Kentucky Dan Village State Park, Gilbertsville, and in Morgan County, are operating at full capacity and are prepared to take orders for seedlings.

The nurseries are stocked with short leaf, white, loblolly and Virginia pine, yellow poplar, bitternut and locust. Matlack said the cost of the seedlings is \$8 per thousand.

He pointed out that the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will share the planting costs with landowners. The ASCS will pay \$16 per acre or 80 percent of the planting costs, Matlack said.

Landowners may obtain order blanks for the seedlings from local ASCS or Soil Conservation District offices or from their county agents or district foresters.

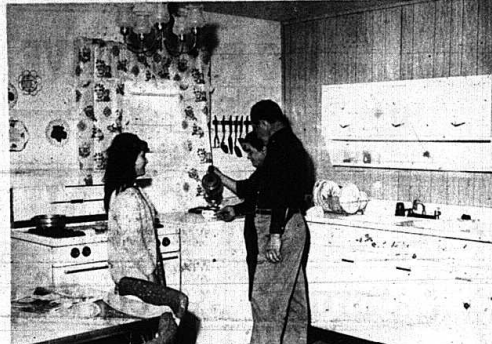

Cromers Are Happy With Their New Home

Things will not be quite the same this spring at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Shirley Cromer at Blue Springs. The main reason is Mr. and Mrs. Cromer, Ernie and Thelma Jean, have a new home from the foundation to the roof. Ordinarily, a new home passes virtually unnoticed in the news media these days, but this house is a little unusual. It is the first house built in Rockcastle County under a new federal Office of Economic Opportunity project that is testing new techniques in financing, building, and marketing low cost dwellings under the auspices of Berea College. As the days go by, probably the Cromers will not be alone in their project since the new houses are as low as \$5,000 to \$6,000 (depending on the cost of the land), or in a range that many people can afford today that could not afford them yesterday.

The Cromers were a nappy group this past week as they moved into their new home high on a hill just south of Sand Springs. Only yard work, and a few miscellaneous jobs are left before the house is finally complete. The house was built by local builders from their own plans—of course, meeting federal standards. Actual construction of the house was done with local unskilled and semi-skilled labor, with supervisors from the Industrial Arts Department at Berea College. The house itself is very simple in its construction. It has a simple panel and truss system, materials used in the home are also of an experimental variety. For example, being tested are oak framing, the roof, foam insulation, and vinyl plastic plumbing. The live-room house can be duplicated anywhere. Currently, 15 counties in Kentucky are under the home

Head Start Planned This Summer



If things go as planned, there will be another Head Start kindergarten program this summer, according to an announcement by Shirley Parsons, principal at Livingston Grade and High School, and supervisor of the county's Head Start program.

An application had been made to the Office of Economic Opportunity for the 1966 summer Head Start Program. The application is expected to be approved. Only one change in the program is anticipated this year. A center will be established at Maple Grove School for children of the area. Some 213 pupils are expected to enroll in the program this summer.

As part of the evaluation of last summer's program, first grade teachers in the consolidated schools were asked to make brief, frank statements expressing their evaluation of the program. Their remarks are printed below: "Byrds, McCall, Brodhead School—

"The Head Start children at the beginning of this term had definitely made progress in readiness to read, in oral language development, and in adjustment to school routine. Mrs. Merrie Cox, Mt. Vernon School—

"One half of my children had attended Head Start. They definitely made progress in readiness for school and were able to start reading earlier. They could express themselves better, and were able to take care of themselves. It developed in parents who did not take advantage of this program, an awareness that, they must do a better job in preparing their children for entrance. The health program was fine." Mrs. Hazel Linville, Mt. Vernon School—

"I have found the Head Start program very good in getting the children adjusted to school routine. It was helpful in preparing them in readiness and expressing themselves." Mrs. Nell Craig, Brodhead School—

"I think Head Start helped the timid child find more easily his place in society. He was ready to read earlier and was less anxious about such activities as eating in the lunchroom and gym. Mrs. Jewel Parsons, Roundstone School—

"The Head Start children were content to be away from their mothers and were more easily adjusted to school routine. Therefore they were able to get into their school work earlier. They, too, had learned to put away whatever they were using. This helped me tremendously the first week of school." Mrs. Shirley Martin, Brodhead School—

"I feel that the children that were in project Head Start last summer were given a great step towards success."

by weeds as may be the case in spring and summer.

Many of the oldest stones may be illegible because of the erosion of many years, but in most cases the numbers and letters can be brought out by sprinkling the stones with flour or white powder, then brushing with a soft brush which will reveal the writing. It was in this way that the grave of Stephen Lappford, reputedly Mt. Vernon's first citizen, was recently located in Elmwood Cemetery, Mt. Vernon.

The burning of the Rockcastle County Courthouse in 1873 was a tragic loss, not because of the loss of the building but because of the loss of records since the creation of the county in 1810.

This loss can be counteracted, to some extent, if old records occupy the dates prior to 1873 and now in the hands of private parties, are given to the Historical Society and eventually catalogued so they may be made available to the public.

**Fertilizer Dollar
Has Good Return**

Put a dollar in fertilizer-- and you could get a return crop of from three to five dollars for each fertilizer dollar.

Such a return depends on proper use, says Harold Miller, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service specialist.

And proper use of fertilizer in turn depends on the "soil inventory," that is, on a soil test.

"Soil nutrients which plants definitely need are applied, good returns can be expected. But the proper nutrient determination is most important. Ground limestone may increase production in some fields, but might not be needed in another. Fields may vary in types of fertilizer needed, too."

A checklist on soil sampling: (1) Take soil samples properly. Check the county agent's office for an instruction leaflet on this. (2) Give the soils lab that tests your soil all the information on past fertilization and cropping history you can. This will help you get a more accurate recommendation. (3) Give information available on capabilities and limitation of the soil, as physical properties of soil influence response to fertilization. (4) Buy only the plant nutrients your soil needs. A good soil test is the best way to determine these fertilizer needs.

"New Federal and State laws and programs will be of tremendous value in cleaning up or screening distasteful features which mar the scenic beauty along highways," according to Estill McBee, Chairman of the Sixth District Wildlife Federation. "However, there are many other areas where significant efforts can be made to preserve natural beauty and enrich outdoor experiences such as fishing, hunting, camping, boating, picnicking, and hiking." Mr. McBee emphasized that litter and debris along lakes and streams and in parks and forests should be cleaned up and deposited in locations set aside for that purpose. He pointed out that plants set out to beautify roads and to curtail maintenance costs under utility line right-of-ways can be of varieties offering important food-and-cover habitat, to wildlife. Provisions can be made, he detailed, in both urban and rural area planning to zone particularly attractive natural areas from installations industrial, commercial, and housing - which mar scenic views. "We must not overlook the fact that most conservation practices also improve natural beauty," Mr. McBee reminded. "When the pollu-

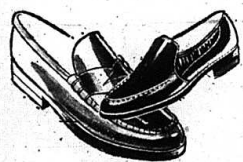

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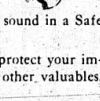
