STATE HIGHWAY REPORTS WORK

The first report of work done on rural Rockcastle roads has been issued by John E. Housner, maintenance foreman for the State Highway Department in Rockcastle County.

The report covers at one year period from July 1, 1964 through June 30, 1966. It shows that 529.8 miles of traffic bound rural roads were graded; 12.7 miles of traffic bound rural roads were patched, using 12,715 tons of No. 9 stone and 34,370 gallons of oil, as well as the 1,849 tons of No. 9 stone used to patch and seal rural blacktop roads.

A total of 594 feet of reinforced concrete pipe were installed on rural roads, and 70.7 miles of rural roads were ditched.

The report did not include the construction of new rural roads, or new blacktop.

Cpl. Brock Dies When Plane Slams Into Mountain Peak

The oldest of 12 children of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Brock, former of Brohead, was among 72 marines and 12 crewmen killed June 25 in the crash of an Air Force jet on takeoff from El Toro Marine Air Base, Santa Ana, Calif.

He was Marine Cpl. James T. Brock, 26, a seven-year veteran of the Marine Corps. The four-engine C-119 cargo plane, Hawaii-bound, had slammed into a mountain ridge and disintegrated, killing all 84 aboard.

The corporal's mother reported he telephoned her right before the crash to say he would be en route to South Viet Nam the following morning and that he was mailing a suitcase for safekeeping.

His mother is the former Lula Spoonmore, daughter of Mrs. Henrietta Spoonmore of Brohead. His father is formerly of the Negro Creek area of the county.

Clean Up Time

Keeping the new Rockcastle Courthouse clean is a big job with a plain mop and broom, so the Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to buy a vacuum cleaner and scrubber-polisher to help do the job.

The court purchased the two automatic machines from Ratford Herrin, representing Electroflux, for \$496.81.

SET MEETING FRIDAY NIGHT

The second attempt in five days by the Mt. Vernon City Council to approve a contract with the State Highway Department to construct a dam on Renfro Creek at Renfro Valley, failed Tuesday night when only three councilmen appeared at a special meeting.

Four councilmen are needed before a meeting can be officially open. The three councilmen who did appear at the meeting immediately called another session for 7:30 p. m., Friday.

Appearing at the meeting were Councilmen Charles Hines, Charles "Chuck" Baker, and Ed Winstead. Unable to attend were Councilmen Bob Jasper, Lance Dillingham and Carl Kelley. Mr. Jasper is on a tour of Ohio with businessmen and farmers. Mayor Clyde Linnville reported Mr. Kelley was working as a service station at Livingston and could not leave work. Mr. Dillingham and the councilman waited about an hour-and-a-half and adjourned.

Mayor Linnville and the councilman stayed about an hour-and-a-half and adjourned. If a dam to provide a 400-acre lake is to be constructed at Renfro Valley, the council must enter into a contract with the State Highway Department, setting down the responsibilities of both the Department and the city.

The state is waiting for the contract before going ahead with a geological survey and design for the dam. Although the contract will be considered binding, the city could withdraw if it found that the money for its share of the costs could not be obtained.

At the regular council meeting Tuesday night, the council made its first attempt to bring the contract before the council finally decided to wait until a special meeting Tuesday night when the council could attend and discuss the contract with the council.

The Tuesday night meeting could not legally open until four councilmen appeared. Only three attended.

At the moment, it appears the contract will finally go to a vote Friday night, since Mr. Jasper will have returned from Ohio.

The 80-foot-high, 1,200-foot-long dam that would be constructed across Renfro Creek just south of U.S. 26 would form a 400-acre lake that would furnish water to the City of Mt. Vernon, and would replace a bridge over the creek.

Although the project in its entirety is expected currently to cost about \$480,000 over a five year period, it is believed that the city can obtain grants from various governmental agencies that will bring its share of costs down considerably. Several agencies have indicated verbally that grant money will be made available, according to Mayor Linnville.
