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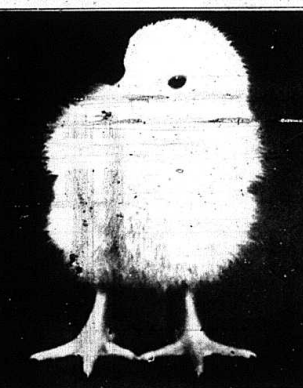

**FRIENDLY REMINDER**  
To all Rockcastle County tobacco growers. Remember, today you vote on the new burley acreage-pounds quote program. If you haven't voted, by all means do so. If you don't, you have only you to blame.

**Plant Bed Site Is Important**  
Many factors govern proper selection of a tobacco plant-bed site, says Ira Massie, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service specialist. A good 1966 crop will depend in large measure on the selection.

He says:  
(1) Select fertile, well-drained land high in organic matter. It should have a slight southern or eastern slope, free from shade especially in the morning hours. An open field near a water source is an excellent place. With May 1st, the first tobacco plantings in Washington were John Lair, Jack Crawford, and Mr. and Mrs. Jess Bullock.

(2) Tobacco plants are so small when they first emerge that they cannot stand competition from a heavy growth of weeds. And hand-weeding a bed is slow and tedious, and likely to injure small plants; in addition, wildfire and mosaic in susceptible varieties often occur in plant beds after weeding.

Kill the weed seed before sowing the tobacco seed. Here are some tips:  
Hot Methyl Bromide Gas: Work the bed as mentioned above. Then fill a five-gal-

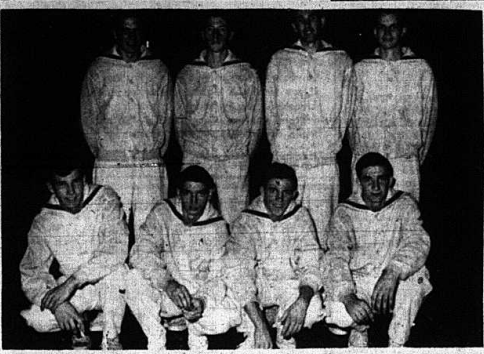

(3) Break the ground, pulverize it thoroughly to a depth of four to six inches and level it off. In breaking, start near the middle and throw furrowed earth on each side toward the bed site's middle; this will make the bed higher than surrounding ground and help outside water off the bed.

(4) If burning is to be used to kill weed seed, have the soil thoroughly prepared and dry enough for good tillage. Fires should heat soil to a depth of three or four inches. Usually, 30 minutes burning with fairly large wood will kill weed seed near the surface. (Burning with a small amount of brush is worthless.) Seed the bed after ground has completely cooled.

(5) Burning year after year on the same site may release an excess of manganese, which will result in bed areas of low or no plants. When there is an excess of soluble manganese, young plants may be stunted and in extreme cases killed.

Increasing cloudiness has lessened chance of showers Friday. Continued warm.

Two incumbent members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education indicated this week that they would be candidates for re-election to the board in the November election.

No other candidates for the seats have officially announced to date.

## 60% GRANT

Mayor Clyde Livinville and a group from Mt. Vernon returned from Washington late Wednesday after meeting with officials of the Federal Government in Washington to discuss the project on the Renfro Valley Dam and water project.

According to Mayor Clyde Livinville, the city was awarded a 60 percent grant through the Area Development Administration. The Agency said it would up the grant to 80 percent unless the city called for a re-evaluation of its county employment rate by the Department of Commerce which could take as long as a year.

The percentage of a grant is based on the number of persons working rather than on the level of income. Rockcastle is in the Madison-Jackson district.

Mayor Livinville said he was very optimistic about the project and felt the city would probably go ahead with the project based on the 60 percent grant.

Forty percent of the \$1,185,000 project, or \$420,000. The money would come from revenue bonds on the city water works.
