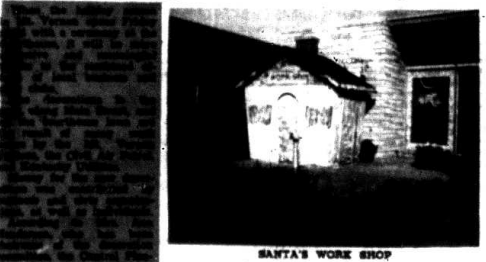

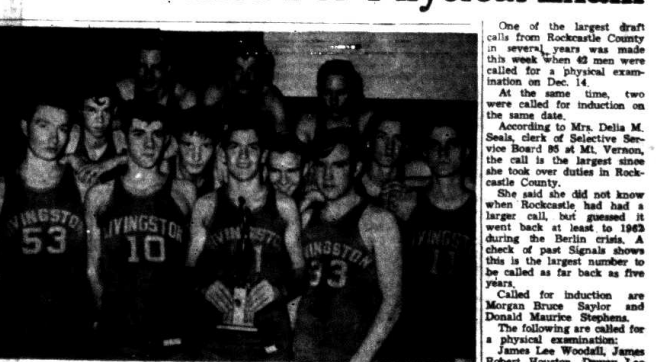

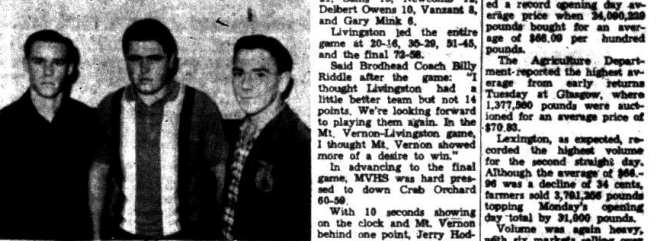

TO COUNTY TAX COMMISSIONERS AND CITY ASSESSORS
Summary of Provisions of House Bill 1

This circular is to inform you of the more significant provisions of House Bill 1 which was enacted by the 1st Extraordinary Session, 1965, of the General Assembly.

1. Effective in 1966 and each year hereafter, House Bill 1:

	Present Rate	New Rate
Real Estate	5¢	1 1/2¢
Unmanufactured Agricultural Products	5¢	1 1/2¢
Farm Implements and Farm Machinery	50¢	1/10 of 1¢
Livestock and Domestic Fowl	50¢	1/10 of 1¢
Tangible Personal Property (not subject to another specified tax rate)	50¢	15¢

2. Reduce city and county maximum tax rates per \$100 of assessed value on certain types of property as follows:

	Present Rate	New Rate
Unmanufactured Tobacco	5¢	1 1/2¢
Unmanufactured Agricultural Products	5¢	1 1/2¢

- Reduce the rate on the rolling stock of railroad car companies and irregular route common carrier truck companies assessed by the Department of Revenue from \$2.50 to \$1.00 upon each \$100 of assessed value.
- Limits the amount of local property tax revenue produced by the regular school tax rate (old \$1.50 rate) of each district board of education to that produced in the preceding year by voted levies and new property added to the tax roll each year.
- Limits the amount of local property tax revenue produced by the regular county rate (old 50¢ rate) to that produced in the preceding year, except for voted levies and new property added to the tax roll each year.
- Limits the regular city rate to a rate not to exceed the compensating rate defined below.
- Limits all special voted levies of cities, counties, and school districts to a rate not to exceed the compensating rate defined below, except that the rate must be sufficient to meet the required principal and interest payments of the indebtedness.
- Limits the tax levied by all special taxing districts to the compensating tax rate defined below.
- For the school years 1966-1967 and 1967-1968, House Bill 1 permits each district board of education to increase its revenue produced by the regular rate (old \$1.50 rate) by up to 10 per cent for each of the two years, after holding a properly advertised public hearing.
- For the tax years 1966 and 1967, House Bill 1 permits each county to increase its revenue produced by the regular rate (old 50¢ rate) by up to 10 per cent for each of the two years, after holding a properly advertised public hearing.
- For the two years following the effective date of this act, House Bill 1 permits each city to increase its revenue produced by the regular rate by up to 10 per cent for each of the two years, after holding a properly advertised public hearing.
- Permits counties with a population of 100,000 or more to levy an occupational tax not to exceed 1/8 of 1 per cent on residents of the county for the purposes of the property subject to taxation by the county for the 1965 tax year, produces an amount of revenue approximately equal to that produced in 1965.

In addition to the provisions of House Bill 1 listed above, the bill places one direct responsibility upon all state and local assessing officials. All state and local assessing officials shall maintain a list of all improvements shewn and tangible personal property which are added to the tax rolls, and a list of all such properties which are deleted from the rolls. These lists shall be maintained on the forms and in the manner prescribed by the Department of Revenue.

that in order to qualify for a new grower-tobacco allotment (Barley, Dark Air-cured, or Fire-cured), all of the following requirements must be met:

The applicant must:

- Have had at least two years experience within the last 5 years (1961-1963) in growing the type of tobacco requested in the application as owner, operator, shareholder, or cash renter. (Tobacco produced on a farm that had no acreage allotment will not be considered for experience.)
- Own the farm.
- Operate the farm.
- The farm must not have a 1966 allotment established for any kind of tobacco at the time the application is filed.
- Obtain, during 1966, more than 50 percent of his income from the production of agricultural commodities or products from the farm for which the new farm allotment application is filed.
