ordered to active Navy duty.

Chief Cokerham encourages High School Seniors and other young men to discuss their military obligations with him. "If found qualified for the '120 Day Program' they can complete all necessary formalities required for enlistment and then be permitted to delay reporting for active duty for up to four months. This will permit those young men still in school sufficient time to complete their high school education and will permit the young man working with no advancement opportunities sufficient time to make adequate no-delay preparations for transition to military life.
