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**To The Citizens Of
Rockcastle County**



Dear Friend And Voter:

Maybe I haven't seen you and talked about the election with you, but if I haven't it is not because I didn't want to.

You know most of the people want a County Judge to be in his office at all times. They may want advice or to see him about some kind of business. I try to be there all the time to take care of the public.

If I haven't talked with you I would like to tell you about what has been accomplished since I took office three and one-half years ago.

We have bought five new dump trucks, one new gravel loader, a brand new grader, and there has been one new bridge built across Roundstone Creek at Orlando, at a cost of \$125,000. Twenty-seven miles of blacktop has been built and twelve miles of new grade roads built.

The biggest and most important thing is our new courthouse and jail that has cost \$400,000. All of these things without any additional taxes. I'm sure that 90% of the people in the County are just as proud of our new courthouse and jail as I am. Take a good look and see just how beautiful it is. It is the most talked about thing that has ever happened to our County.

Someone may ask how we will pay for it without additional taxes? That is a fair question. First we collect \$6,000 rent for office space, we paid \$900 rent for the health department, \$720 for bookmobile, \$900 welfare department, and \$300 for county agent. These things we don't have to pay for now. We have \$6,000 surplus a year. Add these together and we come up with \$14,820 which takes care of our courthouse bonds.

So we have a new courthouse and jail that we have needed for 25 years without a penny extra cost to the taxpayers.

One of my opponents says I stood in the courthouse door and fought the health department and bookmobile. He knows there is no truth to that. I voted for both of these bills. How reckless can a man get with truth?

I have tried at all times to keep this election above reproach of the voters. I think the time is past for mud slinging by candidates. We now look more at a candidate's qualifications and ability to do things for the benefit of our County.

Our County is now on a business like basis and I think the people appreciate that and want to continue that way.

One of my opponents is saying three of us candidates are officials and have records. That is very true and I am proud of my record. I only have to point my finger at the things set above to prove my record, everything is there to see. No guess work.

Some of my opponents are saying they'll go on bended knees and beg for the state police, they might as well say they will do whatever the state police say. I say no Judge can serve with dignity and honor and let someone else tell him what to do.

I have no fight with the state police, but they should abide by the law the same as any citizen or other official.

Do you want things to go on in a progressive way, or switch and take a chance?

Another thing that my opponents should consider. You, the people, are going to elect 3 sheriffs election day and they have all promised to protect you and patrol the highway. They get \$200 a month paid by the state for patrolling the highways. I believe they will do what they have promised.

What are my opponents trying to say about our sheriff candidates? Are they saying they are no good or won't do their duties? Why elect sheriffs if we have to depend on state police for everything?

I honestly believe and I think everybody else does now, that state police business was just a political shenanigan. They have been here for the past four years without any complaint. Why did they wait until the eve of an election to make this move?

One of my opponents has been police Judge of Mt. Vernon for 8 years and I can prove to him that there has been more robbing, stealing and breaking into the homes of the people in Mt. Vernon than all the rest of the County combined.

Why doesn't he clean up Mt. Vernon before venturing out into the County.

Get that beam out of your eye, Mr. Police judge.

Last week some of the so called "big shots" had a meeting and said we will now go out and tell the people who to vote for, we have to do that to beat Carter.

I think the people of this County are intelligent enough to vote for their choice, not the choice of somebody else.

Next Tuesday is election day, on that day you as a citizen and voter will decide who will be your County Officials for the next four years.

I hope you will decide to vote for me and we will have just one Judge for four more years.

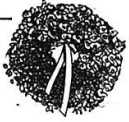

Schools Get \$52,979 In Aid

The White House has approved 97 grants in Kentucky—one for Rockcastle County—for a program that helps preschool children from underprivileged families prepare for school. The official name for this program is "Project Head Start." The Head Start program is set up for eight weeks in July and August for children who will start to school in September. Reserving funds allocated to Rockcastle County is \$52,979, and will aid 300 children. The Office of Economic Opportunity, which administers the antipoverity program, reported that an intensive effort will be made to involve parents in the activities of their children.

Corps Has Plans Set For Office

The opening of a new office in Cincinnati, Ohio, may have an eventual bearing on the fortunes of Rockcastle County. Last week the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers opened an office that could recommend the expenditure of as much as a billion dollars on Appalachian water development. Basically, this means the Corps will now measure water projects from the standpoint of business opportunities, new jobs, land enhancement, and improvement of the tax base. Many of the water projects are in Eastern Kentucky, including two dams on the Rockcastle River. According to Col. John C. H. Lee, who heads the new office: "We are supposed to make a study and report on the impact of Corps projects on the local economy, and we will do that as soon as practical."

Several weeks ago, the Corps reported a study of dams on the Rockcastle River showed the projects to be unfeasible. But the Corps reported it would not report its findings to Congress, but would leave the projects with the possibility that under new criteria established by the Appalachian Act, the dams could become feasible. The Corps spokesman said at the time, a report to Congress that the dams are unfeasible would mean the projects could not come up for study again. When, if ever, the Rockcastle dams will be brought up for re-examination has not been reported.

Children, some of whom have never seen a book or listened to a story, will be exposed to music, books, art, games, and other intellectual endeavors. They will also be fed, given physical tests, and their parents will be informed of available welfare services. Federal officials have estimated the program's cost breaks down to about \$175 per child. The overall total cost of the program in Kentucky is \$3,686,914, for 20,883 children.

Teddy Brown Dies In Wreck

Teddy Ray Brown, 23, of Brodhead, was killed instantly when his car was wrecked on KY 39 west of Crab Orchard. Lincoln County Coroner Carl Speakes reported Brown was killed when his car left the road, struck 100 feet from Dix River Bridge and crashed into the bridge wall. There were no other vehicles involved. The coroner said Brown apparently went to sleep at the wheel, or lost control of the car when the right front tire blew out. Speakes said the tire was punctured from the inside, with the condition of the tire after it was wrecked did not permit proper examination. Brown was a native of Brodhead, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Brown. He was recently discharged from the Army, and was employed at the Palm Beach Company, Danville, where he was considered one of the most popular employees. Besides his parents, he is survived by one sister and two brothers: Mrs. Bonnie Halcomb of Brodhead, Eddie Brown, young Brown's twin, with the Army in Hawaii, and David Brown of Brodhead, as well as his grandfather, Jim Burke, of Brodhead.

Funeral services were conducted May 18 at the Brodhead Baptist Church with Bro. Cornelius Horn officiating. He was buried in Piney Grove Cemetery. Watson Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

JUDGE TARTAR ALSO SPEAKS

Sen. John Sherman Cooper dedicated the new Rockcastle County Courthouse as a symbol of justice to the individual and faith in the nation at ceremonies Saturday in the Circuit Courtroom. Senator Cooper told his audience that it is his hope that the men and women in his audience "will instill in the hearts of those who come after a love of justice and faith in the worth of the individual."

The senator traced briefly what he called the "roots of our system of government," and related how current jurisprudence is derived from Roman and Anglo-Saxon law.

Senator Cooper said many opportunities now, and in the future, await the citizens and young people of Rockcastle County, but he warned that even with all the good things of life "in this most prosperous time in our history, we should not forget to give continuing thought to producing free men—men and women who believe in our free way of life and the justice for which the courthouse stands."

Generally, the courtroom was nearly filled for the ceremonies presided over by County Judge Charles C. Carter. Some seats were vacant, but there were many persons standing in the many outside the courtroom. Some of the audience left when they found the air conditioning was not up to expectations.

Just prior to the ceremonies, Bro. George Murphy officially opened the doors of the courthouse in a ribbon-cutting ceremony. His official statement will be found in another column on this page. Preceding Senator Cooper's speech, Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar said the dedication of the courthouse is a symbol of orderly government, and that without orderly government, a stable social order, the nation will die.

"We talk of Communism," Judge Tartar said. "But the great threat today is creeping crime that threatens to corrode and destroy. We must be alert to this threat."

He said in the court is to be found the tools with which to judge a man's guilt. Judge Tartar called the new courthouse a "Temple of Justice" and said it is a "mighty thrill to stand in (Continued on Page 6)

Ministers see farm methods. The ministers of Rockcastle County churches were conducted on a tour Monday, to see soil and water conservation practices that have been applied by county farmers.

The supervisors of the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District were hosts to the county ministers on a tour that is a four-day Soil Stewardship Week designated nationally as May 22 through 30. Soil and water conservation practices such as nine year old short leaf and white pine tree seedlings; alfalfa with chair timothy as a permanent hay crop; stock water tanks, spring development, tile drainage, diversion channels and sod waterways. They were with the group on the tour.

The tour concluded with lunch at Belly Acres Restaurant and a short program. W. E. Proctor, chairman of the district supervisors, was in charge of the meeting. Jim Hill, field representative of the Division of Soil and Water Resources, showed a film "The Earth Is The Lord's."

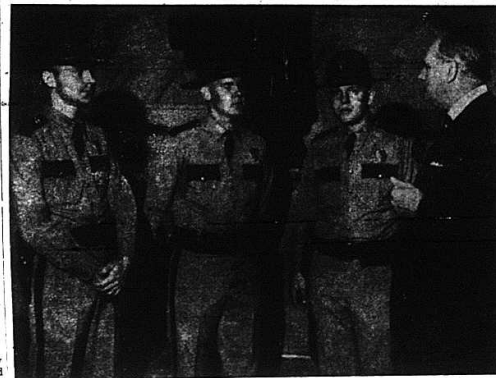

National Forest To Charge Fees

The Cumberland National Forest will soon join other federal agencies in charging a small entrance fee to certain developed recreation areas, according to Robert F. Collins, forest supervisor.

Supervisor Collins stressed that no charge will be made to visitors entering a Cumberland National Forest. He (Collins) explained that only designated recreation areas in camping or picnic facilities identified with a Land and Water Conservation Fund sign will require an entrance fee.

Designated charge areas on the National Forest for this year beginning June 7 are: Riddburn Hollow (Rowan County); Bee Rock (Pulaski County); Rockcastle Recreation Area (Laurel County); and Big Meadow Campground (McCreary County).

Hunting, fishing, hiking, exploring, and scenic enjoyment activities on the National Forest remain free of charge. Picnicking and camping at minor and unimproved sites will also continue to be free.

Revenue from these areas will be used to provide additional Federal recreation areas and to assist the States in planning, acquiring, and developing outdoor recreation areas and facilities.

E And H Bonds

The sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Rockcastle County for March were \$3,071 while sales for the first quarter reached \$20,328 or 26.8 percent of the annual goal of \$75,000.

In Kentucky, sales for the month were \$4,504,908 and cumulative sales reached \$14,282,290 or 26.6 percent of the \$54,000,000 annual goal. Nationally, the sales of Series E and H Bonds for the same month were \$414 million. The cash value of both reached \$48,620 million or a total of \$26.8 million since the beginning of 1965.

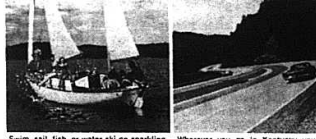
