GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE COMMONWEALTH

Are you in favor of the Act of the General Assembly known as House Bill, No. 474, enacted at the regular session of 1964 wherein it is proposed that the Commonwealth issue and sell its General Obligation Bonds in addition to all bonds heretofore authorized by the voters in the principal sum of one hundred and seventy six million dollars (\$176,000,000), from the proceeds of which one hundred and thirty nine million dollars (\$139,000,000) will be set aside for construction or reconstruction of highways, bridges, tunnels and other appurtenances wherein there is to be federal cost participation in any amount or portion thereof; and thirty seven million dollars (\$37,000,000) will be set aside for state agencies and public purposes for the acquisition of lands, the construction and reconstruction of buildings and structures, installation of service facilities, and the purchase and installation of equipment, facilities, and furnishings of a permanent nature for buildings and structures for the state agencies or public purposes as follows: Kentucky Industries for the Blind, School for the Deaf, School for the Blind, Department of Education for vocational schools, Department of Libraries, University of Kentucky, Eastern Kentucky State College, Kentucky State College, Morehead State College, Murray State College, and Western Kentucky State College, medical education facilities, Department of Mental Health for mental health facilities, Tuberculosis Hospital Commission for Hazelwood T. B. Hospital renovation, Department of Child Welfare for child welfare facilities, Department of Health for county health centers, Health Services Building addition, Department of Corrections, Department of Agriculture for animal disease diagnostic laboratory, State Fair Board and Murray State College for livestock sales and exhibition facilities, Department of Conservation for small lakes, Department of Conservation for forestry facilities, Department of Parks, Department of Aeronautics for airport facilities, Department of Public Safety for state police barracks?

At the least, he will be named as state director, but best informal information will be the national director. He has been quoted as saying there will be some work done in Rockcastle County we agree.

SAYS REMARKS INACCURATE

Sayre School Headmaster Donn Hollingsworth apologized to Mt. Vernon High School last week for "some of the remarks" made by Coach Danny Hill about poor football facilities at Mt. Vernon following a game between the two schools.

Lexington reporters quoted Coach Hill as saying the field was only 80 yards long, poorly lit, and was an old soft-ball diamond (all accurate).

He was also quoted as saying "we know now that we are not the worst team in the nation." Sayre defeated MVHS in the game 24-0.

In his letter of apology, Headmaster Hollingsworth said Mr. Hill was quoted inaccurately.

"It is regrettable that newspaper reporters in Lexington and other cities in the area are not so accurate in their reporting," he wrote. "I am sure we do not even have a football field that is any way inferior to yours."

The Lexington Herald has not informed their readers in subsequent issues that the report was inaccurate. The headmaster went on to point out that "your school has better facilities than we do, but we don't even have a football field that is any way inferior to yours."

Our coach is young and does not begin to realize what is involved in having a football field, bleachers, etc. Naturally he would hope for the best position in playing conditions, but it was inaccurate to criticize the facilities of the host school, and to have remarks that were inaccurate to him," Hollingsworth wrote.

The letter also states that Coach Hill did not know that "inaccurate" remarks would be quoted in Lexington newspapers.

Hollingsworth also stated that he would be quoted in the Lexington newspapers as "having remarks that would offend another school, and was quite upset by the reporter (from Lexington) who quoted for the schools as he did not quote him accurately."

Hollingsworth apologized again for the "embarrassment" he may have caused.

It is interesting that Hollingsworth did not differentiate between the remarks actually made by Coach Hill and those that were listed inaccurately.

Chester Fugate Dies In Crash

Chester William (Buck) Fugate, 39, of Brodhead Ridge, was killed about 11:15 p. m. Saturday when the auto he was driving ran off Chestnut Ridge Road near Brodhead and struck a tree.

State Trooper David Moore said Mr. Fugate apparently died instantly in the crash. He was alone in the car.

Mr. Fugate was born in Rockcastle County, the son of John and Bessie Leane Fugate. He was a farmer and a veteran of World War II.

Besides his father, he survived by two brothers, Lester, Fugate of Brodhead, and Chuck Fugate of Dayton, Ohio; one half-brother, Jack Fugate of Brodhead; two sisters, Mrs. Cora Leat of Brodhead and Mrs. Gladys Martin of Dayton, Ohio; two half-sisters, Mrs. Bessie Chestnut of Dayton, Ohio; and Mrs. Fannie Mays of Brodhead.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a. m. at the Brodhead Baptist Church with Bro. Craig Roney officiating. He was buried in Pinney Grove Cemetery. Watson Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Health Program Coming to State

A grant for \$684,984 to start a massive health program for Eastern Kentucky's rural poor was approved by the office of Economic Opportunity Tuesday.

The beginning of a projected 10-year-long, \$100 million program to give the remote Appalachian Hollow dwellers medical care as good as that can be obtained anywhere.

The grant goes to the Kentucky area development office, headed by John Whiteman. The Office of Economic Opportunity, the official agency for the war on poverty, informed Sen. John Sherman Cooper and Rep. Carl Perkins of its approval.

The Kentucky project is a "pilot program" to develop methods for handling the health programs of rural poor anywhere.

Break-In At Supermarket

Forest Funds Go To County

Seventeen Eastern Kentucky counties will receive cash payments from the Federal Government for use on roads and schools according to Robert F. Collins, Supervisor, Cumberland National Forest, Winchester.

The counties, Bath, Estill, Johnson, Laurel, Wayne, Clay, Crenshaw, Morgan, Owsley, Powell, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Rowan, and Van Lear. Whites, Wolfe and Pike, each will receive funds from the National Forest Fund receipts under an Act of Congress which authorizes the distribution of 25 per cent of all receipts from the National Forest Fund. The amount of \$87,840.88 was recently mailed to the State Treasurer for distribution to the counties.

Rockcastle will receive \$1,149,368 based on 11,817 national forest acreage in the county.

"Each county is allocated monies out of this fund," stated Supervisor Collins, "based upon the acreage of National Forest land in the county. The distribution for 1968 breaks down to 18 cents for each acre of National Forest land and for some counties this means a substantial sum," added Collins. The Supervisor stated that the cash payment, allocated in lieu of taxes, is in many instances more than what is realized from local taxation. The Cumberland National Forest, 460,000 acres, is an allocated National Forest in Eastern Kentucky.

Timber sales, including lumber logs and pulpwood, is steadily increasing and distributed funds. Reata of land under special use, mineral lease and royalties are also available for the remainder of this fund.

The Cumberland National Forest Fund for construction and maintenance of roads within the Forest, roads that are of direct benefit to the public for general travel.

Forest products, a major segment that has been in effect for the past 30 years are beginning to pay off in steadily increasing amounts of timber available for support of the State's forest industry. During the past year our foresters marked more than 20 million board feet of timber that was sold to sawmills and other logging operations," explained Forest Supervisor Collins.

New Weather Report Method Planned

Much loss from recent heavy rainfall might have been prevented if tobacco farmers had received weather information of the type furnished by the U. S. Department of Commerce, according to Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Wendell Butler.

He made the comment upon learning that the Federal agency is establishing an agricultural weather service for Kentucky. Congressman John Watts has advised me that this service will be in full operation before the beginning of the 1966 crop season," Butler said. "I am certain that farmers will be able to avoid many weather problems as the result of this service. Butler and others influenced by the weather will also find this service beneficial."

Butler expressed appreciation to farm organizations and other groups that had been working with the State Department of Agriculture to get crop-weather forecasting made available. The groups were aided by research data from the University of Kentucky that in-

cluded burley farmers lose about \$1 million each year because of adverse weather. Hay and row crops are also subject to adverse weather, Butler said.

The U. S. Department of Commerce said agricultural weather forecasters will operate from the weather service office in Louisville. A joint weather bureau-experiment station office will be established at the University of Kentucky in Lexington to provide cooperative research, liaison and information distribution.

Plans call for the establishment of 10 agricultural weather observation stations in crop producing areas of the state so that daily weather observations can be obtained during the growing and harvesting season. Information on local weather situations in addition to severe weather warnings will be placed on a teletype center service and made available to all news media.

There will be an additional class period all at the same 7 p. m. starting time, on October 21, 28 and 29, and November 1, 8, and 11.

Persons interested in taking the course may register in advance by advising the Lexington County Civil Defense Office, 301 Earl Hodges, 119 Manchester Street, London. The telephone number is 864-2333. Those who find advance registration inconvenient may enroll at the first class meeting on October 19.

The course will provide instruction on effects of nuclear fallout, possible protection against radiation, effective community shelter systems, and use of shelter facilities, supplies and equipment.

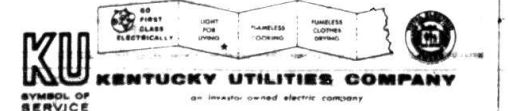

ARCHERY SEASON SET FOR DEER

Kentucky's 66 day split archery deer season will open on Friday, Oct. 1 in 66 counties, including Rockcastle, the greatest number of modern day hunting. Minor Clark, commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, said today.

The split season will feature the regular hunt opening on October 1 through November 5, plus ten days in December - December 1 to 10. Again this year the limit per hunter, both in the gun and archery season, is one deer for the entire year, but the bow and arrow hunter may choose either sex to harvest in the entire hunting area.

The double barreled season gives hunters a choice of weather in which to seek the deer. Not always is the weather too cooperative in the early part of the season and so a post-gun season was approved so that crisper, cooler

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weather could be available. Seven additional counties have been added to the hunting area for this fall. The new counties in which either sex deer may be taken are Webster, Daviess, Muhlenberg, Butler, Grayson, Casey and Bell. Woodford and Anderson remain open again this year for the archery season but not for gun.

Licensees only may be used and arrows must be barbed with broadhead points no less than 1/4 inch wide. The archery hunter may not carry any type firearms and must not use dogs. The use of power boats or any type of vehicle and all domestic animals are not to be used. Hunters must have a deer permit, cost \$10.00 plus a valid hunting license.
