 The Kentucky Farm Bureau will hold a series of district meetings February 17 through 24 in Kentucky.

The purpose will be to discuss the tobacco program and the referendum vote on acreage-pounds tobacco program scheduled Mar. 10.

The meeting will be held at the Rockcastle County Courthouse at 10 a.m. Feb. 22.

Farm Bureau President Louis F. Ison and Jack Welch, chairman, Kentucky Farm Bureau Tobacco Committee, and representatives from the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture will conduct the meetings.

In a letter to county Farm Bureau presidents, John Koon, executive secretary, KFB, said it is hoped that each county president will invite the county Farm Bureau tobacco committee, county Farm Bureau board members and other Farm Bureau leaders and members to the meetings. Koon said that it is anticipated that each meeting will be approximately two to two-and-a-half hours long with adequate time for questions and participation by those in attendance.

Cooper Is Candidate

They made it official Friday night.

U. S. Senator John Sherman Cooper, and Fifth District Congressman Tim Lee Carter are both candidates for re-election this year.

The two lawmakers made it official at the 28th annual Lincoln Day Banquet of the Fifth District Lincoln Republican Club at Cumberland Falls State Park.

On the part of Congressman Carter, there had been little doubt that he would be a candidate. But there has been speculation that Senator Cooper might seek the Republican nomination for Governor next year.

But Senator Cooper got around his plans when he arose to make the principal address:

"I want to say I am going to run. And I hope I will win."

Dr. Carter left his announcement until near the end of the meeting:

"Most everyone has figured I would be a candidate for re-election, and I definitely am," he declared.

Two years is only an apprenticeship. A man has to serve several years in Congress before he can serve his people, his state, and his country," Dr. Carter said.

Among the 450 who attended the banquet were several from Rockcastle County. They included:

Judge and Mrs. Wayne Van Hook, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Bales, Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Parsons, Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Carter, Sam Hoskins, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Carlettis, Roy Brown, Lloyd Owens, Paul Griffin, R. R. Wolfe, Miss Della Melton, Mrs. Bernice Holcomb, and Money E. Cummins.

Others associated with Rockcastle County, but from other counties, who attended were: State Rep. Harold De Marcus, Judge R. C. Tarter, Atty. and Mrs. Homer Prellik, and Zolt Reid.

Senator Cooper told his audience that "we all think of the Republican Party as the hope of the nation."

He criticized President Johnson and his administration charging:

"The president says we are living in a period of the greatest prosperity, and in a way that is true. We have material wealth, but there are other things to be considered. Never have we had such a great amount of doubt, a feeling of insecurity. The people lack confidence in their president and in their government."

The senator discussed the fiscal, foreign and domestic policies of the administration, but concentrated on the war in Viet Nam. He has inspected the battlefields there twice in recent months.

"The greatest concern of everyone is about the war," he said, "We are all worried about a larger war, but my chief concern and that of many others is that the people are not receiving all the

Lee Rice Run Over By Truck

Lee Edward Rice, 24, of Mt. Vernon, died in a Lexington Hospital Feb. 11 after he was struck by a pick-up truck near Mt. Vernon earlier in the day.

Rice was walking on the Chestnut Ridge Road near its intersection with US 25 when he was struck by a truck driven by Tom Burdette of Mt. Vernon.

The truck left the road and overturned down an embankment. Mr. Burdette was hospitalized for undetermined injuries.

Mr. Rice was born in Rockcastle County, the son of Edward and Ruby Thomson Rice. He was an employee of Parker Seal Company of Berea.

Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife, Mary McMullins Rice, a son, Edward Lewis, and a daughter, Brenda Lee, both at home.

Three sisters and one brother survive: Mrs. Barbara Sturgill of Livingston, Mrs. Norma Lee Swallo of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Miss Pamela Helen Rice and Paul Martin Rice, both at home, as well as his grandmother, Mrs. Maggie Thomson of Berea.

Details of the accident are not available. But both Mrs. Burdette and Mr. McMullins were reportedly thrown into the air.

Mrs. Brown was born in Rockcastle County the daughter of William and Ethel McGuire Durham of Orlando, who survive. One small son, Phillip, also survives.

She is survived by three brothers and five sisters: Charlie Durham of Gosport, Ohio; Robert Durham of Norwood, Ohio; Curtis Durham of Orlando; Mrs. Ollie Singleton, and Miss Emma Jean Durham, all of Orlando; Mrs. Bertha Childers of Williamsburg, Ohio, and Mrs. Ellen Durham of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Mr. Mullins was born in Rockcastle County, the son of Mitchell and Rebecca Mason Mullins.

William O. Yador Dies At Louisville

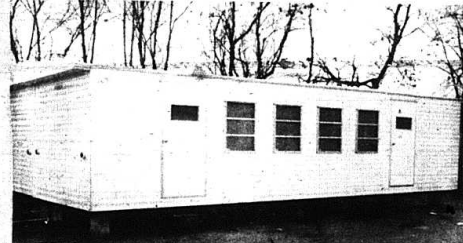

The voice at the other end of the line was the Dayton, Ohio, information operator. "No," the voice said, "There is no listing for a Hunter Lewis."

Another voice at the end of another line was the voice of the operator for Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

"No, there is no Hunter Lewis on our roster. But we'll connect you with our contact operator." The answer again, was no.

The housewife at the other end of the line was Mrs. Glen Edward Lewis of New Lebanon, Ohio.

"I assure you," she said, "If my husband had written a book about Kentucky I would know about it. I wish he had."

Who is Hunter Lewis? This name has become the most talked about name in a decade this week in Rockcastle County as residents (young and old) searched their memory for a inkling to the identity of Hunter Lewis.

The name cropped up in the news when Doubleday and Company, of New York, announced this week that a novel, "Cry to the Hills" by Hunter Lewis, a native of Mt. Vernon, in association with Esther Kellner, would be published March 11 by Doubleday.

The announcement was a little item. Doubleday is one of the two largest publishing firms in the world, and the publication of a novel is a major event, including the major event of several thousands of dollars to the author.

And that the author was an unidentified Mt. Vernon native, only made the news more important locally.

The Doubleday announcement was terse. It merely said: "Mr. Lewis was born in Mt. Vernon. He now works at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base." "It did not give further biographical data."

At this point, the Signal, sensing an obvious important accomplishment by a native son, went to work, but oblivious of the frustration ahead.

Numerous calls to residents around the county turned up a few people connected with the Lewis name, but no one could remember a Hunter Lewis.

The Dr. Lewis family of Wildie was checked off. Dr. Lewis had several daughters.

Next came a lead that turned up Mrs. Glancy of New Lebanon, Ohio, and formerly of the Hiatt section of the county. Mrs. Lewis' half-sister, Mrs. Glancy had a son, said she was sure Glen had not written a book, but he is a jet pilot and at one time was at Wright-Patterson. She gave the Signal his

Reading Program Begins

MOBILE CLASSROOM - Help In Reading Starts Here -

An extensive reading program opened in Rockcastle County schools this week with a skill deficiency may be hindered in all subject matter areas," Mr. Mullins said.

He noted that in order to deal effectively with the complexities of diagnosing and developing reading skills, a special classroom climate is desirable.

Experts recommend that no more than six to 10 pupils be in the reading laboratory at one time, and that the teachers work with 50 to 90 pupils per day.

Most of the work, if not all, in Rockcastle will be done in mobile units taken to the school. The units were purchased from the initial \$252,000 grant.

Mr. Mullins said the "Rockcastle County Board of Edu-

cation has literally bent the bushes and come up with 13 well qualified teachers to staff the reading centers."

There will be four teachers at Broadhead; two at Livingston; two at Roundstone, and four at Mt. Vernon. In addition, each teacher will have an aid who will perform certain clerical duties which will relieve the teacher for planning and developing a stronger curriculum.

"Materials and classroom climate do not facilitate learning, therefore, each teacher must accept the responsibility of motivating each child on an individual basis.

Their reading plan will allow for motivation and sequential skill building in a manner never before possible in Rockcastle County," Mr. Mullins declared.

To adequately diagnose and remedy reading difficulties, various materials are used, including overhead projectors, readers, shadow scopes, tape recorders, record players, phonics games, syllable games, vowel charts, and primer typewriters.

Testing of children in Rockcastle schools was completed early this week. The program will "really get going" by the beginning of next week, Mr. Mullins said.

banquet from facts."

Referring to his recent inspection tour, he said he found that "we are fighting a well-trained army of men and guerrillas who are being armed by North Viet Nam, Red China and the Soviet Union. They don't have the artillery, but the other weapons they have are equally good and effective as ours."

Senator Cooper said he does not anticipate any major offensive by the allied forces for several months because of a logistics problem.

"We have a supply situation there that has not been made clearly known by officials," he said, in a way the problem is understandable when you think that 200,000 men have been sent into that country in the past two years, he pointed out.

"But there are no harbor facilities, no docks for unloading," the senator explained, "I don't believe we can have a major offensive for several months until this is corrected. Right now there are supply ships backed up to Manila. There's no place for them to unload."

Senator Cooper said the biggest problem facing us is deciding how to fight the war.

"If we were to expand our battlefronts, and Red China came into the war they would throw millions of men into battle. If the Soviet Union enters it will be engaged in a third world war. These are the ways we have been trying to avoid."

"Unless the enemy increases its forces to the point where the security of our country is threatened, we should not try to expand the war in Viet Nam."

"Our policy," Senator Cooper continued, "should be to try to reach a peaceful settlement rather than to end up in a war which would require all of our military and domestic resources and manpower in Asia."

On the state political side, Senator Cooper paid tribute to the caliber of Republican legislators who serve in the Kentucky General Assembly.

"They are putting the pressure on the Democrats and the state administration to raise their standards," he said.

"We have the greatest group of Republican state legislators I can remember in a long time. And this isn't the end of it. It is going on all over the country and it will move on to a great change in Washington," the senator asserted.

"As for this great feeling of lack of confidence in our government today, I don't believe it will change as long as Johnson is president because it's not his nature," Senator Cooper said.

"The only way we can change this is by electing a new president—a Republican president."

Dr. Carter, who also recently visited Vietnam on an inspection tour, charged that "just how we became so deeply involved is truly a 'Tragedy of Errors'."

"Our president is a master of the fearless retreat, in-transparent compromise, the sly dodge, and the artful dodge," the congressman said. "No belief is so rigid that it cannot be reversed. No enemy so hated that we cannot be subdued. Positively, nothing is positive in directing our forces in the Viet Nam War. Their (the Democrats) party is both for and against—quite the contrary, notwithstanding and above all."

"The action which has characterized the actions of the present administration must be stopped," Dr. Carter said. "Either we must fight vigorously with resolution and fortitude, or we must

get out."

"Whatever that decision may be, we are Americans first and we must be ready to give the last full measure of devotion, or to gather the battered remnants of our divisions together and rebuild our nation in a country which will never recognize war as a means of settling national differences."

Dr. Carter reviewed the legislation which has been approved by Congress, especially that which has a direct bearing on South Central and Southeastern Kentucky.

He called attention to a bill, co-sponsored by him and Senator Cooper, providing insurance coverage for soldiers serving in hazardous places, and to the new GI Bill of Rights.
