A new highway beginning at Mt. Vernon and running through Somerset, Monticello, Burkesville, and around Lake Cumberland, was approved by the Appalachian Regional Commission Wednesday.

The approval of the new highway came suddenly with an announcement from Sen. John Sherman Cooper, Sen. Thurston Morton, and Rep. Tim Lee Carter, and caught local officials off guard.

The new road will be two-lane, with a third lane for passing on hills will generally follow KY 90 from Burkesville to Monticello, to Somerset, and possibly KY 70 to a point where it would intersect with US 150. Just where that intersection with US 150 would be remains until the survey. First guesses after the announcement was that it would join with US 150 at a point west of Mt. Vernon, then follow US 150 to either the Burr or Renfro Valley interchanges of Interstate-75. In short, the new lake is the direct route to Lake Cumberland from I-75.

If the new road joins US 150 at the Renfro Valley interchange, then US 150 would have to be re-located west of Mt. Vernon. But there is the possibility that it will meet US 150 and run as US 150 now runs to the Burr interchange. There is also the possibility of a new corridor coming into Mt. Vernon from a third direction.

The distance of the highway is estimated at 100 miles. The "around-lakes" road now brings the proposed Renfro Valley lake to focus since Renfro Lake would be the first off I-75, and would reap the rewards of Lake Cumberland publicity.

Said one city official: "The new road puts us right in the thick point of recreation in the Lake Cumberland area. The town is indeed very lucky. This means there will be many, many changes take place in roads around our town. We are really on the map."

The "around the lakes road" has been talked, but not generally discussed. Most officials had felt the road would be built only after all the interstate program in Kentucky was completed.

### WARD ACCEPTS LAKE CONTRACT

A contract between the State Highway Department and the City of Mt. Vernon to proceed with the construction of a dam in Renfro Valley, was approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a special meeting Friday night.

All councilmen voted "yes" on a motion for approval made by Councilman Carl Kelley and seconded by Councilman Charles "Tuck" Baker.

The contract was then signed by Mayor Clyde Linville and forwarded to the State Highway Department at Frankfort. Henry Ward, commissioner of Highways, accepted the contract for the state Tuesday and told the city the contract came "just in time."

## Working In Tobacco Discussed In Detail

Be careful in cultivation of tobacco crop, says Dr. J. H. Smiley, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service specialist.

The crop needs some cultivation, but there are some precautions producers should take.

(1) Cultivation is needed to break up the ground crust. In later stages of growth, cultivation could do more harm than good, since the root systems have become so large; root-pruning is more damaging to the crop than any benefit derived from continued cultivation.

(2) About three cultivations per crop normally are sufficient for excellent tobacco crops.

(3) Stop cultivation when tobacco plants are about knee-high. It is at this stage of growth that roots of the plant extend out in the "bank."

Continued cultivation at this stage may cut off the growing roots near the surface. This would slow growth and in turn reduce quality.

## Many Insect Pests Horse Problem Now

There's a long list of insect pests for which homeowners should be on guard now, says Dr. R. L. Miller, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service entomologist.

They are: Fleas: They breed in horse places where pet dogs bed down in grass clippings, cellular debris, etc. Dug, these areas every two weeks with DDT or Sevin. Use the wettable powder of either of these at 2 to 4 tablespoons per gallon of water. Spray underside of leaves.

Chiggers: Campera, hickory, etc., are natural prey of these tiny red mites. Use repellents such as "Off," or 612 or 622. Apply repellent to arms and legs not covered by clothing, plus waistband of trousers, skirts, etc. A hot, soapy bath as soon as arrival home will help too.

Ants: Flourishing now is carpenter, patios, etc. Spray one of these in ant areas with Sevin, malathion or D-D. Porch Light Insects: These outdoor lights draw many insects. Consider using yellow bulbs, they are less attractive to insects.

Roaches: Prefer mild temperatures and moist conditions such as basements, crawl spaces, etc. Use one of the following residual sprays: DDT, chlordane, dieldrin, malathion or diazinon in basements. Do not treat caters (applying water to homes) DDT, 1 percent grain bait also is effective.

One Bare Aged White woolly patches on trunk and limbs of Scotch and Austrian pines mean that this insect is present. Use malathion, lead arsenate or diazinon.

Magnolia Scale: Brown, scale-shaped insects in mag-nolia trees spray with Auro-gust with the 5 percent emulsifiable concentrate in a gallon of water or lindane, two to four spoonfuls of the 30 percent liquid concentrate in a 1 1/2 gallons of water. Nicotine sulfate also can be used; follow label directions for this material.

Dr. Miller emphasizes: Always follow directions for mixing and safety measures. Call your county agricultural agent if advice is needed and spare the birds.
