The State Highway Department notified the Mt. Vernon City Council in person Monday at Frankfort that it had received the design for the city to come up with money for a lake at Renfro Valley from Feb. 18 to March 11.

Department officials did work in right-of-way and land acquisition and design details for the stretch of Interstate 75 between Green Hill School Road and the proposed Burr Interchange was progressing slower than anticipated, and under the circumstances the date could be extended to March 11.

The extension was good news to the city since it gives the city more time in which to negotiate for a grant for the \$1,144,000 lake project. The city hopes to get an 80 per cent grant for the project and borrow the remainder from a federal agency at a low interest rate.

At the meeting, William E. Davis, state director of the Economic Development Administration, told the council he would be off to Washington this week with a copy of the project, and he hoped the city could apply officially for a grant by the end of next week.

The state apparently has March 11 deadline. So save state officials, that they would be off to Washington immediately to take options on the necessary land that will be covered by the lake. They told the council in some where property owners were hesitant to file a suit of condemnation immediately so the lake project will not be delayed.

The state officials stated to the council it would be better to negotiate a price for the lake if possible.

Two other pieces of business involving the lake project were settled at the meeting. The state and city agreed on the route for the re-location of Rose Hill Road at Harrods Valley. The relocation was reported, pending a more detailed survey.

The state also agreed to allow the city to install a feeder line from the lake to the site of a city water treatment plant.

The project Director Davis will take to Washington (as noted) will total \$1,144,000. The project includes a new water treatment plant between the dam and US 20, additional lines and water tanks in the city of Mt. Vernon; new lines work along US 150 to Harrods Valley; new lines to Harrods and Harrods along Brush Creek Road about half-way to Orlando; a new line to Harrods Valley; and a new line to Harrods Valley.

Based on an 80 per cent grant, the federal government would pay \$915,000. A grant does not have to be repaid. The city would have to borrow about \$229,000. However, there is the possibility that other grants of smaller amounts could be obtained to raise the city's grant funds even more.

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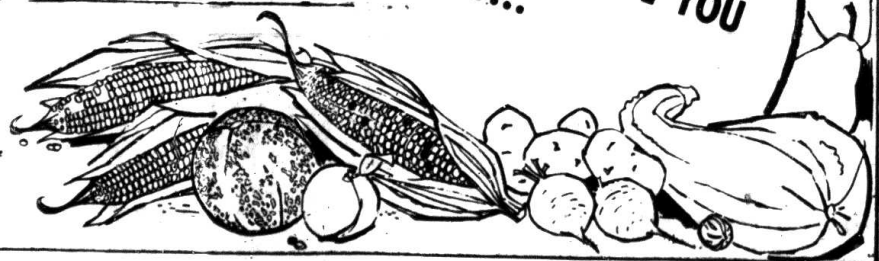
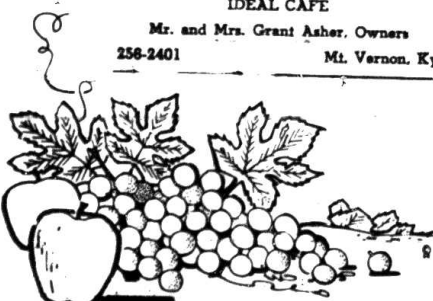
