Attorney General Amends His Complaint Of Mullins

Kentucky Atty. Gen. Robert Matthews filed an amended complaint in Rockcastle Circuit Court Monday once again against Rockcastle Circuit Court to remove Virgil Mullins from the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

Whether the case will be heard in open court during the July term is not known. The attorney general stated to remove Mr. Mullins from his seat on the Board of Education on grounds that Mr. Mullins does not have an eighth grade education as required by State Statutes.

The amended motion filed Monday re-affirms the state's contention that Mr. Mullins does not have the necessary educational qualifications, and points out that there are no records that Mr. Mullins completed the eighth grade affidavits from former teachers that he completed the eighth grade.

It was the second time the case has come before Judge Tartar. The first hearing, Judge Tartar continued the case to the July term of Circuit Court and said he wanted the case heard in open court.

The judge continued the case on grounds of a "defect in parties," namely, that the attorney general should not have delegated his authority to an attorney, but that the general himself should have pursued all sections in the case.

The new complaint is signed by Attorney General Matthews. The first complaint was filed and signed by Atty. Fritz Krueger for the attorney general.

Anderson Fined
William Anderson of Orlando, was fined \$100 and given 90 days in jail Tuesday at Rockcastle Circuit Court on a charge of possession of alcoholic beverages in local option territory for the purpose of sale.

The case had been appealed from county court. Anderson was also charged with selling alcoholic beverages in a local option territory, but a jury could not agree on a verdict.

Institute For Advanced Study In Reading - Participants in an Appalachian area reading workshop at the campus of Eastern Kentucky State College are using a tape recorder to help encourage children's speaking and oral reading skills. BUT STATE WANTS KY 80 ROUTING

The Appalachian Regional Commission this week reaffirmed that it had approved a highway corridor from Burkesville to Mt. Vernon, where would connect with one of the two interstate-75 interchanges.

At the same time, the Commission said it would listen to arguments from the Kentucky State Highway Department regarding why the SHD believes the new road should run from Somerset along KY 80 to London rather than along KY 461 to Mt. Vernon.

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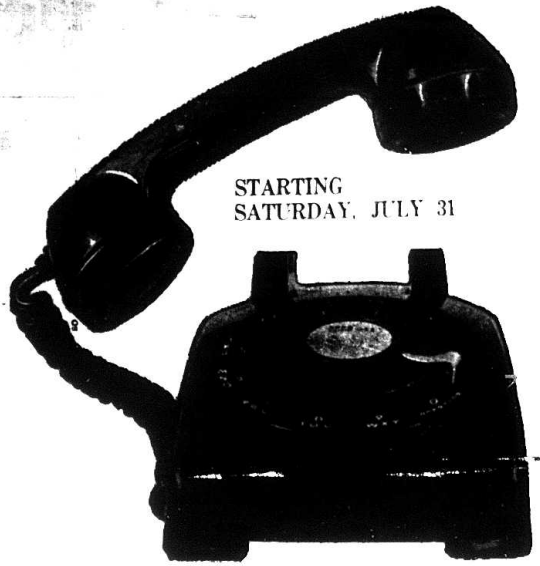

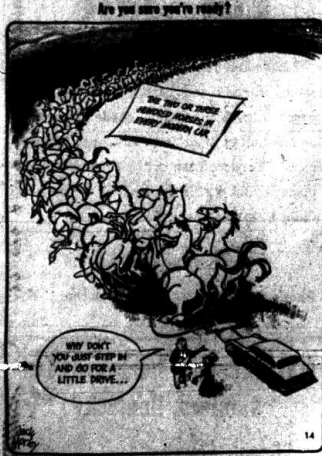

Insect Problems With Stored Grain

Problems with stored grain will be facing farmers soon, now that wheat and other small grains will be harvested and stored on-farm. Sanitation and spraying are the best ways to control this problem, says Dr. R. L. Miller, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service entomologist. Sweep bins or storage places clean of all old grain residues. First insects in large quantities may be harboring in various stages in such residues. Then mix one gallon of premium grade Malathion in 25 gallons of water. Use the 57 percent emulsifiable concen-

trate only. Spray this on walls, floors and immediate area outside the storage area. Spray to the run-off point, forcing the spray into cracks and crevices. Methoxychlor also may be used in place of Malathion. Follow label and safety directions.

Get Cows Ready To Get Along Alone

The month of August will be a busy time for Kentucky farmers, so it is best to get the cow herd ready to get along without any special care. Dr. Roy Gray, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service, beef specialist, lists these procedures: Give summer grazing using supplemental pasture if necessary. Be sure salt minerals and plenty of fresh water are available. Consider worming and pinning for ticks and lice. Give a deworming treatment to all calves. Weigh and grade calves. Vaccinate calves for infectious diseases. Test for mastitis. Test for acid fast bacteria. Test for Johne's disease. Test for cryptosporidiosis. Test for salmonellosis. Test for cryptosporidiosis.
