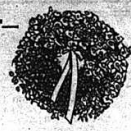

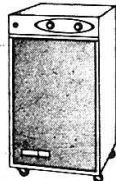

NOTICE CREDIT BUREAU

We have been operating the Credit Bureau for only one month and already we have heard people say "You are trying to Ruin my credit or You had better not ruin my Credit." Let it be known at the start that we DO NOT RUIN ANYONE'S CREDIT. We do keep the records of the people's credit in the County, and we let the Merchants who are members of the Credit Bureau know how you have taken care of your credit in the past.

If you have not taken care of your credit in the past then You and Only You have hurt your credit. We try to be fair to everyone and when a Merchant turns in an account for collection then we notify that person and give ten (10) days for that person to give a reply. If he does not reply in the 10 days then we can assume that he does owe the debt and has not taken care of his credit like he should have. At the end of the month or at different intervals, those that have not given us a reply or made arrangements with the Merchant or us, their names are sent to the Credit Bureau Merchants.

We have not (and I doubt if we ever will) received any complaint from a person who has taken care of his credit because this helps that person get more credit when he needs it. If you have any question concerning the Credit Bureau come in and see us.

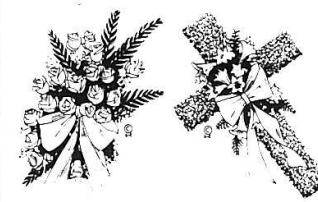

DeMARCUS OUSTS BAKER

Two symbols of strict law enforcement in Rockcastle the past four years—Wayne VanHook and Tip Reppert—won smashing victories in Tuesday's primary election.

The polite, soft-spoken VanHook, incumbent deputy sheriff, defeated three other candidates, including incumbent County Judge C. C. Carter, to become county judge.

VanHook's majority over Judge Carter was 202 votes. He received a total of 1,122 votes. Judge Carter got 920 votes. Larnie Durham received 801 votes, and Earl Nichols got 453 votes.

Hard-working, even tempered Tip Reppert, incumbent deputy sheriff, moved up to the top law enforcement job in the county by defeating Judge Sam Hodges, who received 1,103 votes in a race that was expected to be close in the closing days. Reppert got 1,513 votes, while Hodges got 1,303 votes, and Jesse L. Baker received 393.

The election of VanHook and Reppert no doubt created an ill wind for the traffic violator, the hot-rodder, and the loud muffler boys. Both have cooperated closely with State Police in traffic law enforcement.

Their election also probably heralds the return of a full force of State Troopers. The troopers left the county one by one in the last few weeks because of what they called "lack of cooperation" from county officials.

In the race for representation of the 60th District, incumbent Harold DeMarcus, won a landslide victory over Monroe Baker of Mt. Vernon. Many had predicted Baker would win after a campaign that had seen DeMarcus defeated in the press. DeMarcus defeated Baker 1,820 votes.

In Rockcastle, DeMarcus got 1,521 votes. Baker got 1,247. In Lincoln County, DeMarcus received 851, and Baker 41.

DeMarcus will face Democrat E. C. Mullins in the general election this fall. Mullins defeated his opponent, Oakley Lanham by 1,417 votes. Mullins' total was 1,693. Lanham had 276 votes.

In the county attorney race, as expected, incumbent James W. Lambert, won a lopsided 889 vote victory over his opponent Atty Carl Caritz. Lambert received 1,927 votes. Caritz received 1,038.

In one of the big surprises of the election, incumbent County Clerk Charles Carter went down to a narrow defeat at the hand of politician, Brenda Sue Mason, service station owner, who campaigned from house to house, and who admittedly (Continued on Page 2)

'Head Start' Program Underway Here Soon

Kindergarten centers are being set up in the four county consolidated schools and will be opened June 16 as the Head Start program gets underway.

Last week the federal government allocated \$52,979 for the Head Start program in Rockcastle County, expected to benefit 300 pre-school children.

The kindergarten centers will be at Mt. Vernon, Livingston, Brothead, and Roundstone.

Although the program is intended to help children from underprivileged families, the kindergartens will be open to any pre-school child who is eligible to start to school in the first grade, which is six years old by Dec. 31, 1965.

Children from anywhere in the county will be transported to the center in their school district. They will arrive at the school at 9 a. m., and leave at 2 p. m.

Everything will be furnished to the student free of charge.

In addition to learning activities, the child will receive free medical, dental, and social services. Each child will be insured, and will receive a free hot lunch each day. All supplies, toys, and materials will be furnished.

According to Mrs. Neureul Miracle, superintendent, the school administration is hopeful that residents of the county will take an active interest in the program. The success of the program lies in the initiative of the people of each community, she said.

Mrs. Miracle listed several specific purposes of the federally sponsored program. They are:

(1) To provide the necessities to equip children with readiness for school, and to make them look forward to starting to school.

(2) To provide experiences which will enable the child to make happy social adjustments to school life.

(3) To establish desirable and lasting health habits and (Continued on Page 3)

 (4) To detect and correct physical defects.
 (5) To provide balanced meals and develop desirable eating habits.

 Letters of explanation and registration forms have been sent out to parents of potential preschoolers by school principals. Beetles, Slugs In Tobacco Beds

The tobacco grower is meeting a couple of old stand-bys pests in plant beds again, the fire beetles and slugs and snails.

Dr. R. L. Miller, U. K. Agriculture Extension Service entomologist, says:

Fire beetles: Treat first when plants are in the two to six-leaf stage and again 14 days later with 50 percent strength wettable powder DDT at the rate of six tablespoonsful in three gallons of water per 100 square yards of bed.

If dust is preferred, use the 10 percent strength DDT dust at a half pound actual material per 100 square yards of plant bed.

Slugs and snails: Our wet spring has been ideal for development of these pests. Use metaldehyde bait (ready prepared) at two pounds per square yard of bed. Spread bait evenly over the ground in the evening. Keep baits off plants as much as possible.

Parathion one percent strength dust will control these pests, at two pounds per bed site. However, this material is highly toxic to humans and animals and should be applied by trained operators, or with extreme care by growers.
