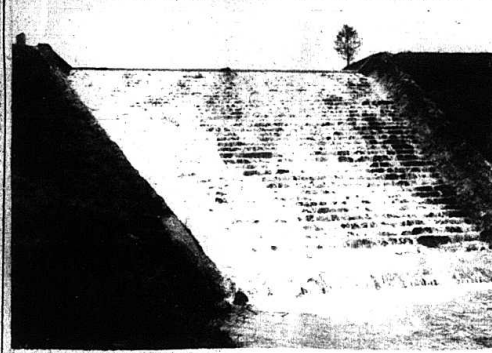

## 3 Inch Rain Breaks Drouth



Water came back to Rockcastle County this past week end.

That scarce item that had eluded laundromats, dried up ponds, and set trucks to hauling from any acceptable source, came back in a deluge.

Three fronts—one warm, one cold and both followed by a low pressure trough—all converged over Kentucky and dumped 3.23 inches of rain on Mt. Vernon between 4 a. m., Saturday and 4 a. m., Monday.

The rainfall brought smiles to whom's faces, set crocks and branches to running, and set sluggish Dix and Rockcastle rivers rushing along at a fast clip.

Basically, on Monday everything was back to normal waterwise.

It was the first appreciable rainfall since the middle of November, and brought the year's total to 43.55 inches, or about 1.22 inches over the yearly average of about 49 inches. There was a total of 48.25 inches of precipitation in 1964.

A check of statistics kept by Bill Cox at the Weather Bureau Station at Mt. Vernon produced some interesting figures, and shows how Rockcastle fell generally in precipitation this year.

Largest amount of rainfall in 1965 occurred in January, with 8.49 inches, including snow and rain. In March, a total of 8.87 inches fell.

As the year progressed, the rainfall decreased markedly. In May, only 1.15 inches fell. In November, there was 1.88 inches, and December a low 57 of an inch, indicating the reasons for the extended drouth.

To compare these figures with the same months in 1964, there was 3.89 inches less in November; 4.30 inches less, and in December 1964, a whopping total of 6.97 inches less.

But there were drier than usual months in 1964 as well as 1965. In May, there was 1.74 inches less in May 1964, and 1.78 inches in October 1964. The month by month total precipitation for 1965 is as follows:

January 9.40; February 3.22; March 8.97; April 3.35; May 1.15; June 2.26; July 4.97; August 5.99; September 2.81; October 1.78; November 1.88; and December .57. During Dry December, there was rainfall measured on only five days - Dec. 17; Dec. 15, 4; Dec. 21, 3; Dec. 25, 32; and Dec. 26, 3. Back in 1964, the wettest months were April with 6.06 inches, July with 5.99 inches, September with 5.97 inches, and as noted, December with 6.87 inches.

The rainfall last week end will be counted as they have totals as 1.87 inches on Jan. 1; 1.94 inches on Jan. 2 and 2.11 inches on Jan. 3.

For the record, the low temperature in 1965 occurred on Jan. 31 when it was 9 below zero. The high temperature of the year occurred on two dates. On July 24 and Aug. 11 it was 94 degrees.

Water supplies in Mt. Vernon and Brothead are as normal today as they have been all year. But many residents will help to increase the supply by raising the underground water level.

Wednesday, the old rain-maker again smiled on Rockcastle and dumped another 3.23 of an inch to the 3.22 inches that fell over the weekend. It was still raining in the afternoon.

Said one city official: "I hope the two towns will not have a water problem now that they are safe for awhile. The same problems probably occur next year and the next. The towns should continue in their efforts to work toward their lakes to fully remedy the water shortage problem."

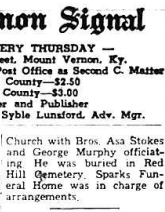

## Stop Black Shank By Protection Now

If your tobacco crop in 1965 was plagued with black shank, take precautions now to protect the 1966 crop.

Here are some things to remember, says Dr. Joe Smitley, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service specialist.

(1) Clean all tools and equipment used on the infested crop, from plant bed through final hauling to the barn.

(2) Let the infested ground rest three years. This

generally will clear up black shank organisms.

(3) If you must spread sweepings and stalks from the barn where black shank tobacco was housed, put it back on the land from which the infested crop came. Then let the land rest three years. Never put sweepings of stalks from an infested crop on new, clean land.

(4) Don't put sweepings or stalks on land if surface water from that land will drain into a creek or stream. This will simply spread the organism.

(5) The black shank fungus lives longer on heavily used land.

(6) Overflow land seems to be freed more quickly of the fungus. Apparently, long soaking makes the resting spores germinate, then disappear. Thus, overflow land which cannot be reinfected from tobacco stubble may be safer for rotation than higher land.

(7) Never use stable manure on tobacco land if the farm has had black shank. The manure is likely to be contaminated with the fungus and will infest new land. Livestock and power equipment can carry the fungus to clean land.

## TOBACCO SALES RESUME HIGH

A generally stronger trend made itself evident Tuesday on the Blue Grass Burley Belt as tobacco sales resumed after the Christmas holidays, according to J. Frank Adam, Herald.

Increased volume in leaf and a higher price average contrasted with the last sale before the holidays on Dec. 11.

Yesterday's average for the seven markets nearest to but outside Fayette County was \$66.49 a hundred, up \$1.71 from the last preholiday sale. Volume yesterday was 4,612,166 pounds, and total money paid was \$3,066,680.02.

Only one of the markets had a lower average than its last sale before the holidays, and that one was down only 13 cents. The other six averages were from \$1 to \$4.32 higher.

Each of the markets sold more than a half million pounds yesterday.

Highest average of the seven was \$68.72 at Mt. Sterling, up \$2.24 from the 17 cent sale.

Danville averaged \$67.49 for a gain of \$1 over the Dec. 17 sale.

Other averages on the Blue Grass Belt yesterday and their variations from the last preholiday sale were: Harrodsburg, \$66.81, up \$1.15; Cinchthisa, \$66.34, up \$1.00; Richmond, \$65.75, up \$1.42; Wynetha, \$65.62, up \$2.25, and Paris, \$64.88, down 13 cents.
