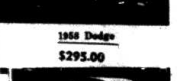

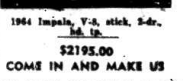

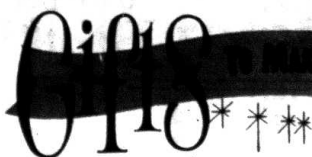

### Feed Grain Program For 1966 Announced

The feed grain program for 1966 will be essentially unchanged in form, but payment rates will be adjusted to encourage broader participation by farmers, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced.

Changes in the program are either those required by law or those which reflect legislative history established this year when the new program was enacted.

Continuing objectives of the program are to strengthen income of producers, particularly those who make full use of the program, and to keep production in balance with consumption while maintaining adequate reserves. Underlying the whole effort is the need to hold down Government costs.

Freeman M. Hockensmith, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization Committee, points out that the sinup for the 1966 feed grain program will be held early next year. The program will follow the pattern of recent years. Farmers will be asked to divert a minimum 20 percent of the feed grain base acreage to conserving uses. Those who participate will receive in-

come-maintaining payments, and they will be eligible for the support loans.

Changes in payment provisions include:

- Yields for determining payments will be projected at higher levels to reflect current trends than historic yields as has been the practice.
- No diversion payment will be made for minimum diversions, except for small base-acreage farms (25 acres or less), but payments for additional diversion will be higher than in 1965.
- The loan rate (for corn and grain sorghum) will be lowered, but total payments to maximum participation will be higher.

### Feed Grain Program For 1966 Announced

For individual grains, the 1966 program rates, compared with the 1965 rates, are as follows:

- Corn, per bushel, \$1, down from \$1.05; support payment, 30 cents, up from 20 cents; total support, \$1.30, up from \$1.25.
- Barley, per bushel, stays at 30 cents; support payment, 30 cents, up from 20 cents in 1965; total support, \$1 up from 50 cents.

Boosting the price-support payments and lowering the loan rates will result in channeling program benefits more directly to those farmers who by their participation share the responsibility of stabilizing agricultural conditions and supplies. The lower loans also will further encourage the growing export market for U. S. feed grains.

Diversion payment rates - on all acreage diverted beyond the minimum 20 percent of the farm's base acreage, up to a maximum of 50 percent - will be figured on one-half of the total county price-support rate (loan plus the payment) multiplied by the farm's project yield.

Special small-farm benefits under the 1966 feed and grain program provide that a small-

farm producer with a feed grain base of 25 acres or less may divert all of his acreage and receive diversion payments on all of it. On the first 30 percent diversion, these farmers will be eligible for a payment at a rate of 20 percent of the county support rate applied to the diverted acre on the basis of projected yields.

On additional diversion, the rate will be at 40 percent of the county support rate. Small-farm producers who divert less than the maximum will be eligible for diversion payment on the entire acreage diverted and, price-support payments and loans. Higher rates and yields used in the 1966 program will provide these farmers, particularly those who divert the maximum acreage, a higher payment than under the year's program.

The 1966 feed grain program also provides for substitution of wheat and feed grain acreage and for production of production of wheat on out-rye bases.

National average loan rates will be 60 cents per bushel for 1966-crop oats and \$1.02 per bushel for rye, both unchanged from 1965 support prices. As in the past, these grains are not included in the feed grain program and all production is eligible for loans.

**Governor Talks About Cucumbers**

New steps have been taken to enlarge Kentucky's cucumber crop, Governor Edward T. Breathitt has announced.

Breathitt said the steps were planned at a recent meeting of cucumber growers and representatives of State government, the University of Kentucky Extension Service and the pickle-processing industry.

"The growing of cucumbers for pickle processing is becoming a valuable cash crop for many C. Kentuckians," Breathitt said, "but not enough cucumbers are being grown to meet the demands of the pickle-processing industry." Pointed out was Rockcastle County.

Breathitt said a meeting was called after the recent year by a major processor and packer of pickles—Payson Foods of Louisville—that additional acreage be made available for commercial growing of cucumbers during the 1966 season.

Paramount administrative assistant W. C. Burr said his firm is hoping for a minimum addition of 700 acres for 1966.

"We would be much happier with 1,000 or more new acres," Burr said.

As a result of the meeting these steps will be taken:

- Hubert Davis, horticulture specialist with the U. K. Extension Service will meet with farm representatives to determine the feasibility of growing cucumbers in their counties.

Burr pointed to Rockcastle County as an example of the potential impact of cucumbers on a local economy. He said more than \$7,000 was added to the Rockcastle economy last summer from the sale of cucumbers, payments to local truckers for hauling and wages paid locally.

Rockcastle County raised the largest crop of cucumbers in the state last year—a total of 29,200 bushels.

Davis and Burr think there are more Rockcastle counties waiting to be discovered.

Governor Breathitt apparently agrees. "Kentucky-made pickles should be made with Kentucky-grown cucumbers," he said. "I want to urge the small farmers with the available labor force throughout the state to consider the grow-

ing of cucumbers as a source of additional income."

Breathitt and his Commission on Agriculture are pushing for an annual farm income of one billion dollars.
