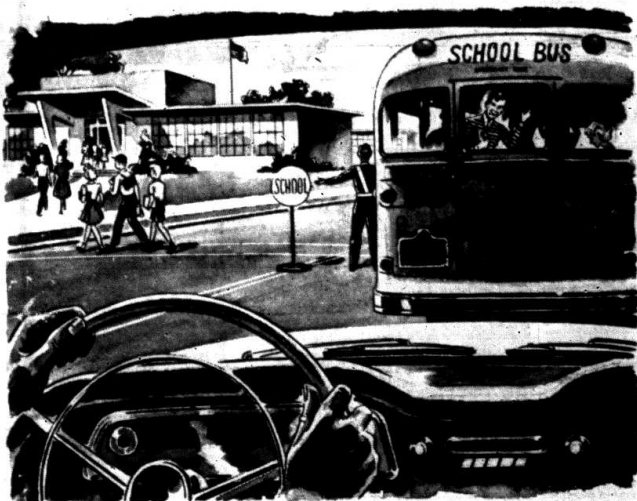

Mt. Vernon, Brodhead Discuss Water Problems

The Mt. Vernon City Council and the Brodhead Board of Trustees put their heads together Thursday night to discuss water problems in the two towns and possible solutions.

On hand were three representatives from the Farmers Home Administration—Robert Winn, county supervisor; Jim Gardner, state engineer; and Logan West, area supervisor.

The specific objective of the meeting was to explore the possibility of establishing a water district for the two towns, with a common source of water—the proposed Reno River Lake.

Mr. Winn explained to the council that the FHIA was prepared to lend money for the establishment of a water district, but that the towns would have to show the ability to repay the money loaned by the FHIA.

To form a water district the towns would have to first present to the FHIA a petition signed by 75 freeholders.

Next, the water system would be put under the water district and managed by three commissioners appointed by the county judge.

The water district would be operated as a non-profit organization.

After the administrative problems were solved, the water district would obtain a loan and construct a treatment plant, install lines, and establish its water source.

The council members from both towns discussed the water district, then agreed to name a representative to meet with an engineer for a more thorough discussion of the proposed district.

W. S. Cass of Brodhead is in charge of the water project. He said there was a mass of problems to be ironed out before the water district could function.

Just how long before the Reno project is underway. He reported he would make the necessary arrangements for additional money that would be needed by the city to supply 30 per cent of the costs of the project if an 80 per cent grant were approved by some federal agency.

Mayor Linnville said the contract for the Reno section of Interstate-75 would be up for bid on Feb. 18.

Mayor Linnville also reported he would go to Atlanta, Ga., next week and discuss the water problem with the Housing and Home Administration which supplied the loan for the Mt. Vernon sewer system.

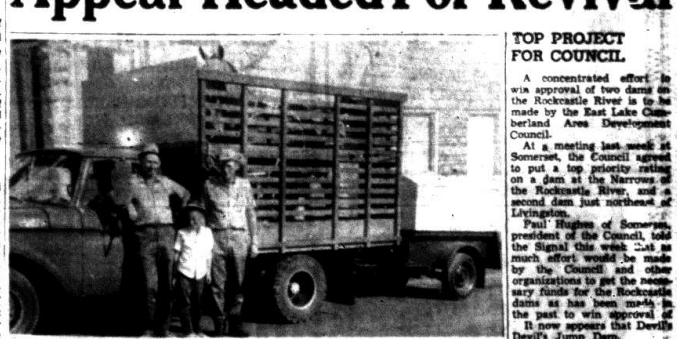
ONE SURE SIGN OF FALL

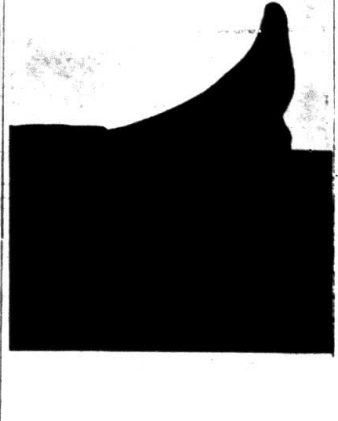

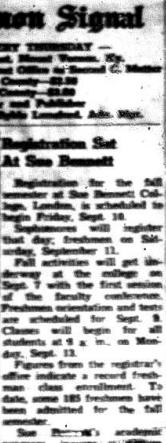

We sincerely appreciate the splendid cooperation of civic organizations, schools, agencies and individuals who worked with us in many of our programs.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE CONTROL

We are proud to announce that, due to the continuing effective long range Public Health programs and the long hours of work and planning on the part of the staff with the cooperation of all the people in Rockcastle County, we have had 100% success in the prevention of diseases such as Diphtheria, Lockjaw, Polio, Rabies and a host of other deadly diseases that compromise only a few years ago. In addition to having whipped out these diseases, a significant eradication of most other infectious diseases, notably, measles, whooping cough, tuberculosis, strep throat and intestinal tract infections, has been accomplished.
