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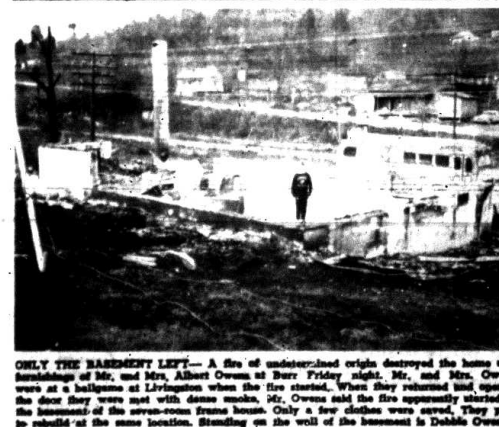

Hearing Underway For Auto Insurance

Liability insurance costs
 for motorists in Rockcastle
 County would be increased
 \$7 annually if a proposed to
 revise auto insurance rates is
 granted.

A public hearing on adjust-
 ments and new rate schedules
 began this week before Ken-
 tucky Insurance Commission-
 er William E. Blavin.
 Requested by two national
 rating organizations, the Na-
 tional Bureau of Casualty
 Underwriters (NBCU) and

the National Automobile Un-
 derwriters Association (NA-
 UA), the changes include in-
 creases in most counties but
 collision insurance and in-
 creases in some counties but
 reduction in others for cover-
 age in an attempt to show justifi-
 cation for the insurance revisi-
 ons.

For Rockcastle County,
 comprehensive protection
 would decrease by \$3. The
 yearly cost for \$100,000 deduct-
 ible insurance protection
 would be increased \$6.
 Revisions vary for different

areas of the state which is
 divided into a dozen rating
 territories according to popula-
 tion and traffic volume. The
 NBCU and NAUA are presen-
 ting accident data experi-
 ments from these rating areas
 in an attempt to show justifi-
 cation for the insurance revisi-
 ons.

Commissioner Blavin, prior
 to the hearing, announced
 that he has sent three
 deputies to the NBCU office
 in New York to verify the ac-
 curacy of the data compli-

ances made by the agency.
 Protecting the rate changes
 are the Kentucky Automobile
 Club, the Kentucky Automobile
 Club of Trial Lawyers and the
 Kentucky Automobile Club
 of Trial Lawyers.
 Blavin told the protesters
 that the three deputies would
 explain their finding during
 the course of the hearing.
