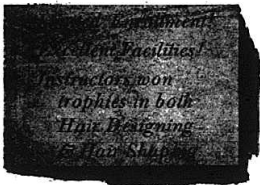

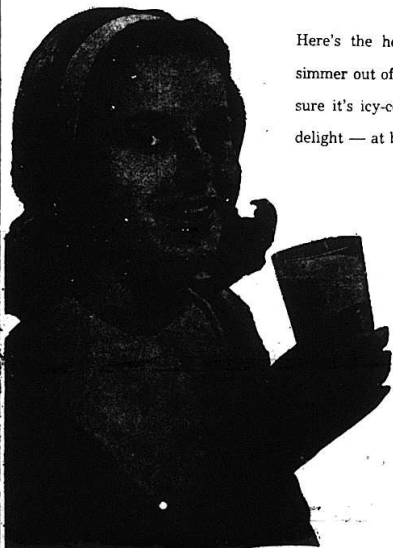

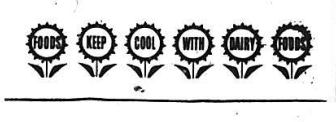

# Renfro Valley Dam Approved

## Next Step Get Money

By Ray McClure

There are very few things these days that are free. This was never more evident than after listening to State Highway Department officials discussing the Renfro Valley dam last Friday at Frankfort.

As Highway Commissioner Henry Ward stated several weeks ago, the Renfro Valley Dam and Lake is "no pond behind the road. It is one of the largest and most complicated projects ever undertaken by the Highway Department."

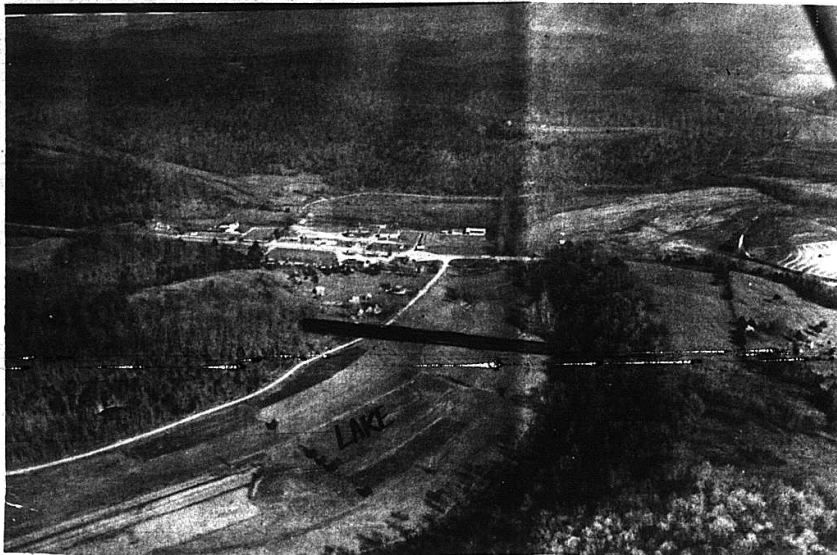
It will also be the largest project the City of Mt. Vernon has ever undertaken, both physically and financially, and it will take courage, resolution, and determination by both the city and the people who live here to see it through to a successful conclusion.

But regardless of the dam, the simple fact is that Mt. Vernon must have more water. Rationing could not affect this summer. The new sewer system will not function properly without more water.

With these two things in mind, the entire matter could boil down to two questions: Can the city afford to carry through on its water program? Can it afford not to carry through?

Just how much will it cost to go "all the way" on the Renfro Valley Dam? No exact figures as yet are available, but a general cost can be arrived at. The city will take one step of its program at a time.

It will cost \$5,000 for a geological survey. This survey will probably be done by Vogt-Vernon Consulting Engineering firm, and will be a more detailed study of the

Valley than one recently completed by that firm and paid for by the state.

When the final geological survey, which is a routine study demanded by the Federal Bureau of Road is complete, the city must commit itself for \$35,000 to design the dam. The State Highway Department does not build dams. It does build bridges. A private engineering firm will have to design and engineer the dam through an outside contract. Since the

dam is for the city, the SHD purchase land to be under figures for the city should foot the bill on the design.

Next (or meanwhile), the city must find out how much it will need to borrow to up with money to re-locate

the roads that will be under water, and make all necessary route changes and connections. This could run to \$100,000 - or more.

Then when the lake is in, the city must come up with about \$140,000 for an addition to the water treatment plant. That is why the lake is needed in the first place.

## City Must Act With Speed, If Dam Is To Be Constructed

A dam on Renfro Creek in Renfro Valley, that will create a 400-acre lake, is feasible and can be constructed, the State Highway Department announced last week.

In the same breath, the SHD summoned the sponsoring agency—the City of Mt. Vernon—to Frankfort to detail the project, and to determine if the city can raise the necessary money to pay its share of the costs.

Mayor Clyde Lunville gave the department the green light to go ahead and plan for the dam.

At the same meeting, the SHD said a smaller lake under consideration on Town Branch in Mt. Vernon is also feasible from an engineering standpoint, but that the city's share of the cost could be prohibitive.

When the third bid of information, the SHD said Rockcastle County could expect a speed-up of Interstate-75 construction from Richmond to Burnsville, with the possibility that some preliminary work, such as clearing right-of-way, coming before the year is out.

But the dam on Renfro Creek a short distance south of US 25 was the big news of the meeting for local people.

Highway personnel joined with several persons from Rockcastle to discuss the 80-foot-high, 1,200-foot-long dam, that would form a lake to furnish the City of Mt. Vernon with water, along with water for recreation (boating, fishing, swimming).

Henry Ward, told the group a decision had to be made immediately so the highway department could plan for the dam. He said time was of the greatest importance.

He reported the city would first have to come up with \$5,000 for a detailed geological survey. As soon as the survey is completed (about a month), the city will have to be ready with, or have written assurance for, \$35,000 for the design of the dam.

He said during the interval, between the surveys completion and design, the city would have to show it has the money to purchase land that will be unattended by the dam. LA look at the financial problems associated with the dam as in another story on this page.

## FARMERS TRY FOR QUALITY BURLEY

Burley tobacco growers should devote all their efforts this year toward producing high quality tobacco rather than toward obtaining maximum yields per acre, according to Mr. Freeman Hocken-smith, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee.

He pointed out that 1965 per acre yields will not be used in establishing tobacco farm poundage quotas under the recently authorized acreage-poundage program.

The Chairman explained that the tobacco acreage-poundage legislation enacted by the Congress earlier this year provides that the Secretary of Agriculture shall, not later than January 1, 1965, consult with representatives of the Burley tobacco industry—including growers, farm organizations and cooperative associations—to obtain their recommendations and determine the need for an acreage-poundage program for Burley similar to or a modification of the 1965-66 acreage-poundage program.

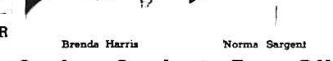
An acreage-poundage program would not become effective for Burley tobacco unless favored by more than two-thirds of the Burley growers voting in a special referendum.

The acreage-poundage legislation further provides that farm yields used in determining poundage quotas shall be based on the simple average per acre yield for the three highest years of the first crop year 1958-63 or of 1960-64. The law makes no provision for including 1965 yields in determining farm yields under acreage-poundage.

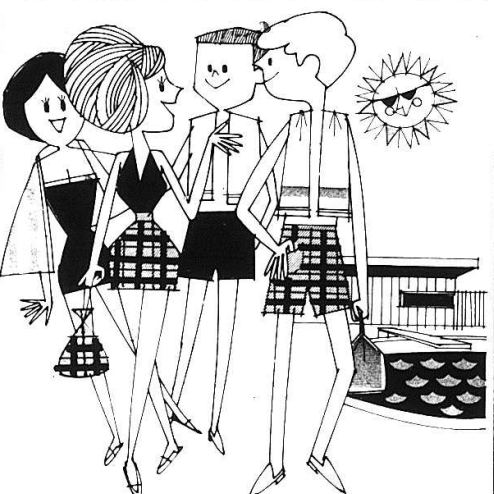

 or other, was not discussed in detail. It is presumed that the water would be acquired through the issuance of bonds, or from a federal grant.

Mr. Tinder made it clear at the meeting the SED is interested in the lake being used for recreational and wildlife purposes, as well as for a city water supply. He noted that tourism in Kentucky is being helped by the addition of lakes for boating, swimming, and fishing.

A look at the feasibility report issued by Vogt-Viers, Cincinnati engineering firm, shows that a dam serving as a roadbed for Interstate-75 across Renfro Creek would cost about \$33,000 less than a bridge.

A dam across Town Branch would cost about \$17,000 more than a bridge.

Mr. Tinder said the \$33,000 savings could serve as a cushion in case dam construction ran more than anticipated. He also said it was possible that the Federal Bureau of Roads might allow the \$33,000 savings to be applied to the \$40,000 for the dam design and the geological survey.

"I will check with the Bureau, but I would not want you to put too much hope that the Bureau would pick up the tab. With this doubt, I would suggest you people go ahead with getting together your \$40,000. After all, \$40,000 is not much as your

ject without federal money if necessary.

"We want all the water we can get in Laurel County, and we'll give you the necessary commitment in writing," Mr. Edwards said.

Following the meeting, Mr. Tinder said work on the Renfro dam would "go along" with normal work on I-75.

Adding these figures you get \$483,000. But with some help from various state agencies, the figure possibly could be cut to about \$400,000.

Where will the money come from? Shortly, the city will be asked to show with written facts and figures that it has the money available through a federal agency or a private agency.

If it is a bond program, the city will have to show how it plans to get the revenue to pay off the bonds. It is doubtful the city can borrow money on the water works, since the water works is already mortgaged for the new sewer system. It is unlikely the government would issue a second mortgage on the water works-sewer system.

If the Appalachian Bill ever gets rolling, Mt. Vernon is eligible for a 100 per cent grant for the entire project, since the water is to be used by a municipality. But no one, even in Washington, knows what happened to the bill passed by the House. But it would be disheartening if the city went into debt for the project, then a few weeks later was offered free money. If that happened, the city could not take the money because it would have already spent it to finance the project on its own.

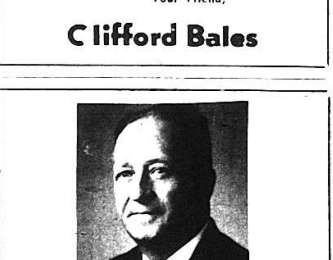
