## Sign Up Grain

The sign-up for the 1966 programs for wheat, feed grains and cotton will be on January 31, 1966, first man M. Hockensmith, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, announced today. The sign-up deadline will be April 1, 1966.

For the long-term Crop-Land Adjustment Program (CAP), the sign-up will begin on the same date as for the commodity programs, January 31, 1966; the signing deadline for CAP will be announced later. Producers who file intentions under CAP but do not enter into final agreements will have 15 days to file applications to take part in one or more of the annual commodity programs after application is drawn or after the county committee notifies them that no agreement will be available.

The Chairman explained that, for 1966, a flexible schedule of signups has been adopted throughout the country, with each ASC State Committee determining the most appropriate period for the activity. In Kentucky, the sign-up period is uniform in all counties.

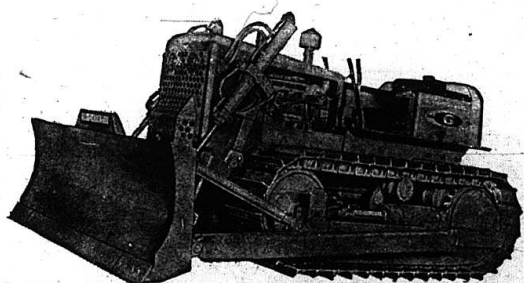

## Snow, Slush, Slips, Slides Signify Spring Still Skulks

We were all lucky Tuesday! Old Man Winter was more than ready when he kept an 11-inch snow belt at Richmond and left Rockcastle County and Southern Kentucky with only a drizzle - about 30 of an inch.

His decision to send rain hereabouts was also welcome in that it helped melt some of the 15 inches of snow that has clogged Route 256 County for over two weeks.

But we had our moments of anxiety Tuesday, as radio reports indicated that snow in large amounts had descended on Louisville, and had moved eastward to Harrodsburg, and south to Richmond.

But there it stopped. Better still it turned to rain. Said the Weather Bureau, the low pressure area stopped briefly and fed warm air into breezes over Southern Kentucky sending the rain and bringing temperatures above the 32 degree freezing mark for the first time in nearly two weeks.

But we had our share of snow. Following a two-day, 6-inch snow on Jan. 22 and 23, the cold moved in sending temperatures to a numbing 12 below zero the morning of Jan. 30, according to Bill Cox, who keeps Weather Bureau records at Mt. Vernon.

For most of the time, schools were closed, and folks crunched and staggered along on the snow. There were few auto accidents due to necessary slow driving. After the first snow, State Highway Department road crews worked overtime to clear the roads. Main roads in Rockcastle were in the best shape of any county hereabouts. Side roads remained slippery, but the department was busy with main traffic arteries, and had too little snow removal equipment.

But Old Man Winter was not to be outdone. Late Monday, the Weather Bureau began warning residents that more snow was on the way, but not more than an inch. Then early Tuesday the Bureau changed its mind as the storm gained momentum, moved across Texas, Arkansas, and into Kentucky and Tennessee. He said Louisville and most of Kentucky could get as much as a foot unless something happened.

It did happen around here. The snow line, as indicated, stopped at Richmond. Once again, and still fighting, Old Man Winter again sent snow over the area, but precisely Wednesday morning were that it would be of a minor nature unless something happened again.

Residents have one pleasant thing to contemplate, despite Weather Bureau predictions Wednesday morning of a snowier than usual - colder than usual - February, the ground hog did not see his shadow Tuesday in Rockcastle that we know of.

No, spring is only two months and we're left, 20 more cold fronts away.

### LET THEM WAIT!!!

State Highway Department traffic engineers from Frankfort visited the Mt. Vernon City Council the other night to suggest a "candy" to Vernon that is going to exist, they said, for a couple of years, or until 1-75 is completed. (See story on this page). As we told the engineers, the state created the current problem by taking down the stop sign at the corner of Main and Richmond streets. We admit, on week ends in summer, traffic is delayed, but not for long, and it is only going to be temporary. We wonder why the state should spend thousands of dollars on an elaborate signal system or street widening projects on a temporary remedy. The original stop sign worked for 20 years or longer. Putting it back will save money, time, ruffled feelings, and what-not. So Ohio traffic, or some commuting state "wheel" from Frankfort is delayed five minutes. So, let them wait.

### AND FURTHER

We hear that very soon, if not already, the state will take down the traffic signs reading "Cross Traffic Does Not Stop at This Sign" at the corner of Main and Richmond streets. The state engineers told us the other night that local people had learned that traffic does not stop, so the signs could be taken down any day. We presume the stop sign, on the same pole, will remain.

### STRIP MINING

We are very happy to see that the State Legislature, by an overwhelming vote, has approved a strict strip mining law for Kentucky. It has been needed for a long time, as our most important products is our beautiful hills, and there's no doubt that strip mining leaves rough, ugly scars. The quick turn of a few dollars for oil and coal is not worth a generation of damage to our mountains.

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Traffic engineers from the State Highway Department at Frankfort visited the Mt. Vernon City Council Thursday night to discuss what they thought of the traffic problem through Mt. Vernon, and to propose a remedy. They got nowhere, but said they would study the problem further and make a return visit.

The so-called remedy to the traffic problem in Mt. Vernon started over a month ago when the State Highway Department removed a stop sign at the corner of Main and Richmond streets in downtown Mt. Vernon.

The idea, said the state, was to make one less stop for traffic through Mt. Vernon, and increase the flow of traffic. They also installed signs on the east and west corners of Main Street indicating "Cross Traffic Does Not Stop."

Following removal of the sign there was a chorus of voices raised locally protesting the change as dangerous and unnecessary. Thursday night, the state engineers tried to move bringing back the stop sign at the corner of Main and Richmond streets, and the installation of "an elaborate traffic signal system."

One stop sign would be located in the vicinity of the Dinner Hill Restaurant, and the other at the corner of Main and Richmond streets. The lights would be synchronized for northbound trucks. Westbound trucks will continue on US 150 as they do now.

The engineers said first they had the idea of widening the corner of US 25 and US 150 for right turning trucks, but estimated the cost at a minimum of \$8,000. They said the money would come from state 9 to 1 matching funds and this expenditure would mean a loss of about \$72,000 to the 9 to 1 rate. So they said, the widening project was abandoned.

They also pointed out that \$8,000 would be a lot of money to spend on a temporary remedy since most of Mt. Vernon's real problems would be solved with the construction of Interstate-75.

Nothing concrete came from the meeting with the Council. The councilmen and guests made suggestions. The engineer and they would study the problem further and come back at a later date with more proposals.

The engineers left the meeting with a parting shot. They said that in the final analysis, the state would decide the kind of traffic rules and regulations for the city to follow. In short, the city will have very little, if anything, to say about it.
