City OKs Development Plan

A workable community development program that will extend over a period of years was approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council in a 5 to 1 vote at a regular meeting Thursday night.

The city will have complete say on how the community will be improved. Only help from the state would be in technical advice and assistance.

County Budget Total \$126,382

A budget of \$126,382 to run the county the coming fiscal year has been approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and the State Department of Finance.

Broken down, the budget lists the following appropriations: General government, \$26,525; protection to person and property, \$4,500; health and sanitation, \$450; hospital, charities, and corrections, \$5,325; libraries and other educational activities, \$3,020; debt service, general fund, \$525; miscellaneous, general fund, \$10,141; highways, \$20,000; and other funds, \$52,886.

In the \$52,886 listed as other funds are the following: Hospital bonds fund, \$16,550; forestry, \$4,139; health, \$8,275; forestry, \$1,800. Another item is listed as \$2,122 and is earmarked as rent to the Courthouse Corporation.
