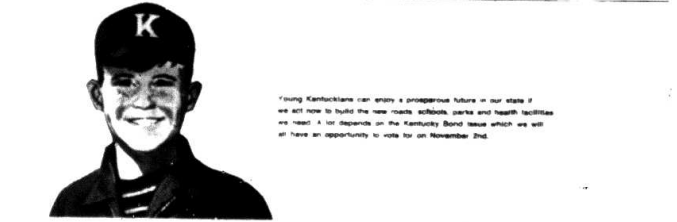

**NEW PARKWAY ABOUT READY FOR TRAFFIC**—This stretch of the Bluegrass Parkway is about five miles west of the Lawrenceburg turnoff. The 72-mile parkway between Elizabethtown and Versailles will be opened to traffic October 27 with dedication exercises. Plans call for the dedicatory group, including Governor Edward Breathitt, Highway Commissioner Henry Ward and other officials, to travel the entire length of the road, stopping for ceremonies at the Versailles end, Bardstow, and the Elizabethtown end. Completion of this parkway means that Kentucky's east and west will be connected by four-lane highways. Completion of Interstates 64 in Eastern Kentucky and 24 in Western Kentucky, contingent on funds from the \$176 million bond issue, would provide continuous four-lane driving from Ashland area to the Paducah area, a distance of about 350 miles.

## 'Hornet' State Champ

This honor brought the two most coveted state trophies - High General Average and Combination Bench and Field.

Ten other Challenge Trophies were presented to Livville for the outstanding work of this hunt.

Winning of Field Trials is not unusual for Hornet. In 1963 she won both the Blue Grass and Eastern State Hunts. She has in her total winning of 25 trophies the much sought Isaacs Challenge Trophy for Derby Hounds.

Hornet was unanimously nominated by the Kentucky State Officials to represent Kentucky in the National Fox Hunt to be held at Camden, S. C. next week.

## SPEAKS BEFORE KY 80 GROUP

State Highway Commissioner Henry Ward said last week that the Bureau of Public Roads in Washington prefers Mt. Vernon as the connecting point to Interstate-75 in the proposed Lexington to Chattanooga Appalachian Highway.

Addressing the Project 80 Committee last week at Glasgow, the Commissioner said "The Bureau of Public Roads wants the access road from Somerset to Interstate-75 to connect at Mt. Vernon."

It was the first time that a state or federal highway official has addressed the committee's feelings of the federal highway bureau.

In the same breath, Commissioner Ward said "The Project 80 Committee and the state is opposed to this route." He had said that several times.

The road to which the commissioner referred proposes to begin at the "Turnpike Line" in the general area of Albany, run north through Monticello, Burnside and Somerset. This section of the corridor has been established.

The only question about the route is the link with Interstate-75 from a point east of Somerset. The state prefers the road to go east from Somerset to London, a distance of 25 miles, as compared to 19 miles to Mt. Vernon along KY 461. However, the distance to Mt. Vernon from Somerset via London is 62 miles.

Commissioner Ward said "The Bureau feels that an access road to Mt. Vernon is more feasible from an economic standpoint because south-bound traffic on I-75 would more readily come through this area (Somerset) from Mt. Vernon as opposed to making the 20-mile trip from London."

"The people affected by the highway construction will ultimately decide the route of the access road to I-75," Commissioner Ward declared.

If the "people decide" who east immediately concerned with the route, there is little doubt of the route the road would take.

In Rockcastle County, clubs and organizations have forwarded letters to the State Highway Department and to the Appalachian Regional Commission asking that the route follow generally KY 461. A check of key people in Somerset, Burnside, and Monticello, shows that most prefer the access road to join I-75 at Mt. Vernon because of distance. But most said they would not, at this time, openly oppose the London route, pending a survey now being made by Spindletop, Inc., of Lexington on the route.

The Spindletop report may be released in November. The State Highway Department has made, or is making, a survey on costs of construction (Continued on Page 6)

## Governor Writes On Bonds

Gov. Edward Breathitt

The two best things about the State Bond Issue to be voted on Tuesday, November 3 is that it will build a lot of needed highways and buildings and will not cause any new taxes.

The bond issue is for \$176 million. With Federal aid and other matching funds it will provide Kentucky with a grand total of more than \$260 million to use in the construction of new and needed roads and buildings.

Kentucky will be able to retire these bonds from continued economic growth alone without new or higher taxes.

Briefly, the debt incurred by the sale of the bonds would require \$9.5 million annually for principal and interest. Broken down, the general fund portion of .437 million in bonds for capital construction other than roads would require \$1.3 million, and the road fund portion of \$139 million would require \$7 million.

These computations are based on an overall interest rate of 3 1/2 per cent, a period of 30 years in which to retire the bonds, and equal payments on the debt.

The total cost, including financing charges, such as

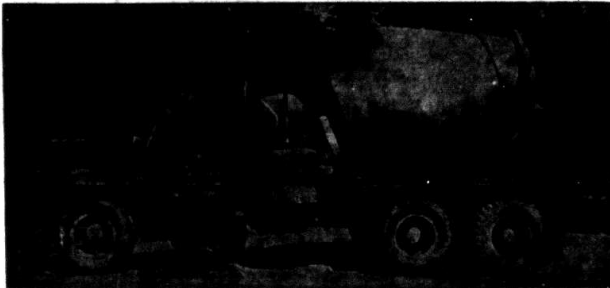

of the two routes.  
Local Rep. Appalachian Regional Commission approved the expenditure of \$244,800 in federal funds for the construction of 1.7 miles of the new highway near Burnside. The state matches the funds on a 70-30 basis.

Concerning KY 80 generally, Commissioner Ward said that state plans do not call for any extensive improvement. It is to be made to that route at the present time.

"Future monetary appropriations for highway construction and improvement will probably be added to the highway up hills and in congested places in the foreseeable future," he stated.

The commissioner also talked about the proposed bond issue to be voted on in November.

If we fail to take advantage of the opportunity and the money we would have received from the federal government on a matching basis will be channeled into other states, and we will suffer a great setback in our bid for progress," he declared.

million in bonds are all sold, the state's expenditure for debt service will be \$9.5 million more than it is today. In five years if the bond issue is passed, the state's income from current tax sources at the present tax rates, will be \$130 million more than it is today and will continue to rise by more than four per cent each year.

This means that the percentage of the state's income which would be dedicated to repayment of debt seven years from now would be less than it is today.

What these new statistics do not tell is that the investment which this bond issue represents will assist in the growth of the state's economy to such an extent that the annual requirements of our education, health and welfare programs can be met with less burden to the taxpayer.

Taxpayers of Kentucky in the last nine years have approved a total of \$346,000,000. They have voted in three elections their approval of this method of producing money to get matching funds for needed improvements. These bonds are presently being retired on schedule, and without impairment to the state's credit standing.

Other states have proceeded in the same way to obtain funds. Ohio, in 1963 and 1964, approved two bond issues totaling \$780 million. In 1964, Rhode Island approved a \$200 million issue. West Virginia, a \$200 million issue, and North Carolina, for \$300 million. Indiana in the decade from 1950 to 1960 issued \$280 million in highway bonds, and Illinois during the same 10 years issued \$479 million.

All this would indicate that Kentucky is on the right track in getting the \$76 million bond issue to get \$694,750,000 in matching funds for a total of \$770,750,000 to construct roads and buildings to be used in state services. Vote "yes" for the bond issue.



"Are you in favor of the act of the General Assembly known as House Bill No. 474, enacted at the regular session of 1964 wherein it is proposed that the Commonwealth issue and sell its general obligation bonds in a \$4,111,000 to all bonds heretofore authorized by the voters in the principal sum of one hundred and seventy-six million dollars (\$176,000,000), from the proceeds of which one hundred and thirty nine million dollars (\$139,000,000) will be set aside for construction or reconstruction of highways, bridges, tunnels and other appurtenances wherein there is to be federal cost participation in any amount or portion thereof, and thirty seven million dollars (\$37,000,000) will be set aside for state agencies and public purposes for the acquisition of lands, the construction and reconstruction of buildings and structures, installation of service facilities and the purchase and installation of equipment, facilities, and furnishings of a permanent nature for buildings and structures for the state agencies or public purposes as follows: Kentucky Industries for the Blind, School for the Blind, Department of Education for vocational schools, Department of Libraries, University of Kentucky, Eastern Kentucky State College, Kentucky State College, Morehead State College, Murray State College and Western Kentucky State College, medical education facilities, Department of Mental Health for mental health facilities, Tuberculosis Hospital Commission for Haselwood TB Hospital renovation, Department of Child Welfare for child welfare facilities, Department of Health for county health centers, Health Service Building addition, Department of Corrections, Department of Agriculture for animal disease diagnostic laboratory, State Fair Board and Shreve State College for livestock sales and exhibition facilities, Department of Conservation for small lakes, Department of Conservation for forestry facilities, Department of Parks, Department of Aeronautics for airport facilities, Department of Public Safety for police barracks?"
