Whisman Questioned On Rockcastle Project

The Cumberland Valley Area Development Council approved several community projects, including the Renfro Valley Dam and Lake at a meeting of the council Thursday night at Barboursville.

The council approved all projects already submitted to the federal government for grants. A letterhead workshop also a proposed Rockcastle project was included in the approval.

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Mr. Whisman's answers to various questions on the projects are noted below. Although they are not direct quotes, the essence of Mr. Whisman's answers have been put into this form for easier reading.

Q: Mr. Whisman, do you think the City of Mt. Vernon will be able to complete its Renfro Valley water development project?

A: I sincerely hope so. But if it does, it will be a photo finish. Time is not on your side. As you know, Interstate 75 is now at the apex boundary of Rockcastle County. Therefore, we must work very fast. Your problem is land. Usually people give their land in exchange for a lake. But it is not the case here. That means the entire project will be expensive. So, in order to get this much money through a grant, we will have to make an effort to mix money from several agencies—getting some from each. Mixing government agencies is not easy and what we are doing is purely experimental. Government agencies usually like to maintain their individuality in a project. But we are trying very hard. We hope we will be successful.

Q: Does the approval of the project by this group actually help in any way?

A: Very much so. One thing we like, and the federal government likes, is approval by everyone of a project. They have it from about eight counties here. This approval eliminates the time required for the federal or state agency to poll the area.

Q: Could Mt. Vernon get the money from federal agencies through loans?

A: Possibly. But I don't know your present financial status. But this project will cost a lot of money. I only wish it were a few months from now, then this group would have plenty of money for the project. But we are trying—and we will keep trying.

Q: Mr. Whisman then answered questions concerning the proposed Lexington-to-Chatanooga highway which was recently approved by the Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington. The commission approved alternate routes between Mt. Vernon and Somerset. One route would follow KY 461 to Somerset then south to the Tennessee line. The other route would follow I-76 to London, then KY 89 to Somerset, and south to the Tennessee line.

The state prefers the KY 89 route and has hired Splanetop Research, Inc. of Lexington, to research the route.

Q: Although you discussed the proposed route in a letter to the Signal two weeks ago, we still feel the route should go KY 461. What are its chances?

A: Let me say, that no definite route has been established. But we prefer the KY 89 route for the reasons explained in my letter. Do answer your question: The new road could very well go down KY 461 route.

Q: When will we know?

A: Not before January.

Q: We feel the KY 461 route would benefit us. Would's (Continued on Page 5)

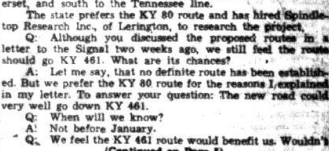

QUESTIONS ON KENTUCKY VALLEY DAM

Q: Are you taking traffic from one area to help another area?
 A: I'm sure you feel the KY 461 route is the best route. But if you take yourself out of Rockcastle County and look at it from the eyes of someone who is not associated with Rockcastle, you could just as easily feel it should follow another route. You are simply looking out for yourself, and that's understandable. To answer your question, you will still have KY 461.

Q: Mr. Whitman, when Spindletop was hired to re-survey the project, were they told to compile data supporting the KY 80 route with no mention of KY 461?
 A: Spindletop will check everything, but mostly into the economic impact the road will have on various areas. Since all counties along the corridor will be checked, and since KY 80 is the counties, the impact of the change will necessarily be included in the report.

Q: Wouldn't it cost at least double to construct the road along KY 80?
 A: The cost of construction does not enter into it when it comes to a selection of routes, including the cost of a bridge over the Rockcastle River. We are given a certain amount for a route each year. We go as far as the money goes with it each year. You cannot put cost on your side.

Q: There is the matter of distance. It is over twice the distance to go by way of London. Will this be on our side?
 A: That will be in your favor. The Federal Bureau of Roads is inclined still to prefer the shortest distance between two points when it builds a highway.

Q: The road along these lines, will not John L. Sweeney, Federal co-chairman of the Appalachian program, be on our side?
 A: You will have to ask Mr. Sweeney about that.

Q: Isn't this new highway, in essence, replacing US 27?
 A: US 27 will still be there.

Q: But wouldn't the new highway be more direct by turning south at Mt. Vernon?
 A: The Regional Commission established the most direct route between Lexington and Chattanooga with a turn-off from KY 80 somewhere north of Lexington.

Q: Wouldn't Mt. Vernon be that point?
 A: Yes, in the vicinity of Mt. Vernon. However, we believe there is more to consider in this routing than distance.

Q: Are two connections one at Mt. Vernon and the other at London?
 A: I understand how you feel. The Federal Bureau of Roads is inclined still to prefer the shortest distance between two points when it builds a highway.

Q: Mr. Whitman, in Rockcastle County in the last five years we have had several worthwhile projects dangled before our eyes that seemingly jerked away for one reason or another, including two dams on the Rockcastle River. Don't you think it is about time we got at least one project?
 A: I understand how you feel, and we are trying our best to help you through your Restro Lake project. And as far as I know, we will continue to help. On the matter of the Rockcastle River dams that have been shelved by the Army Corps of Engineers, I have hopes that they will not remain on the shelf much longer. I think we will be hearing from this project before very long. It is by no means dead.

Check Heating Unit Before Curing Time

If you need artificial heat during the barley curing season this year, you'll want your unit to fire up without any trouble. If that heating unit operates on LP (liquefied petroleum) gas, you'll be ahead of the game if you give the equipment a quick check now, says Victor Thompson, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service LP-gas specialist. Stoves, gas lines and other components may have been in storage since last season, possibly longer, because of unusual curing conditions experienced during 1964, he says. Equipment may have been damaged by livestock or rodents, or may have deteriorated somewhat from exposure to weather. The check should be made by yourself or dealer as soon as possible. In a very short while, LP-gas servicemen will be busy delivering fuel tanks, servicing units, etc. Don't wait until you actually need the equipment for tobacco curing; you might not be able to get the servicemen then. A larger number of Kentucky farmers are using gas-fired stoves to provide curing heat and control curing conditions in the barns. Many of these units are operated on LP-gas.
