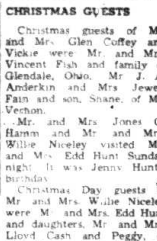

REPAIR TAKES ABOUT 4 HOURS

About 40,000 gallons of water were down the drain in Mt. Vernon Monday when a six-inch water main broke on Main Street.

For awhile, Main Street looked like a river as the surge of water poured up from test holes drilled in the concrete pavement by water works employees as they searched for the break.

It was the most serious break Mt. Vernon has experienced and it shut off water on Main Street between US 26 and the Armour Plant for about two hours when the break was repaired.

Some business had to halt work, especially where appliances and boilers are used.

Water Works Superintendent Jack Craig said the break was caused by construction done to cold water line plant entering the pipe. He also said there was a flaw in the pipe which was installed about 1957.

Actually, the water works employees handled the job with more water off only two hours and the city had a major break on its hands. The entire job took four hours to repair, but the water was turned off only two hours as an aid to business.

When first discovered about 9:15 a. m., the break did not appear to be serious. When a test hole was drilled through the concrete by Charles Brooks, water had accumulated below the surface shot up into the air.

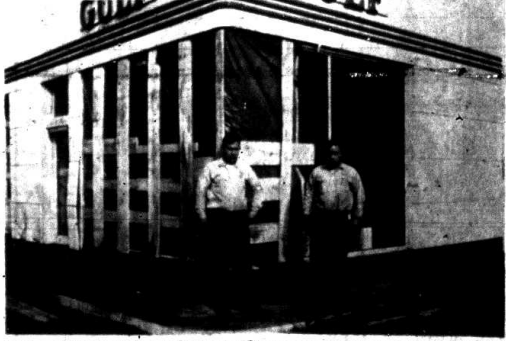

JUDGE CARTER EXPRESSED HIS APPRECIATION AND THANKS

At this, my last time to address the people of the county as county judge I want to thank all the people and express my appreciation for their help as citizens to carry on the affairs of the county. I want to point out some of the things that have been accomplished during my past four years as judge.

I raised the election of jurors pay from \$5.00 per day to \$10.00, which they deserved; we bonded every precinct for the county that the legislature said had to be done; redistricted the magistrature districts to conform to the precincts, that number 10 to 11, a saving to the county of \$100,000 a year.

I bought a new gravel loader, bought a new county order this year, bought and now have 6 new county dump trucks. Our roads are in better condition than they have ever been in.

I did not see a new courthouse and jail of which I am very proud, and I believe 90% of the people are just as proud of it as I am. I am aware of the fact that this may have been one of the factors that defeated me, but I want to say I had rather have the courthouse and jail than be defeated than to have been elected a dozen times and not have it. But I don't believe we would have the new courthouse and jail if I had not been County Judge. I am and was at the time we built the new courthouse and jail thinking of the future generation and not myself.

I did all of these things without any additional taxes. We have enough money RIGHT NOW on deposit in THE BANK OF MT. VERNON, in the courthouse and jail fund to pay for the bonds and interest due this fiscal year amounting to \$4200.00 which will be due February 1st, 1966. The county will collect about \$1000.00 more for rent to this fund plus about \$7000.00 in surplus money due from taxes to be deposited to this courthouse and jail fund at the end of the fiscal year if the fiscal court carries on in the future as we have in the past. So you see the county does not need any more money from taxes to carry on.

We have PLenty of money to do these things now as county taxes so. So I am proud of what has been accomplished during my administration as far as to my judicial duties I have only this to say, I tried to give everybody a fair and impartial trial, white, black, rich or poor, friend or foe, according to law.

I don't think anybody will question this. I did not agree with everybody, State Police and some of the magistrates, but I agree with them when they were legally right according to the statutes of the law. When I thought I was right I didn't hesitate to say so. If a Judge doesn't do that he is no longer the Judge, and fits to be called a Judge. We only elect one county judge to each county and the people expect him to be THE JUDGE and not the State Police or some one that is not elected to the office.

In closing I want to say I have no malice in my heart toward any one and to the ones who voted against me, that was their privilege, to the ones that voted for me I say thanks beyond measure. The things mentioned above that have been accomplished is a challenge and mandate to our incoming officials. They will have the same magistrates to work with the next four years I have had, and the magistrates will co-operate with them the same as they have me, if they will give them the leadership they deserve. They are a progressive set of magistrates and will want our county to go forward.

I have been County Judge of this county four terms and I am the only County Judge to ever succeed himself, I was a deputy sheriff four years and a member of the legislature two years, so I am not deprived of much by leaving.

Again I say thank you and may the county go forward and progress as we should.
