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

THERE WAS FUN IN THE SUN --

Hundreds See Parade, Horses, Princess At Dairy Day Frolic

The day was warm and pleasant. The children ran, played, pigged, and drank pop and milk.

The oldesters gathered on the south side of Main Street out of the bright sun and to watch the ceremonies.

A call bawled occasionally over the loudspeakers.

Such were the sights and sounds as Rockcastle County celebrated its fifth annual Dairy Day at Mt. Vernon Friday.

One of the largest crowds (there were seven different estimates) was on hand to watch a parade, hear Renfro Valley Bandstand talent, and see Miss Kean Innes, current Kentucky Dairy Princess crowned Miss Patsy Barrett, 1965 Rockcastle Dairy Princess.

Miss Barrett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Barrett of Seaford Cane, was her cousin over two other contestants: Miss Virginia Payne and Miss Linda Houston.

Second big winner of the day was the Andrew H. Cox Jr. family of Renfro Valley, who were named the 1966 Outstanding Dairy Farm Family. They were presented a trophy by Roy G. Brown, representative of the Cumberland Production Credit Association.

Mr. and Mrs. Cox, their daughter, Juanita, 14, and son, Bobby, 14, live on a 110-acre farm. They also have 180 acres of other farms and in the county. Mrs. Cox teaches school.

The farming operation includes 1.66 acres of tobacco, four acres of alfalfa, three acres of silage, and the balance in hay and pasture. They have already stored 3,260 bushels of hay.

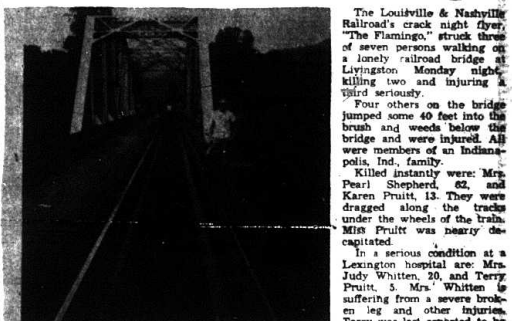
THAT'S NOT NEWS

Two Killed, 5 Hurt When Train Plows Into Family Crossing Railroad Bridge



The Louisville & Nashville Railroad's crack night flyer, "The Flamings," struck three of seven persons walking on a lonely railroad bridge at Livingston Monday night, killing two and injuring a third seriously. Four others on the bridge jumped some 40 feet into the brush and weeds below the bridge and were injured. All were members of an Indianapolis family.

Killed instantly were: Mrs. Pearl Shepherd, 62, and Karen Pruitt, 13. They were dragged along the tracks under the wheels of the train. Miss Pruitt was nearly decapitated.

In a serious condition at a Lexington hospital are: Mrs. Judy Whitten, 20, and Terry Pruitt, 5. Mrs. Whitten is suffering from a severe broken leg and other injuries. Terry was last reported to be suffering from a severe head injury and other injuries, but improving.

Two treated for cuts, bruises, and undetermined injuries in the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital were: Joann Pollard, 20, Mrs. Pauline Pruitt, 41, mother of the dead girl, and Ernie Whitten, brother of Mrs. Whitten. All were taken to Indianapolis Tuesday.

The accident occurred about 11 p. m. on the railroad bridge at the south city limits of Livingston.

Two of Mrs. Shepherd's sons, James, 27, and Arvin Earl, 26, reported the family to the police. They also use some of a relative Alvin Eversole south of the bridge when the accident occurred. The boys were travelling alone in a second car and arrived at the scene about an hour after the accident.

There is no auto bridge across the Rockcastle River at that point, and the family crossed around the curve and on to the bridge. Apparently, the group became confused by the sudden noise of the train and the men were rushing to distinguish on which of the two-tracks the train was running.

James Shepherd reported the family had been in Bond in Jackson County at the home of Arthur Matthews so attend the funeral of Mrs. Oscar Carmichael, a relative. He said the women drove immediately from Bond to Livingston, but he and his brother-in-law were before coming to Livingston.

Few, if any, of the passengers aboard the steamliner knew the accident. Engineer Charles Haggard of Covington told Staff Trooper Gary Godbey where he came around the curve (southbound) and the lights of the train struck the bridge. (Continued on page 2)

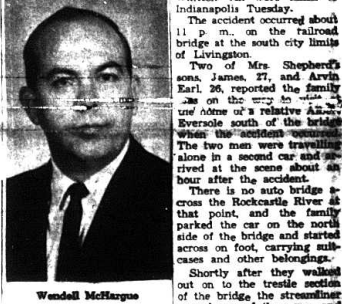
Levitt and White who were riding in one auto and Carl Edridge were admitted to the hospital. All are reported in good condition. The hospital did not disclose the nature of their injuries.

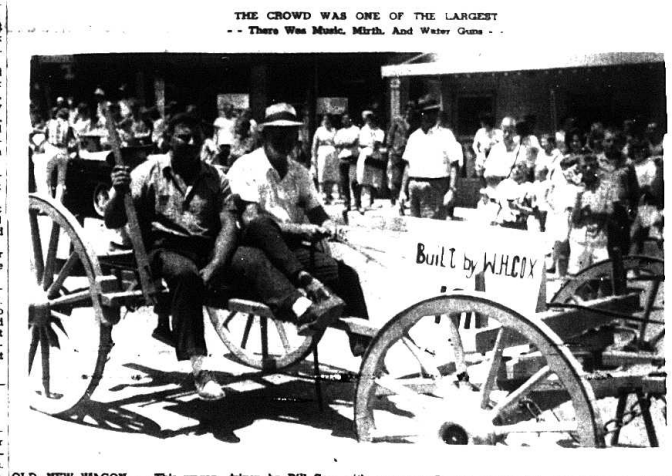
