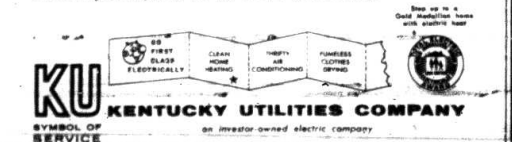

City Council Will Apply For FHHA Loan For Lake

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted at a meeting last week to apply for a loan from the Federal Housing and Home Administration to buy land for the proposed Brento Valley lake and to add additional lines to the Mt. Vernon water system.

The council did not specify the amount of the loan.

It also reserved the right to change its mind, subject to the action of a feasibility study now underway.

Actually, the council agreed to apply for the loan if an indication to the State Highway Department that it intends to go through with the Brento water project.

If a grant for 80 per cent, more or less, comes through for the city between now and the time the money is actually needed, the council can fill in the amount it needs without having to apply for the money on short notice, resulting in delays.

14 MASONS RECEIVE PINS

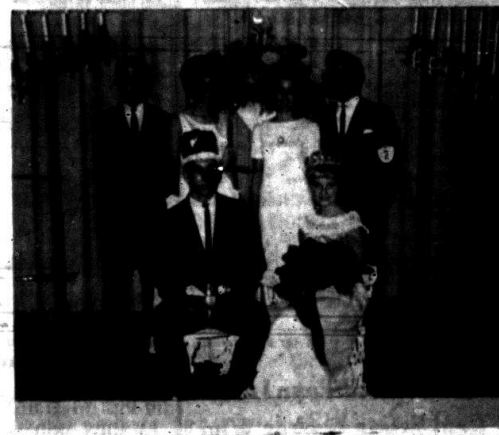

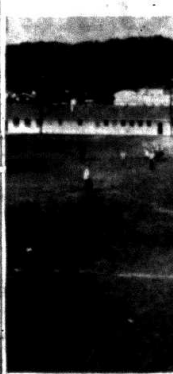
NEW EMPLOYEE

Sayre School Coach Blasts MVHS Football Facilities

The game was almost unbelievable," Hill said. "The field was only 90 yards long, and everytime we crossed the midfield stripe we had to back up 10 yards."

"Not only that," he continued, "but the field was an old softball diamond with very poor lighting. At one point it was so dark it was scary dark."

Newspaper accounts said the football game was reminiscent of 1961 ball days at the turn of the Century.

The Sayre game was changed from Tuesday to Monday night because of a muddy field, forcing both teams to play two games in one.

"It's going to be hard to play two games in one week," Hill said. "We lost their Ludlow High School field will have lights and be a 100 yards long."

The Rockcastle County Library is the local sponsor of the train's visit to the community. Utilities and other services necessary to the operation of the train are contributed as public services by local business firms.

The train is directed by the general tour of exhibits and to give demonstrations will be Mr. and Mrs. Edward C. Brinkman, the director and assistant director of the train. Both are practicing artists and craftsmen. Mr. Brinkman is a pottery artist and a high interest in sculpture. Mrs. Brinkman is a textile designer and weaver. Tips On Materials For Plant Bed Soil
Materials for treating tobacco plant beds during the fall months all have been well

proven over the last few years, says Ira Masnie, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service specialist.
Chemicals frequently used are calcium cyanamid, Vapam, allyl alcohol, Metylon or Vorex. Methyl bromide gas is the most frequently used in its class. Burning still is an accepted and widely used practice.

Weed-seed control by drenching or the gas depends on following certain rules. One is that the bed should be plowed first (preferably two weeks before treatment) and worked. Soil temperature (at least one inch down) should be 50 degrees F or higher.

After treatment, ditch the bed site thoroughly to get rid of surface runoff water that might carry disease organisms.
A plastic cover for fall-treated bed sites after the treatment is a helpful item. Edges of the plastic are placed in a shallow ditch dug around the bed site (at least 4 inches deep) and the sheet stretched fairly tight over the plant-bed site. This keeps out weed seeds over the winter and maintains the ground in the condition in which it was treated; soil is looser and moisture is contained. In the spring, the cover is removed and the bed fertilized and planted.

If methyl bromide gas is used (under a plastic cover), the plastic cover should stay on all winter and be removed about three days before seeding next spring. Two-three- or four-mil thick plastic is used for methyl bromide treatment covers, or for straight winter covers.

Masnie emphasizes that fall-treatment can be done as long as bed-site soil can be worked and its temperature is 50 degrees F. or higher.

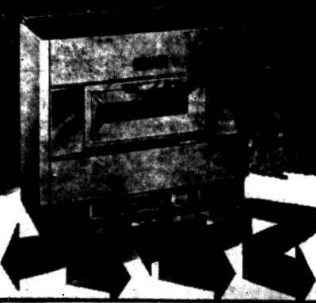

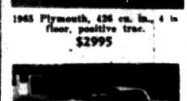

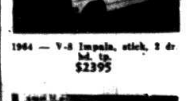
