offer three educational opportunities for the centurians for students wishing to pursue a four-year academic program leading to a baccalaureate degree may take two years, or up to 67 hours of work toward a degree in the College of Arts and Sciences, Agriculture and Home Economics, Engineering, Law, Education, Commerce, Pharmacy, Medicine or Dentistry. One year of work is offered toward a degree in professional nursing.

The second opportunity lies in the associate degree program of technical or semi-professional courses to be offered to residents of the Somerset area. These include two-year terminal programs in secretarial science and in forestry. The second year of the forestry program will be taught at the University of Kentucky Wood Utilization Center at Quicksand.

The third function of the Somerset Community College will be to offer continuing educational opportunities for residents of the area. These may include such cultural offerings as concert series, dramatic productions, exhibits, visiting lecturers and travelogues, and educational courses ranging from activities that serve hobbies and individual interests to provision for adult education and seminars, all of which can be arranged as the needs and desires of the community dictate.

Fees at the college will be \$125 per semester, plus \$30 to \$40 for books and supplies, or a sum for the year which has been described as no greater than the cost of the senior year of high school. Information on loans, scholarships, and the College Work-Study Program under the Economic Opportunity Act of

Leaf Miner Attack

Hits, Poplar, Magnolia

A tiny, black mout-beetle known as a leaf miner, is now attacking tulip poplars and magnolias in Kentucky, says Dr. R. L. Miller, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service entomologist.

The beetles, which eat holes in the leaves, hatched out from just tulip poplar trees. They will attack tulip poplars but like magnolias as well, Dr. Miller said. The tiny beetles are strong fliers.

Use the 50 per cent strength wettable powder of Dieldrin at one tablespoonful per gallon of water, or the wettable powder of Malathion at two tablespoonfuls per gallon of water, or one tablespoonful of the Malathion emulsifiable concentrate in a gallon of water. Spray foliage to runoff stage.

The beetles will attack magnolias during June.

Follow label directions and safety precautions carefully, as these two materials are toxic to humans.

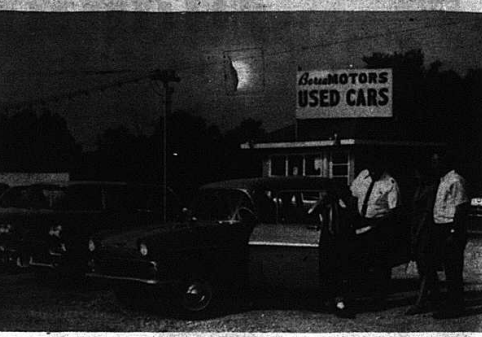
Caution Recommended Treating Armyworms

The armyworm pest, a small worm that feeds principally on small grains, has invaded bluegrass pastures in central Kentucky and other scattered locations in the state.

That brings a quick caution from Dr. R. L. Miller, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service entomologist, about spraying in pastures to kill these pests.

"There are only two materials recommended for control of the armyworm in pastures," he said, "Sevin and Malathion. Growers must not use any other materials than one of these two. I issue this caution because when armyworms are in small grains, the materials Toxaphene and Dieldrin are allowed in spraying. But toxaphene and Dieldrin are absolutely not permitted on pastures to kill the armyworm. Horse farm operators and dairy farmers should exercise extreme care to make sure that only Sevin or Malathion is used on pastures."

Miller recommends the

four-pound strength Sevin flowable material, at three pints in 16 to 20 gallons of water for an acre of pasture. If Malathion is desired, use the 57 per cent strength emulsifiable concentrate at the rate of one and two-thirds pints per acre in 15 to 20 gallons of water. Boom-type sprayers with flat fan-type nozzles are recommended. Use the T-jet 8000 nozzle tip with 50-mesh screen. Tractor speed should be four miles per hour, pressure at 30 pounds per square inch on the sprayer, and the booms from

17 to 20 inches above the ground.


The worms are three-fourths of an inch long or longer, dark colored with lighter bands down the sides and back. They feed on all parts of the pasture grass, then migrate to other areas for new food sites. They'll be around

two or three weeks, Dr. Miller says.

After pastures are sprayed, horses should be kept off the pasture for three days, dry cows one day. There is no waiting period for beef cattle after spraying pastures against the armyworm, Dr. Miller said.



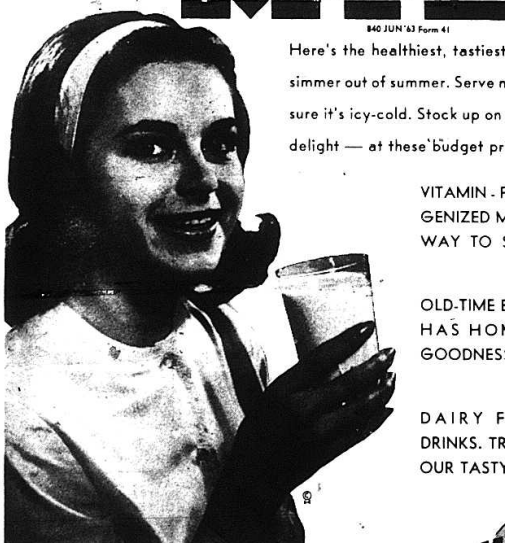

Forest Rate Revised For All Recreation

A standard rate has been established for all United States Forest Service designated recreation areas, according to Robert F. Collins, Forest Supervisor of the Cumberland National Forest.

Starting July 1, four Cumberland National Forest recreation areas will initiate a charge of \$6c per person for picnicking and 50c for entrance to camping areas in the Forest, for the designated areas only. Children under 18 years old will be admitted free.

A seasonal ticket can be purchased for \$1.25, good for one person on the Cumberland National Forest, or a \$7.00 sticker can be purchased to include everyone in an automobile for any Federal area designated in the United States.

Those areas in Kentucky which are on the Cumberland National Forest are Rodburn Hollow, in Rowan County; Bee Rock, Pulaski County; Rockcastle Recreation Area, Laurel County; and Big Meadows Campground on the Rock Creek trout stream in McCreary County. Supervisors Collins stressed that the entrance fee is for these designated areas only and does not apply to the many other smaller recreation areas provided on the Cumberland National Forest and does not apply for other uses and recreation enjoyment.

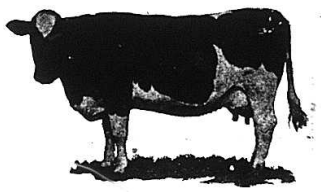
