

They got nowhere, but said they would study the problem further and make a ryturn visit.

isit. The so-called remedy to the traffic problem in Mt.

Vernon started over a month
ago when the State Highway ago when the State Highway Department removed a stop sign at the corner of Main and Richmond streets in downtown Mt. Vernon.

The idea, said the state, was to make one less stop for traffic through Mt. Vernon, and incent

and increase the flow of traffic. They also installed signs on the east and west comers of Main Street indi-

comers of Main Street indi-cating "Cross Traffic Does Not Stop."
Following removal of the sign there was a chorus of voices raised locally pro-testing the change as dan-

gerous and unneccessary.

Thursday night, the state
engineers proposed bringing engineers proposed bringing truck traffic down Main Street, and the installation of "an elaborate traffic signal

One stop-go signal would be located in the vicinity of the Dinner Bell Restaurant, and the other at the corner of Main and Richmond streets. The lights would be syn-

cronized for northbound trucks. Westbound trucks would continue on US 150 as

they do now.

The engineers said first they had the idea of widening the corner of US 25 and US 150 for right turning trucks. but estimated the but estimated the cost at a minimum of \$8,000. They said the money would come from state 9 to 1 matching, funds and this expenditure would mean a loss of about \$72,000 at the 9 to 1 rate. So, they said, the widening project was abandoned.
