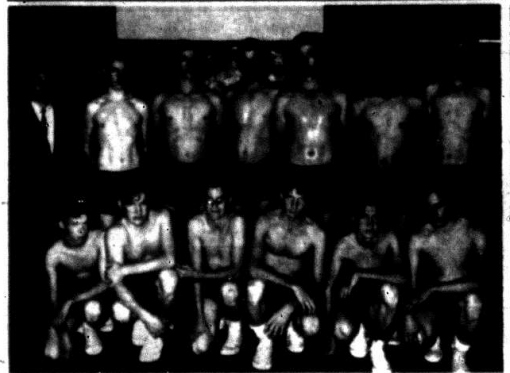

3 Teams Ready For Action

We'll just have to wait and see.

This statement generally sums up the three county basketball coaches feelings toward their teams as they begin another year on the hardwood.

How well the three teams (Broadhead, Livingston, and Mt. Vernon) will do will remain for the first few games to decide as the players get the feel of the hardwood.

Regardless of how well they do, one thing is obvious: All three schools will flourish the tallest teams in several seasons.

Although the three coaches—Jack Lawell at Mt. Vernon, Billy Kiddie at Broadhead, and Preston Parrett at Livingston—qualified their answers, it appears Livingston will be the county team to beat, especially because of height and experience.

Following close behind Livingston will be tall and very lithe, talented Broadhead, that on any given night will give any team a "bad time."

LHS opens Friday night at Clay County.

Brohead will have only one player returning from last year's starting five, but the "new four" will have a lot of basketball under their collective belts.

Biggest question mark will be Mt. Vernon. With three returning lettermen from last season, the Red Devils are expected to improve gradually as the season progresses. MVHS will have its tallest team since about 1961, and could develop into a strong club.

There will be changes in county basketball this season. The three teams are now a part of the 4th District along with Clay County, Annville, Tyler, McKee, and Oneida. They are now in the 13th Region, made up of Rockcastle, Clay, Knox, Bell, Whitley, and Jackson counties, an admitted strong region.

There is also a change in scheduling. The emphasis this year is on teams to the east rather than to the west, because of region and district play.

At Livingston
Coach Parrett, at the moment, does not have much hope for LHS. But he does have hopes as the season goes along. Here is his statement: "Our Blue Devils have the potential to be a strong club, but so far we haven't shown too much. In pre-season practice, we've looked poor. We are making errors that shouldn't happen. Our shooting has been poor, and we're not running our offensive patterns well. Our physical condition is the worst I've seen since I have been here. Our boys admit this and know the reason."

"However, the Devils usually get off to a slow start. We usually lose four out of our first six games before we wake up. We usually have to get our heads kicked off before we start doing things right. We believe in a disciplined offensive type of play and we have to shift our lineup to get the type of play we want. It takes time to find the right five to do the job we want. Our material is of good size and experience and we are working to develop bench strength. We will

Rockcastle County voters went to the polls Tuesday and gave the state road bond issue a near 2 to 1 majority.

The unofficial tally shows 829 voted for the bond issue and 746 opposed it.

For Rockcastle, the bond issue vote was a switch from 1960 when a similar bond issue "led" nearly 2 to 1. Statewide, it was undoubtedly a victory for Gov. Edward Breathitt who said the bond issue to the public as a bargain.

Throughout the state, the bond issue carried by landslide margins.

In the county, surprisingly, only two precincts voted against the bond issue—East Livingston and Conway. But in both cases, the difference was only a few votes. The vote was a surprise in that both precincts are crossed by a federal highway.

In Conway the vote was 67 against, and 56 for. In East Livingston, 65 against, and 57 for the bonds.

5-DAY SEASON FOR DEER SET

Kentucky's five day gun deer hunting season will open over the greatest territory in modern day history on Nov. 10 and continue through Nov. 14 with prospects for a better than average season. Minor Clark, commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, said today.

The five-day season will be in effect in 50 counties, while six counties, opened for the first time in deer hunting, will have a one-day season. Nov. 13, this year counties in the eastern part of the state will be open to only split deer (specimens of which must be at least three inches long) while in all other open counties either sex deer may be hunted.

Last year during the gun season over 16,000 persons took part in the deer hunt and harvested slightly more than 4,000 deer, a ratio of one deer for every four hunters, which Commissioner Clark said is an unusually high percentage.

Those counties where antlered deer only may be killed are: Lewis, Greenup, Estill, Boone, Putnam, Hancock, Morgan, Wolfe, Powell, Elliott, Lee, Breathitt, Floyd, Letcher, Perry, Knott, Floyd, Owens...

Diabetes Week: Free Sugar Test

Underlining the importance of the 1965 Detection Drive, Dr. Jack Lewis, Drive Chairman, pointed out this week that the number of people with diabetes had doubled since 1950.

"Diabetics and potential diabetics in the population now number about one person in twenty," Dr. Lewis said. "Since we know there are 1,000,000 hidden diabetics in the United States we can assume that 104 are living in Rockcastle County. We're going to help as many of them as we can."

The only way they can possibly be sure they have diabetes is to be tested. That's why we want to persuade as many people as possible to be tested.

National Diabetes Week is Nov. 8-14. Free sugar tests will be free diabetes tests for residents. The location of testing centers will be published in next issue of the Signal.
