pinpoint Mr. Lewis' identity. Mr. Lewis explained that the title of his book, "Cry to the Hills" comes from a statement made by Slim Clyde, the leading character in the book. "Yeah, go on, cry to the hills," Slim said, "they're all that ever listen to you."

For the people in the book, Kentucky is a land of high sheriffs, confidence preachers, revenueurs, and stills. It does not name anyone by name. It does not drag any skeletons from anyone's closet.

Says Doubleday: "What Steinbeck's 'Grapes of Wrath' did for the Okies, this novel does for the people of America's No. 1 underprivileged area."

About himself, Mr. Lewis told the Signal, in his early years he led a vagabond life. He hitchhiked, he rode freights, he saw action with

the Army in the Pacific during World War II, and worked in Panama and California before going to Dayton in 1959. He and his wife, Rita, a bookkeeper for a Dayton firm, live in a brick home in Imperial Hills subdivision in Butler Township.

Mr. Lewis said he got his first book at age 12 from a mail order house, but couldn't read it.

At 13, he was earning \$1.50 a week, plus two sacks of Bull Durham tobacco, as a lookout guard at a moonshine still. Soon he was running the big LaSalle cars with their illegal cargoes of moonshine through road blocks and running gun fights.

He said he joined the Army in 1940 "to escape a warrant-carrying sheriff, to get enough to eat and a decent bed."

Then about two years ago, he suddenly said to his wife, "By George, I'll write myself a book."

And, By George, he did.

He related: "I got three chapters down and I knew I needed some help. So I put an ad in the paper (Dayton Journal-Herald) and Mrs. Lee (Esther) Kellner answered it."

He noted: "She was editor-in-chief of Children's Playmate magazine for more than 23 years. She is the author of many biographies of Biblical characters, several nature novels, and many magazine articles. So we got to-

gether and put the novel together."

"He wanted me to share credit as co-author," Mrs. Kellner told the signal, "But it's his idea, his experience, his story really, so I felt I should not share billing with him."

The book will be published by Clarence Lewis with Esther Kellner." Mr. Lewis said Hunter was dropped by Doubleday before publication—because another author has the same name.

On the telephone, Mr. Lewis' voice was booming and happy. He said he planned to be in Mt. Vernon before too long, now that he is working on a second novel about the Cumberland River, and how damming of the river has affected the mountain people.

How Kentuckians will like "Cry to the Hills" remains to be seen. But when his first royalty check came to him, one of the Doubleday staff members wrote him a note. It said:

"I have worked on many beautiful and exciting books,

but I have to tell you "Cry to the Hills" is my very favorite of them all. Maybe it is because I'm from Kentucky and I do love every part of it. Certainly our hill people have never had such an eloquent spokesman."

Naturally, that statement brought to mind another question: Wonder who the Doubleday staff member is that is from Kentucky?

**NEW HIGHWAY** (Cont. From Page 1) Vernon, but economic studies demonstrate conclusively that the primary objectives of the Appalachian Highway System would be served by the Somerset-London route.

"Kentucky 80 is a major east-west highway across the southern part of the state and this would be of its ultimate completion therefore providing better service to the entire Appalachian area. We have another section of Kentucky 80 on the approved Appalachian System between Pikeville and the Virginia state line."

"Emphasis upon the importance of providing good communication and traffic between Somerset and London would be very helpful in persuading the Appalachian Commission that this route should be approved."

In General Williams remarked emphatically that "I am a gainst that."

The bank president pointed out that Ward is trying to use the C. C. to get his ammunition to promote the Highway 80 route.

General Williams said that the Tennessee route supporting the north-south highway from Chattanooga to Cincinnati and points north.

General Williams noted that if they must continue to travel through the hickories (461 from Mt. Vernon to Somerset) they may tend to bypass Somerset and go by 1-75 to Norris Dam and other points in the area.

He said that the Highway Commissioner is adamant about the matter and won't even discuss the matter. "It is ideal to improve both routes, but let's improve the Mt. Vernon route first to channel tourists, from the north into this area," General Williams emphasized.

He pointed out that "a great deal of capital" has been invested in motels and tourist facilities along U.S. 27 and these investors should be supported.

He further noted that the Appalachian Commission has recommended the route Mt. Vernon route and that the route following Highway 80 was set up as an alternate route by the State Highway Department.

Dr. I. K. Cross noted that at a 1962 hearing in London on the routing of 1-75, Somerset and Paducah were agreed not to oppose London's efforts in locating the super highway closer to the city.

At that time, it was agreed. Dr. Cross recalled, that Somerset would have an access road by the nearest route.

"They've promised to cooperate with us and it's high time they were doing it," he observed.

A resolution supporting the Somerset-Mt. Vernon route by the Appalachian corridor was authorized to be prepared for the C. C. to consider for adoption.

## FIRST BREAK FOR COUNTY

The Somerset-Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce indicated last week that it will go on record supporting the construction of an access route from Somerset to Interstate-75 along a route generally following KY 461 to Mt. Vernon rather than along KY 80 to London.

At the same meeting of the C. of C., it was reported that the Tennessee State Highway is on record favoring the KY 461 route to Mt. Vernon. The access road is the final link in a new Appalachian Highway running from Chattanooga, Tenn., to Lexington and Cincinnati, Ohio.

The new support for the Mt. Vernon access, probably at the Renfro Valley interchange of I-75, was a hoped for break in the controversial routing as far as Rockcastle County is concerned. Since the new highway was approved by the Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington, last summer, Pulaski County has been less quiet on a preference

For the access route. Most Rockcastle organizations have passed resolutions favoring the Mt. Vernon access. Parts of the Appalachian corridor have already been approved including a 9.5 mile segment running west from Burnside to Louisville in Wayne County and a seven-mile stretch from near the intersection of 27 and KY 80 to the intersection of Highway 80 and 461. It is from this point to 175 that the route is not settled.

At the suggestion of Gen. J. J. Williams, president of the Citizens National Bank, the C. of C. voted last week to write Highway Commissioner Henry Ward and ask him to suggest the proper wording for a resolution to support the Appalachian Highway Program.

## COUNTY ROUTES TO GET \$74,637

A total of \$74,637 has been allocated by the State Highway Department for maintenance of 65 rural county roads representing 166 miles and two bridges. One rural road has been scheduled for reconstruction. It is Sand Hill Road beginning at its intersection with US 25 and running 1.5 miles to County Road 1125.

Mr. Davis got the completed application Monday from Crawford & Crawford engineers, of Renfro Valley, who had charge of surveying and compiling information about the project.

The application, made to the Community Facilities Administration, asks for an 80 percent grant for the lake project. Whether the government will approve an 80 percent grant remains to be seen. To date, the agency has been talking in terms of a 60 percent grant.

The Renfro project including land purchase, new water plant for the City of Mt. Vernon, and additional lines, will total about \$1,185,000.
