Juries Find Seven Guilty

Five youths from Sand Springs were sentenced to two years each in prison on the week in Rockcastle Circuit Court on a charge of uttering a forged check.

In one other case, Claude Dees of Brodhead, was fined \$25 and sentenced to 10 days in jail for a public drunk charge. He was tried in absentia.

Court was adjourned this week but will resume Friday.

Senate Votes Water Funds

The Senate has passed a bill to expand and extend the authority for loans and grants for construction of rural water facilities.

The bill was sponsored by Sen. John Sherman Cooper and was recommended to the Senate by the Agriculture Committee, on which Senator Cooper serves as Director.

The vote by the Senate could have far-reaching effects on plans for various water projects now under planning in Rockcastle County. To date, no definite details have been released.

In a hearing before the Agriculture Committee, Senator Cooper said, "The Farmers Home Administration usually has a list of about 74 Rural Water Districts in Kentucky alone." The Senator indicated that applications for loans for rural areas in Kentucky total over \$32 million.

The bill would increase the annual loan fund available under the Farmers Home Administration, and it adds a new provision for making grants up to 50 per cent to associations organized to finance water facilities for rural areas. Additionally, the Senate voted to make eligible areas primarily engaged in agriculture, with less than five thousand population.

Senator Cooper strongly and successfully opposed the effort to lower this population limit.

Senator Cooper said, "I am glad the Senate has voted to extend this program which means so much in many areas of Kentucky, and I am glad that assistance will continue to be available to plan and build water facilities to meet the needs of our rural families. The bill now goes to the House for action."

Brodhead Votes To Construct Dam



WANT \$250,000 FOR PROJECT

To meet Brodhead's acute need for an increased water supply, the Brodhead Board of Trustees will apply for federal funds for the construction of a dam and water treatment plant on 25 acres on Bowman Branch near the northeast city limits.

The Board at a special meeting Tuesday night voted to file an application with the Farmers Home Administration as soon as possible seeking a loan of about \$250,000 to do the job.

W. E. Dillingham, chairman of the Board, this week discussed Brodhead's need for additional water while walking over the site for the dam and lake which will be located on property recently purchased by the town from R. V. Brock.

"We are not yet in the critical stage for water," Mr. Dillingham said, "But if the drought continues we may have to ration water before the summer is over. Our water usage will go up when the grade and high school opens. We do hope we have enough to go around."

If Brodhead does not have enough water, there will be enough when the new lake forms.

Looking at the stakes driven around the valley, the lake should be about a quarter of a mile wide and about one mile long. Lying between two green ridges, it will not only be beneficial as a water supply, it will also be a playground for the eyes and a good fishing lake for local residents.

When filled, the lake will contain about 27,000,000 gallons of water. Brodhead's water project will be paid for through a 40-year revenue bond issue, probably at a low interest rate since the government usually bids on this type of bonds. However, the financial details remain to be worked out following a financial feasibility study of revenue to see if the water works can support the interest of the bonds. The first such study indicates it can.

Another financial angle that the town probably will pursue will be the possibility of grants from the federal government. But what kind of grants has not been reported. Also to be worked out is the exact location of the water treatment plant, and its yet to be determined capacity. Best information is on the plan on the lake property just off the Brodhead-Corway Road and immediately south of the dam.

Currently, Brodhead water is distributed to the lines by a gravity system from a large tank overlooking the town. The water comes from springs.

There will be no extension of these distribution lines during the construction program. Apparently, most all Brodhead residents that want water now take water.

From time to time as Mr. Dillingham walked around the valley he would look at the dirt rising from the dirt road that runs up the valley, and then look at the cloudless sky and hot sun.

"Yes," he noted, "we'll get by if we can get some rain. But that's the only temporary relief. We will be plagued with a water shortage until we can get a good supply in the fall."

Since the trip around the valley, there has been some water now takes water.

Ask Tartar To Vacate Bench In Pending Anderson Trials

A motion was filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court Tuesday asking Judge R. C. Tartar to vacate the bench in all future trials against William Anderson of Orlando, Fla., who was found guilty of possession of alcoholic beverages, and three cases of selling alcoholic beverages. He also has a public nuisance charge pending.

The motion is one of the few, if not the first, ever filed in Judge Tartar's court. The "vacate motion" followed by a few days a motion asking for a new trial for Anderson of Orlando, Fla., who was found guilty of possession of alcoholic beverages in a local option territory last week in Circuit Court and fined \$100 and sentenced to 60 days in the county jail.

The motion requesting Judge Tartar to vacate the bench in all criminal actions now pending against Anderson, states that "the said R. C. Tartar is so biased and prejudiced against this defendant as to be able to give this defendant a fair and impartial trial."

An affidavit filed by the attorney for Anderson states that seven criminal actions are now pending against Anderson. The affidavit also quotes remarks made by Judge Tartar in court during the trial of Anderson, concerning bootlegging in the Brush Creek area.

Judge Tartar himself will study the motion and then rule. He will either overrule the motion or step down in favor of another judge.

A check of Circuit Court records shows that Anderson is charged with two cases of possessing alcoholic beverages, and three cases of selling alcoholic beverages. He also has a public nuisance charge pending.

Three other cases in Circuit Court the past few days have involved Anderson. Jimmy Allen of Orlando, Fla., was found guilty of shooting into Anderson's auto and wounding him in October 1964. Jack Allen, father of Jimmy, also charged with shooting into Anderson's auto, was dismissed after the outcome of the case against his son.

A charge against Anderson of shooting into a dwelling house occupied by Jack Allen was dismissed.

Best Route For New Road Would Be Along KY 461

Two weeks ago, the Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington announced it had established a corridor for a new highway known as the Lexington to Chattanooga corridor.

The new highway, the commission said, would follow Interstate-75 from Lexington to Mt. Vernon, then along a new highway approximating KY 461 to Somerset, to Burnside, Monticello, Burlington, and the Tennessee line.

Shortly after the announcement by Senators John Sherman Cooper and Thurston Morton, and Rep. Tim Lee Carter, the State Highway Department through its Commission on Roads, announced that the Department proposed the route to be along I-75 to London, west to Somerset, then south to the Tennessee line.

To support its contention that it would be better to go to London and then on KY 80 to Somerset (92 miles), than to go from Mt. Vernon to Somerset on KY 461 (27 miles), the Department announced it had hired Spinley Research, Inc., of Lexington, to come up with data supporting the KY-80 route.

Edna Beat Zepher, of the London, Tenn.-based firm, "finds, via Mt. Vernon, northward to Lexington, Louisville, and Cincinnati, would be shorter than through London; however, Highway 80, eastward, connects with the Eastern Kentucky Parkway and serves a greater part of Eastern Kentucky," he said, further that the matter "should be pursued locally to the fullest extent."

Said the Somerset Journal: "And, we feel the highway department has grounds for their desire to see the road follow Highway 80 to London, Highway 49 has been considered the most important east-west route in the southern part of the state for many years. And, just as long, it has needed repair and improvements."

Let's start with KY 80. Since that highway was first constructed east from London, it has never been more than a convenient local highway serving a limited section of Eastern Kentucky. It arguably does serve those people coming from Hazard, Manchester, and Hyden, who wish to reach the 200-250-mile route. Certainly, KY 80 motorists going north to the Mountain Parkway, from London westward, KY 80 is a convenient local highway connecting with US 26, US 27, US 218, and US 31W, and Highways 481 and 41, and used by the local motorist only until he reaches the nearest north-south highway.

We repeat, we do not believe this 400-mile state road will ever be more than a connecting highway for local motorists to reach a north-south highway. Traffic survey data, however, indicates that the road is used by 100,000 cars and trucks by all means. KY 80 should be maintained and improved, but as a major highway, it is not now, and it will never be, no matter how many millions are spent on it. If it is too expensive for the state to build and maintain, we cannot see why the federal government would want to take on the job, directly or indirectly.

We believe we can make a case for KY 461 if it is the new highway to be in actually the Lexington to Chattanooga corridor.

In the first place, the KY 461 route takes the road across Rockcastle County where it is located now. Another route would tend to encourage traffic on down I-75. This would result in a loss of revenue for Rockcastle County. Why rob Peter to pay Paul?

Secondly, it is 27 miles from Mt. Vernon to Somerset via KY 461. It is 92 miles from Mt. Vernon to London to Somerset.

Thirdly, the route between London and Somerset is a very busy, heavily traveled road in Western Kentucky, and has very low speed limits. The KY 80 route would also call for a major bridge over the Rockcastle River. The terrain on KY 461 is generally rolling hills and farmland. We estimate the difference in cost of construction would be at least \$10,000,000 less on KY 461.

Next, the routing of traffic to London could result in the motorists continuing to follow Interstate-75 on to Martin Lake in Tennessee, especially if he is getting a boat. The route would be a loss of revenue for Lake Cumberland towns, particularly Burnside and Monticello. These towns would not benefit as Somerset would if it actually would from KY 80 as a major east-west highway. What will happen to Somerset if US 27 traffic is routed to London? We doubt even London businesses and London Post, Dock would benefit from a state program of publicity directed at turning tourists to the west from I-75 interchanges at KY 60. That interchange will be a considerable distance from Lexington.

Although we respect the research qualifications of Spinley, we will await with eagerness and interest how that objective research organization will scientifically justify getting from Lexington to Chattanooga on an east-west highway.

Meanwhile, we hope the State Highway Department re-examines and re-evaluates its stated position on this important segment of highway, and follows the recommendations of the Appalachian Regional Commission.

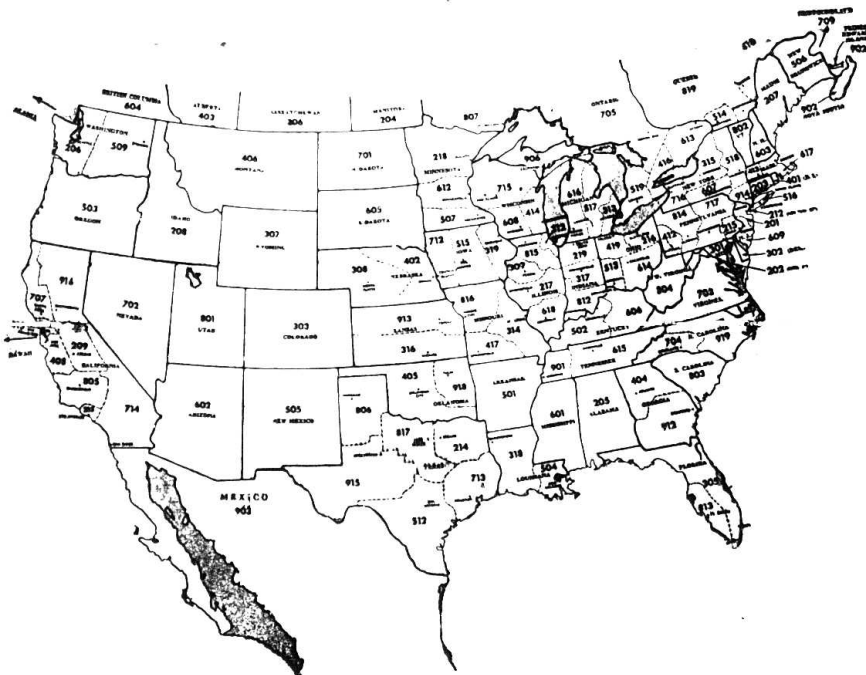
