

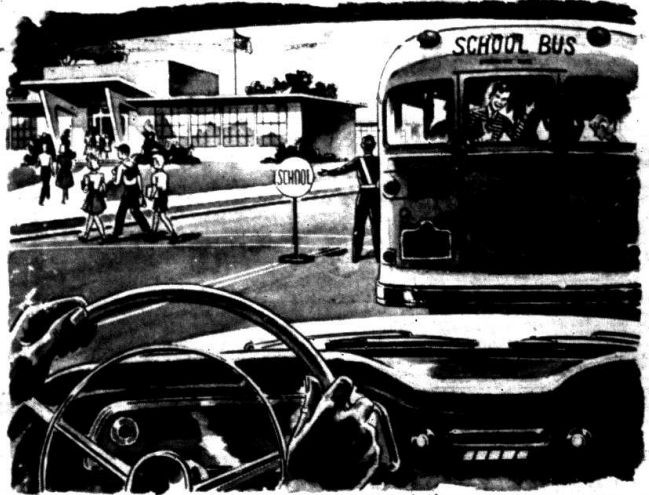

L&N Wants To Tear Down Old Depot At Mt. Vernon

Officials of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad told the City of Mt. Vernon this week it would like to tear down the depot at Mt. Vernon since it appears the city does not intend to use it.

The city leased the depot for a nominal fee under a long term lease for use as a Bookmobile Library, but later decided not to repair and remodel the leaky, rotting structure.

Contacted, Mayor Clyde Threlkoff confirmed the railroad has requested it be released from its lease, but he said he had sought and got a verbal agreement with the railroad this week to allow the city to use the space for a parking lot under terms of a new lease.

As things stand currently, Threlkoff would probably be a considerable time before the depot was actually torn down. Mayor Linville said he would bring the entire matter before the Mt. Vernon City Council when it meets this night.

The mayor noted that since the city leased the building to a number of groups, he had agreed to let it be used as a Bookmobile Library and the First Baptist Church and the First Baptist Church had shown interest in the building, but neither had agreed to use it. At one time the Baptist Church thought it might open the building as a recreation center.

Cecil Purcell Dies. Funeral Thursday

Start Design Of Renfro Dam

The State Highway Department made it official this week. A geological survey for a dam at Renfro Valley has been studied and there is no difference between the new survey and the old survey. The announcement was made by J. F. Johnson, head of the Intra-Agency Roads Section, Department of the Planning. The announcement is going ahead with the design of a dam. The announcement states that the underlying strata along Renfro Creek will hold water without exactly big news, since the engineers on the project had reported earlier they could find nothing that was not included in the earlier feasibility study.

The announcement that the Department of Planning will design the dam was new, but of limited nature. Designing the dam does not mean the dam will be constructed. Whether it will be constructed depends on the city's ability to get grants for purchase of land. To date the money has not been made.

It is not likely to determine if it can raise the money.

Edward Whisman, aid to Gov. Frank B. Rowland, and K. J. Edwards, member of the Appalachian Regional Commission, are reported to be continuing his efforts to find federal funds to help with financing the project. It is believed that to date he has not been successful.

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LHS Changes Math Courses

The modern mathematics curriculum has been adopted by the Livingston Elementary School, according to Charles B. Parson, principal. The curriculum is a new approach to teaching mathematics. The program stresses the "why" as well as "how" of mathematics. It has been found to be very successful in schools throughout the nation. The State of Kentucky and Jefferson County schools, and others, have used this program for several years. Mr. Parson said.

Parents may find the new math to be puzzling. Livingston teachers have all had a 12 weeks workshop course in preparation for this program. A new program is being set up in first grade reading. The first grade teachers will be using a different approach to teaching reading. During this school year first grade pupils will be using "Phonetic Keys to Reading" in addition to the readers that have been used in the past.

The use of "Phonetic Keys to Reading" in the first grade pupils will learn to read in a manner entirely different from the methods formerly used. This new reading program is based upon the assumption that the pupil should have a knowledge of the letters and their sound before he is introduced to formal reading on the pre-primer level. This program is designed to develop word attack and comprehension skills simultaneously. This knowledge of letters and their sound will also help him to spell better. This helps him to read in over 40,000 classrooms.

A third curriculum change is block time length. In seventh and eighth grades, three teachers are teaching the basic subjects to some 75 students.

Fertilize Alfalfa

Prepare Pasture For Brood Sows

Best time to prepare fall and winter pastures for brood sows is August, says Dr. John Robertson, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service swine specialist.

Balbo rye is the best small grain for these pastures. It should be seeded between August 15 and September 15. Seeding rate is four bushels per acre when intended for sow pastures. This rate will give a heavy sod and will carry six to 18 sows an acre if allowed to grow to five or six inches in height.


Good pasture can reduce feed costs by 50 percent. U. K. research has shown Sows on good Balbo rye pasture will need only two to three pounds of a good, complete gestation ration daily in the first two-thirds of the gestation period. This should be increased to four to six

pounds in the last third of the period.

Feed-cost savings make an acre of Balbo rye worth about \$75 to \$80 an acre. Sows grazing good pasture also farrow larger litters of pigs which have a better livability than pigs from sows under dry-lot conditions.
