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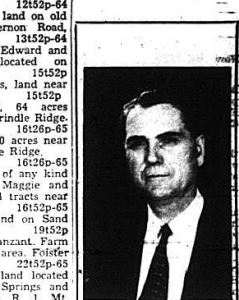

Interstate Water Use In Millions Of Gallons

The Kentucky Stone Company said this week more than 12 million gallons of water from the Rockcastle County area will be needed for Interstate-76 work through the county.

Where the water will come from is uncertain, but probably the Livingston area will be asked to supply most of it.

Reason for the use of so large amount of water is that the interstate from the Cumberland area south to Williamsburg will be concrete instead of asphalt.

Concrete pavement requires 678,000 gallons of water per mile as compared to 350,000 gallons per mile for asphalt.

Coming up with the figures on Interstate work through Rockcastle was J. F. Matthews, assistant sales manager of the Kentucky Stone Company, Louisville. He said water from the Rockcastle area would be used up to about 20 miles. Water from Berea and London would be used in those areas.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Clyde Livinville said when contacted that the City of Mt. Vernon could not furnish so large amount of water from "our small lake."

"The water would probably have to come from Livingston. They have an unlimited supply apparently in the 'boils,' Mayor Livinville said.

Whether the road contractors would want to haul water from Livingston all the way to Conway (for an example) is not known. Probably the contractors would prefer to haul water from Berea. That source would be a question mark.

The announcement of the large amount of water to be used was coupled with the notion that the section from Berea to London, KY 1-75 at Williamsburg, will probably be concrete since

the area is mountainous and cavernous.

The Signal asked in an editorial about two years ago that the state consider concrete in Rockcastle County, pointing out that maintenance is less on concrete, that concrete seems more durable, and the concrete makes a more beautiful road.

Sales Manager Matthews reported that it is doubtful that the company quarry at Mt. Vernon would have to be expanded to produce the 400,000 tons of dense grade aggregate base for the interstate.

He said also that employees would have to be added "only if we go on a double shift."

He reported that the quarry would begin stockpiling gravel in about six months in expectation that it would be used in the area south of Richmond where bids have been called for in grade and drain work. He said the gravel would be used in about a year in that area.

FOR THOSE WHO ASKED
We have not heard much about the proposed Reservoir Valley dam of late. Our last information has it the project is being weighed by state engineers, with a decision from Commissioner Henry Ward due before many days.

We go out on a limb and speculate that the dam will be built, but there are many details to be worked out before the final announcement. Here's hoping!

ANOTHER ONE GONE
We understand that State Trooper John Anderson has now left Rockcastle County for permanent assignment in Monticello. Although State Police officials have not formally announced all the troopers are being withdrawn, it looks very much like they have been. Our guess is that Trooper Gary Godby will be here only a few more days.

THE PROTESTS
Magistrate Wally Phillips came by the office to protest a story in a past issue of the Signal that listed some 24 roads set up by the state this year to be maintained. Looking at the story, we suppose we did not go into enough detail to explain everything, and we suppose it could work to Wally's disadvantage.

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Also joining in the ceremonies at 1:30 p. m. May 15 dedicating the new courthouse, will be Dr. Johann Hoebler, of Washington, D. C. who had much to do with getting federal money for the courthouse. He will accompany Sen. John Sherman Cooper, principal speaker at the dedication, from Washington.

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Fiscal Court Hands Judge Carter Stinging Defeat On Judge's Salary

County Judge Charles C. Carter received a stinging defeat from the magistrates of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a special "salary setting" meeting Monday where the court voted to keep salaries at the same level for the next four years.

The defeat came on a motion made by Judge Carter that the salary of the county judge be set at \$5,000 a year beginning Jan. 1, 1966. The judge now gets \$3,900 plus fees.

The motion died for lack of a second.

There was complete silence for about five minutes. Only the occasional shuffle of feet or the rattle of a paper could be heard.

Judge Carter then told the magistrates, "Well, somebody say something. We have to set these salaries by law. Don't just sit there in silence. Someone make a suggestion."

Again, silence.

"To me," Judge Carter said, "it seems very unfair that clerks in these county offices, and deputy sheriffs who work for the county and the county judge, whom he might be, gets only \$3,900. It doesn't make sense. The county judge must run the court, and take all the responsibility for running the business of the county. Again, I say this is unfair."

Well, speak up one way or another if you want something else, go ahead and say, but let's get this in the books," the judge said.

Magistrate G. H. Griffin then took the floor and said: "Well, I guess I'll do it. I make a motion to set salaries where they've been for the next four years."

His motion was then seconded by Magistrate Henry Cromer. All magistrates voted "yes." Judge Carter said he wanted to record a "no" vote on the motion.

The meeting was then adjourned in silence.

The setting of salaries is a routine four-year job for the county. Most salaries paid are not large. The major county officers get percentages from fees collected by their office.

For example, the county attorney gets \$600 plus fees; the sheriff only fees; the county clerk, \$600 plus fees; the county recorder, only fees. Magistrates get \$50 per month for acting as a trial judge, \$15 per month, usually once a month.

Other salaries are minor. They are: Coroner, \$50 per month; dog warden, \$30 per month; circuit court stenographer, \$25 per month; livestock inspector, \$15 per month. (Dr. Rudolph Burdette does not take this fee); county clerk, \$5 per month; clerk of the Fiscal Court, and \$12.50 per month as clerk of the juvenile court.

At the meeting, the court re-elected George Murphy as county treasurer and kept his salary at \$75 per month.



Moderate Nitrogen

All That's Necessary
Moderate application of nitrogen usually about 125 pounds actual nitrogen per acre are best for quality tobacco production.
Dr. Joe Smiley, University of Kentucky Agriculture Extension Service tobacco specialist, points out that increased emphasis is now on quality burley. Heavy applica-

tions of nitrogen fertilizer reduces quality.
Tobacco with too much nitrogen takes longer to ripen. Usually growers find a few good, ripe leaves present at the bottom of the plant but green, unripe leaves from there up. Such immature are lower quality and not in demand by the manufacturer.
Too much nitrogen also increases the moisture content of the leaves. This prolongs (and complicates) the curing process. Houseburn is a frequent companion of immature tobacco-curing.
Last, excessive nitrogen applications increase soil acidity which may bring manganese toxicity, plus a reduction in availability to the plants
