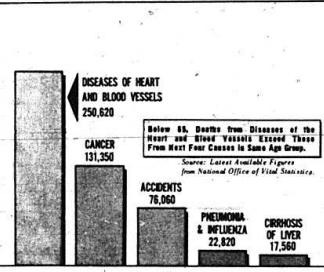

State Makes Main Street One-Way Going West

State Highway Department traffic engineers returned to the Mt. Vernon City Council Friday night, brought along a new traffic plan that will make Main Street one-way west, and asked the council to approve it.

It did 4-1. The only "no" vote was cast by Councilman Fred Morris on grounds that Main Street one-way would hurt business. Councilman Carl Kelley was absent.

Actually, the council had no alternative but to approve the plan. The state engineers had told them earlier the state did not have to have the approval of the council, but that it would be a show of cooperation if the council did along with the plan.

The engineers also told the council that the changes were needed to handle increasing traffic until Interstate 75 is completed in one to two years.

At that time, the engineers said, the city could do anything it wanted, including stepping back to the original stop sign; but that once the new traffic plan is working, the public may like it better.

The engineers said they would present the plan to State Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, and if he approved, the changes would be made as soon as possible.

The new plan, broken down, is as follows:

(1) Main Street will be one-way west between Richmond Street and First Street. First Street bounds the courthouse on the east.

(2) US 150, First Street, Church Street, Richmond Street, and Spring Street will remain two-way. For those who don't know, Jasper's Produce is located on Spring Street. West Main Street and East Main Street will remain two-way.

(3) Three loading zones will be established on the north side of Main Street for use of trucks unloading merchandise for business places.

(4) Two new traffic signals will be installed. One will be at the corner of Main and Richmond Street (Rockcastle Hotel). The other will be in front of the Diner Bell Restaurant.

The signals will be synchronized so that truck traffic will have a free turn at the Rockcastle Hotel corner. These signals are called "delay green" signals. The flashing red and caution light at US 150 and Richmond Street will remain as it is now.

The city hopes to persuade the State to help do some work on Spring Street so that it will be able to handle the increased traffic that is expected.

The most important change will be, as mentioned, at the corner of Main and Richmond. Southbound traffic up the hill will not be able to make a left turn on Main Street. Eastbound traffic of West Main Street will have to turn left or right.

Rep. Carter Visits Council

Rep. Tim Lee Carter told the Mt. Vernon City Council Friday night that he would do everything he could to help Rockcastle County in its projects involving the federal government.

The council met Friday night instead of Thursday so Representative Carter could attend.

He also told the council he felt Rockcastle County should be eligible for 80 per cent grant money on federal projects, instead of 60 per cent as recently announced by the Area Development Administration.

He said he felt there was an error in the percentage, and that he would check with officials in Washington immediately.

The council was particularly interested in the percentage since it is applying to the ADA for a grant to help build a dam at Renfro Valley.

The 20 per cent difference could make considerable difference to the city on the project.

The current estimated cost of the water project at Renfro Valley, including purchase of the land, additional power lines, and a new water plant, is \$1,185,000. The city would furnish \$458,000, unless the city can come up with additional grants from other agencies. Efforts are now being made to find additional grant money that will make the project easier for the city.

The council has agreed to apply for the 60 per cent grant through the ADA in hope Rep. Carter and John Whisman, Brechtitt, can get the percentage changed, or find the additional money.

The city must have some source of funds for its share of the cost of the project before Mar. 11 when the State Highway Department is scheduled to open bids on the Renfro Valley section of Interstate-75. The dam will be the roadbed for I-75 where it crosses Renfro Creek.

Representative Carter also advised the council there is ADA money available to cities for the purchase of industrial sites and that Mt. Vernon should take advantage of this money. He suggested an industrial commission be set up to handle this project.

"There are all kinds of programs for small cities that were passed by this last Congress," he said.

She will serve until the November 1967 general election. In short, the appointment is for one year and nine months. Another test will be given at that time by the state to qualify candidates for election to the Office of Tax Commissioner.

The state notified Judge Van Hook early Wednesday that four out of 18 who took the test passed it. The four were: Mrs. Carter, Clarence Carter, Mrs. Grace McComan, and David Henderson. From the four, Judge Van Hook chose Mrs. Carter.

She will take office immediately.

In making his decision, Judge Van Hook said: "I personally feel Mrs. Carter is ably qualified to serve in the important post of tax commissioner. Her years of service as deputy court clerk will be of great aid to her in this position."

Radios Deadlock Council

The absence of one Mt. Vernon City Councilman and the decision of another not to vote, were the forces that deadlocked the Mt. Vernon City Council Friday night over short wave radios for police work.

It was the second tie vote in the council in about 10 years—the first under the administration of Mayor Clyde Linville. About five years ago, the council tied 2-2 over another police matter, and Mayor Carl Brown was forced to untie the vote.

Friday night, the council again approached the question of the radios, as one councilman put it, "to get it over with and out of our hair."

During the intervening time between the two meetings, Mr. Baker was approached on receiving calls, but because of a shortage of personnel, rejected the request.

Water Superintendent Jack R. Craig told the council he then contacted Sparks Funeral Home and they had indicated they would not want to take on the job. He said he then called Cox Funeral Home and Bill Cox agreed to take the calls.

Councilman Charles Baker then spoke up to tell the council that he had been approached recently by a resident and told that if the radio was in Cox Funeral Home it could conceivably be used for business purposes. For example, he noted, Cox could send an ambulance if the person were reporting a wreck. Baker said it was true that the city could be spending money to aid a private business, although indirectly.

Mr. Baker emphasized that he thought radio contact with police was a good idea generally. "If the radios would prevent one break-in they would be well worth the money," he said.

New Councilman Fred Morris then said that he was not interested in either funeral home, and that he always valued his conscience even if he voted alone. He said he felt \$200 or \$300 was not much.

The council was deadlocked 2-2. The discussion Friday night was not a farce. In fact, the whole matter of the radios brought smiles and chuckles to those present and the councilmen.

The radios first came before the council about a month ago when the council was asked to purchase a radio for the police car and connect it to another at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

The council was told at that time that since hospital employees were awake all night, city residents could call the hospital if something happened and the hospital employees could call police.

The councilmen were told that city police were difficult to locate while they were driving around town at night, so the radio would be helpful.

The cost of the two radios would be \$100 each, plus the antenna. No antenna cost was mentioned.

The council took the matter under consideration.

NFO Plans Meeting Here

The National Farm Organization, a collective bargaining organization for farmers, will tell its story once again to Rockcastle County Farmers at a meeting at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, Feb. 15 at the courthouse.

The NFO is now in a membership and organizational drive in Rockcastle County. To date, 46 Rockcastle county farmers are on the NFO roster.

The main goal of the NFO is to provide bargaining power for individual farmers. The plan calls for obtaining contracts from processors for certain farm products, such as fat hogs and fat cattle, at pre-determined prices.

At a recent meeting in Russell County, Carl Gribbons, Marion County farmer declared: "Only through contracts can we have a say in what we get for our products."

He said that farmers were the only producers of goods anywhere who do not establish their own prices—who do not have anything to say about what their own products are worth.

Relative to the cost of belonging to the NFO, Gribbons explained that once a contract is obtained, farmers will pay only one per cent to the NFO, based on what they sold to processors.

The Feb. 15 meeting at Mt. Vernon will be the last opportunity for local farmers to hear the NFO plan explained before a county charter is obtained and officers elected. All farmers are invited to the meeting.
