### Two Appointed Heart Chairman

Mrs. John P. Allen will serve as Rockcastle County Heart Fund chairman, with Mrs. Clyde Barnett as co-chairman. Both women are serving their third year for the Heart Fund drive.  
The drive begins on Feb. 1 and continues through the month.

Mr. Matlock, himself a recovered heart attack victim, pointed out he has come to know first-hand of the "almost miraculous progress" science has made against heart and blood vessel diseases, and of how the Kentucky Heart Association, "by its effective use of Heart Fund dollars in the State's communities, hospitals and medical research laboratories has virtually furthered this progress."

He announced that the annual door-to-door Heart Sunday solicitation would be conducted this year on Feb. 20.

**E-H Bond Sales**  
The Series E and H Savings Bonds sales in Rock-

castle County during December were \$13,832, bringing the final sales for the year to \$88,238 or 114 per cent of the annual goal of \$77,400.  
For Kentucky, sales of both series for the same month totaled \$4,252,355, bringing the cumulative sales to \$51,521,177 or 95.4 per cent of the \$54,000,000 annual goal.  
Rockcastle was among 14 Kentucky counties exceeding its 1965 goal.  
Nationally, the sales in December were \$326 million while the total amount outstanding of both Series-E and H Savings Bonds reached an all time high of \$49,246 million and showed an investment gain of \$883 million during 1965.

#### Phone Billing

Beginning January 20th, monthly IBM telephone billing for the Kentucky Telephone Company will be transferred from Chicago, Ill. to Wentzville, Mo. It was announced this week by W. W. Thomason, president of Kentucky Telephone Company.

Effective with this transfer, the customer bill will take on a new look, Thomason stated. Each customer will receive, each month, a combined local service and toll bill. Also, an IBM payment card plus a window return envelope will be enclosed. Thomason further stated the importance of the customer returning the IBM payment card together with the payment each month.

The new bills will carry the imprint of the Continental Telephone Company which is presently in the process of merging Telephones, Inc., present parent company of the Kentucky Telephone Co.

Each customer is requested to use the IBM payment card together with the return envelope each month, and also

to direct any questions to the nearest business office of the Kentucky Telephone Company.

#### Selecting Tobacco

What tobacco variety should you pick for the 1966 burley crop? The one that does the best job for you, says Dr. Joe Smiley, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service specialist. "Each farmer has reasons for the variety he picks. His farm has a certain type soil environment, which may include black root rot, fusarium wilt or black shank organisms. Thus selection of the proper variety for the farm is important.

Some notes on varieties: If your land has a black root problem, or fusarium wilt, (or both), KY 12 or MS B 21 X KY 12 (a hybrid) is recommended. If wildfire is a problem, either Burley 21 or KY 12 are recommended; these are the only two recommended for wildfire control. Using a resistant variety is a last resort. A better system is riding the farm of the black shank organisms by staying on infested ground for at least three years. Such a long-term rotation plan depends on whether the farmer has enough land to do this and is willing to plan his tobacco operation to control black shank.

A farmer has free choice of varieties. Stick with the variety that has given you best yields and quality. If you want to switch, use the stick-row system first to compare the present variety with the ones you are considering.

If you're still using KY 16, KY 41A, KY 35 or KY 26, you are penalizing yourself. Burley 21, KY 10, KY 12 and hybrids are the best varieties now for Kentucky use. This has been shown by field checks.

Names of the two "parents" used in making hybrids determine the hybrid's name. The female parent's name comes first. Example MSB 21 X L8 means that Male-Sterile Burley 21 is the female parent and L8 is the male parent.

No significant differences in yield or quality have been found when parents are switched in a hybrid variety such as MSB 21 X L8 against MS L8 X B 21. Most hybrids offered for sale will be half Burley 21. This should improve smoking and acceptance of the leaf. MS KY 12 X L8 should be more useful than MS B 21 X L8 where black root rot or fusarium wilt is a problem. A hybrid may carry a lower degree of resistance to a disease than the more resistant parent. Example: The hybrid from Burley 21 X KY 10 will have less black root rot resistance than KY 10 but more than Burley 21.

#### Chickweed

If chickweed and henbit are heavy in your alfalfa fields, you may get a chance at killing them later this winter. Prof. J. F. Freeman, University of Kentucky Agriculture Experiment Station agronomist, says the weed-killer DNBP (premerge or Sinox PE) can be sprayed on infested fields before spring.

But, he notes, for proper effect, weather must be relatively warm (55 to 60 degrees F.) for 12 hours after application and clear and dry. Otherwise, applying the spray (during colder weather

or rainy weather) will not give good results. "Chances are in late winter we'll have spells of relatively warm, clear, dry weather. The spraying then will benefit alfalfa crops in the spring. We are told many fields are heavily infested with chickweed and henbit." Recommended rate is from one to three quarts of the material in 20 to 40 gallons of water per acre. Use the higher rate if henbit and chickweed are heavily matted in the fields. Freeman, noted that some farmers may have applied such a spray (a one-quart an

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acre rate)-this fall, when chickweed and August-seeded alfalfa plants were very small. A follow-up spraying during March warm spells will probably give good control of chickweed and germinating henbit.
