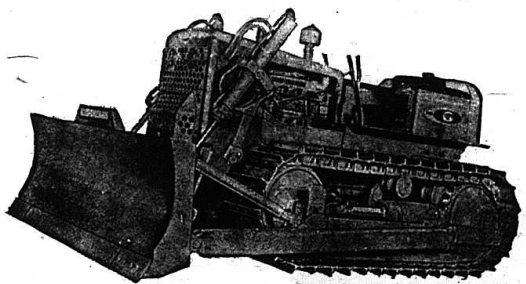

#### LETTER TO EDITOR

Our old friend Graydon B. Cummins at Pine Hill sends us a "recipe" for early and late vegetables that goes through use of Coca-Cola jugs. In fact, many weekly newspapers in the state have printed his recipe, we do also, though belatedly. "Take a gallon Coke jug that can be had at most soda fountains. Cut a yarn string long enough to tie around the jugs about one inch from the bottom. Soak the string in alcohol or kerosene before using. Hold the jug bottom-up and set the yarn afire. When the flame has burned out, put the hot end of the jug in a tub of cold water. The bottom will break out like it was cut with a glass cutter. By using the jug (or jugs, if more are wanted) to plant vegetables in, people can have all kinds of vegetables several weeks earlier, especially tomatoes. They can plant as late as September and have onions, lettuce, celery, spinach, and cabbage until about Christmas. Last year I planted the first week in March a few hills of tomatoes. I put the seed three in a hill and pressed the jug in the ground about half-an-inch, leaving the cap off at all times. By so doing, on warm days moisture evaporates preventing the jug from "caking" and supplies fresh air to the plant at all times. You will be surprised at the low temperature a plant can live through. I have 500 jugs ready to plant tomatoes as early in March as it possibly can. Don't remove jugs until all

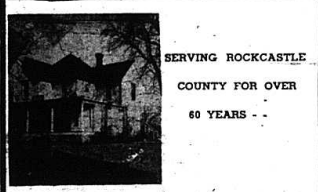

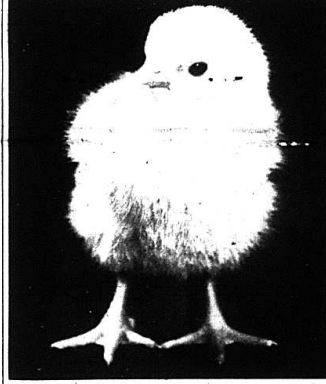

## Tobacco Vote Set March 10

Burley tobacco growers in Rockcastle County and elsewhere in the eight-state burley producing belt will vote next Thursday, Mar. 10, on proposed acreage-purchase production controls. The special referendum was called by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman in his announcement of burley quotas for 1966, which ordered a 15 percent cut in acreage for most farms. The cut will not be restored under the present program. County growers will vote between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., local time, at community polling places set up by the county ASCS committee. Growers will ballot on the question: "Are you in favor of acreage-purchase quotas for burley tobacco for the three marketing years beginning October 1, 1966?" There will be five polling places for the referendum in Rockcastle County. They are Community A, ASCS Office at the Courthouse; Community B, Phelps Store, Blue Springs; Community C, Brodhed City Hall; Community D, Willie Lamb's Garage, Conway; and Community E, Vanant's Store in Orlando.

reduced below the smallest of (1) the allotment established for the farm for 1965; (2) five-tenths of an acre, or (3) ten percent of the crop-land in the farm. Department officials pointed out that the reduction in allotments under the acreage allotment program were due to substantial increases in per-acre yields in recent years which have caused a build-up in burley supplies. Production during the past 4 marketing years has exceeded domestic usage and exports by 288 million pounds. Under the acreage-purchase quotas announced today, the national marketing quota for 1966 is 625 million pounds. The acreage-purchase legislation provides more flexibility in establishing the national marketing quota and the resulting farm acreage allotments since the production quota exceeds domestic usage and exports. Officials pointed out that a quota of 625 million pounds will maintain an adequate supply for both domestic use and export, and will effect an orderly reduction in supply.

A national average yield goal of 2,050 pounds per acre was announced. It was determined that this yield on a national average basis will improve or insure the usability of the tobacco and increase the net return per pound to the growers. This yield is about 100 pounds per acre below the average yield in 1965. The national acreage allotment under acreage-purchase is determined by dividing the national marketing quota by the national average yield goal. Thus the national acreage allotment for 1966 is 304,878 acres. This would provide an increase of about 6 percent over 1965 farm acreage allotments.

Under acreage-purchase, whenever marketing from a farm are less than the farm's production quota, the difference is added to the quota established for that farm for the following year. Each farm can market without penalty 20 percent more than the farm's production quota for first year, and 10 percent in subsequent years, but any marketing in excess of the farm's production quota will be deducted from the farm's quota for the following year. In the special referendum, Mar. 10, burley tobacco growers will vote whether they favor or oppose marketing quotas on an acreage-purchase basis for the 1966, 1967 and 1968 crops. If more than two-thirds of the farmers voting in the special referendum approve marketing quotas on an acreage-purchase basis, marketing quotas on an acreage-purchase basis will be in effect for those crops. ## Conference On Low Cost Housing

A conference on low cost housing in Appalachia will be held at the Industrial Arts Building at Berea College, Mar. 11. The conference will start the third phase in a study of low cost housing that is being conducted by Berea College and financed by a grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity at Washington.

Those there will be to test, in an 18-county area, the feasibility of building the low cost houses and the method of financing needed to make these houses available to low-income families.

## ROCKCASTLE IS INCLUDED

A Senate Bill that will affect the Rockcastle-Pulaski Judicial District (28th) is being sponsored by State Senator Maloney of Kenton County.

The bill in effect, will place Rockcastle County into a new judicial district composed of Owsley, Clay, and Jackson Counties. Pulaski County would be a single judicial district.

At latest report, the bill is in committee. If approved in committee, it will go to the Senate for passage, and then on to the House.

The bill, which has all kinds of ramifications, takes the judicial district from the 28th District and puts it in the 41st district which is currently composed of Leslie, Clark and Jackson counties.

It takes Leslie from the 41st and puts it with Bell County, which is presently a one-judge judicial district.

It takes Owsley from its present district and puts it with Clay, Jackson, and Pike counties.

The switch would also take Clark County from the Clark-Madison-Jessamine district. It would then need a new circuit judge. He would be appointed, possibly with Estill.

## Dam Resolution Passes House

The Kentucky House of Representatives passed a resolution Monday, sponsored by Rep. Harold DeMarcus, requesting the Federal District Corps of Engineers to begin construction on proposed hydro-electric dams to be located on the Rockcastle River.

Passage of the resolution does not mean the Corps of Engineers will go ahead with the project, so far called unfeasible by the Corps. But it is a necessary step, and a step forward. It lets the Corps know the State of Kentucky is behind the project and that it should be explored further.

The resolution declared: "Whereas, the new criteria for consideration of public works projects under the Appalachian Regional Development Act of 1965, Water Resource Survey, makes the economic advisability of the construction of hydro-electric dams on the Rockcastle River worthwhile, and whereas, public works projects such as the construction of..."

Representatives of private building agencies, government agencies, builders, dealers, contractors, state and local officials, and others interested in the project are invited to attend the conference.

The first phase of the Low Cost Housing study will develop designs that could be duplicated throughout rural America, and to determine the most economical, least expensive materials and construction methods.

The second phase was the actual building of six prototype houses using these designs, materials, and methods, and a seventh house of convention to test the construction that could be made. The six Berea College designed houses ranged in cost from approximately \$4,500 to approximately \$5,000. They utilize native hardwoods of the Appalachian region; and may be built with relatively unskilled labor under a competent supervisor.

These two phases are completed. The Mar. 11 conference (phase three) will determine whether private enterprise is interested in building two to three units, low-cost homes, and whether the Berea College design, some modification of it, or a completely separate design would be most suitable for such homes.

### Land Rotation Good For Tobacco

Rotation of tobacco land is a good practice, says George D. Corder, University of Kentucky Soil Conservation Service soils specialist.

"Sometimes disease organisms and other factors make it necessary to rotate tobacco land. Researchers at the University of Kentucky Soil Conservation Station have shown that rotation has a good practice regardless of disease or other factors," he says.

Put the 1966 and future tobacco crops on a deep, well-drained soil that has been in sod crops at least two years, or longer if possible.

Since KY 31 fescue is an excellent soil-conditioning crop, tobacco usually grows well following it. However, fescue roots are slow to decay and should be plowed under at least six weeks before setting tobacco. The decaying processes can be speeded up by applying fertilizer at a rate so as to supply 40 or more pounds actual nitrogen an acre before plowing.

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
