Value of Tourism

From: Central City "Messenger"

(The following article is from the newspaper indicated above. It should be of interest to Rockcastle Countians.

One of the most important elements that can contribute to the economic growth of Kentucky communities is the travel business — one of America's fastest growing industries. Today, some 100 million Americans spend approximately \$26 billion a year as they travel about the country. In fact, during 1963, the last year for which figures are available, it was estimated that travelers spent \$320 million in Kentucky alone. The significance of this rapidly growing industry to Kentucky is that our communities stand to "profit" by stronger local efforts to attract visitors and travelers.

Lake-Malone State Park is Mühlenberg's most important tourist attraction with more than 150,000 visitors in 1965.

The visitor's dollar is earned outside the community and spent within it. Benefits almost everyone in town as the money is turned over and over. It goes to restaurants, retail shops, service

stations, automobile repair shops, lodging places and places of entertainment and recreation. And, of course, these businesses buy supplies and services, thereby increasing the economic benefit of the tourist dollar. Of even greater importance, income from visitors provides new jobs in the community. Also, visitors pay taxes. In most cases, these taxes are a clear profit to the community and to the state. Since the visitor's home is elsewhere, he is a tax contributor without being a major tax consumer.

Quite obviously, all of our communities are not benefiting equally today from this increasingly important source of income. Communities in Kentucky located near major scenic, historic or recreation attractions or on heavily traveled North-South highways have a distinct advantage when it comes to attracting out of town visitors. Every town, certainly, cannot boast a Mammoth Cave, a Kentucky Lake, or My Old Kentucky Home, to mention just a few of Kentucky's most prominent attractions. However, there is no doubt that practically every community in our state can benefit more from the travel business if we are willing to put forth the effort to organize local tourism

The third step is that not only should a community seek out its attractions, but it should at the same time attempt to upgrade and develop the facilities to handle the expected visitor. Of vital importance, also, is to make the community a more attractive community. A pretty community to live in is a pretty community to visit and vice-versa. Our state's slogans of "Make Kentucky a cleaner, greener land," and "Kentucky's beauty — everyone's duty" are direct encouragements for all of us to help create more attractive communities to live in and visit.

The fourth and final step in a meaningful local tourism development program is promotion. There is a great amount of competition for the tourist's dollar and, therefore, it is wise to use every promotional device available. Taking into consideration a community's budget limitations for tourism, promotional purposes, such things as professional literature, publicity, advertising and personal sales, calls can be highly effective in getting out the word about what the community has to offer in the way of visitor attractions and facilities. And there is no doubt that the communities to tourists development programs.

The first logical step to be taken by a community wishing to initiate such a program is to organize a visitors' council, or a visitors' committee, to develop the policy and strategy for a tourism development and promotion plan based on the community's attraction and tourist servicing facilities.

Next, a community should take an inventory of what the community has to sell. It should investigate natural attractions, man made attractions and special events in the community. It is important that a community recognize its hidden tourist assets. While they may appear commonplace to the townspeople, they might be highly important to the tourist. Many a community so close to a town they will ask, "What

in the world have we to attract the visitor? The answer is that there is hardly a community in Kentucky that does not have something to lure the stranger if it will seek it out and promote it, the communities who do the best job of communicating to tourists what they have to offer will be the ones that benefit most from this important source of income.

So, here is a booming new industry that can produce new dollars and new jobs in Kentucky communities. Four factors that indicate a continuing expansion in the case of the travel market are: population growth, increased automobile ownership, increased automobile travel, and a predicted doubling of disposable income. The degree to which our communities share from the economic benefits of this industry will be directly proportional to the efforts put forth in organizing and promoting good local travel development programs.

4-H Council Is Helpmate

Behind all 4-H Clubs in Rockcastle County is the helping hand of the 4-H Club Council that works year-around time and time again during the spring months to lend a hand in many and varied projects.

The duties and activities of the Rockcastle County 4-H Club Council range over a wide field, but always uppermost in the mind of the members is the improvement of agriculture and home economics in the county through encouragement to the youthful farmer.

How successful the Rockcastle clubs have been has been pointed up time and time again by the Signal. One picture this year reported the State 4-H Council had named the local council as one of the most outstanding in the state.

Also students won state-wide last year at the State Fair. It was not the first time that the local group had been honored on a statewide basis, and probably not the last.

In 1957 the Council was presented a plaque during Farm and Home Week in recognition of outstanding service. The Rockcastle County 4-H Council is made up of 25 members consisting of business, professional people, and officials of the County 4-H Club Association.

One member of the Council, the Rev. Larry Johnson, pastor of the Wildie Christian Church, is now president of the Wilderness Trail District 4-H Council.

The specific purpose and objectives of the Rockcastle County 4-H Council is to promote the mental, physical, social, and spiritual growth of Rockcastle County youth in a way that desirable personality characteristics are developed by:

- (1) Co-ordinating the efforts of county 4-H leaders and other groups in promotion of 4-H Club work.
- (2) Promoting, advising, and assisting with a county-wide program of 4-H Club work.
- (3) Advising the District and State 4-H Leaders Councils in the needs of 4-H Club Program at the county level.
- (4) Sponsoring an annual 4-H Leaders Conference and such regular meetings as seems desirable to promote and improve the 4-H Club program in the county.
- (5) To receive, maintain, and hold by trust, gifts without limitations of amount or value, and to use an administrator such funds or property for the best interest of 4-H Club work in the county.

The council assumes the major responsibilities of planning the 4-H program for the county, recruiting leaders, setting up a budget to meet expenses of 4-H Club activities, raising money to meet budgeting needs, and help carry out all 4-H county and district activities.

County members select and recognize each year the most outstanding 4-H Clubs in the county. Selection is made by using a score card developed

by the council. Trophies were presented by the council this past year to the Brindle Ridge and Wildie 4-H Clubs.

Council members have assumed the responsibility, from the beginning of the District Camp organization, of raising funds to be contributed to J. M. Peizer 4-H Camp, near London.

The 4-H Council recognizes the problems of organizing 4-H Clubs in rural schools and consolidated schools of the county, and made plans last year to organize as many clubs as possible on a community-wide basis regardless of the school that the 4-H member attends.

The Brindle Ridge Club and Clear Creek Club are two examples of clubs started in 1964 on the community basis.

The 4-H Council annually obtains transportation for 4-H boys and girls to attend District Camp at London. 4-H Council officers for 1965-66 are: President, Roy Brown; Vice-president, Larry Johnson; Secretary-Treasurer, Helen Saylor.

The 4-H Council is ready and willing to assist the County Extension Agents in whatever way is necessary in order to carry out the 4-H program in Rockcastle County.

Fiscal Court Approves Road

Rural roads in Rockcastle County got the attention of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its regular meeting Tuesday.

Two roads were approved for inclusion in the state railroad program by the magistrates on a motion by Magistrate G. H. Griffin.

One road is from Renfro Road, near Hummel Bridge, to Wildie, a distance of about three miles. The road runs adjacent to Mart's Cemetery.

A second road is about one-half mile off Town Branch Road from Buckeye Bridge to the Fish property.

Also at the meeting, a committee from the area of Scafield Cane Road brought a letter to the court signed by about 100 persons asking that the unproved three-mile section of the road be blacktopped.

The state recently allocated \$20,000 for reconstruction of the section, but the committee wants the money used for blacktop. The group said the road does not need to be reworked, and that there is only one curve that needs strengthening.

The group reported the petition was sent earlier to Highway Commissioner Henry Ward who suggested the committee discuss the project with officials at the highway's

A total of 126 pupils now attend the Maple Grove School.

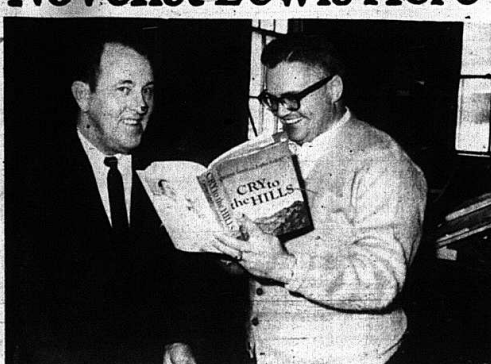
Two mobile units were brought to the school. There are now four teachers, each teaching two grades. There are two cooks.

'Cry To The Hills' Is Good

(A Review)

"CRY TO THE HILLS" by Clarence Lewis with Esther Kellner; Doubleday and Company; 325 pages, \$4.95

The vicious circle of poverty that has attacked, eaten away, and destroyed generations of Eastern Kentucky mountain people is vividly and often beautifully told in "Cry to the Hills" by Clarence Lewis with Esther Kellner.

And Clarence Lewis should know. Born at Mareburg, Mr. Lewis has lived first hand the life of the mountain people in his early years at Mareburg to the edge of Laurel County, up the "old road" from Laurel, where he still goes on occasion to visit the home folks.

This first book told by Mr. Lewis, who is now a maintenance engineer for the Strategic Air Command at Dayton, Ohio, and polished by Mrs. Kellner, a well-known novelist and editor, sets out to explore the psychological, hereditary, and economic factors in the lives of one segment of the population and, and in many ways it captures admirably the unselfish spirit and tragedy that is commonplace.

Basically, "Cry to the Hills" is the story of Slim Clyde just back from the federal penitentiary at Atlanta. He has been sent there for transporting moonshine whiskey from his coal camp community deep in the hollows of Kentucky to parts unknown in the North.

Back home, and with a little more learning than he had when he went to Atlanta, Slim sets out to change his family and to better their economic lot.

Like many an Eastern Kentuckian, he takes his family to the Big City (apparently, in October frost glistened on the hills and trails, the trees turned red and gold and yellow. Then the wind rose,

Persons desiring a copy of the book should contact the Signal and leave their name. Mrs. Esther Kellner, of Richmond, Ind., co-author of the book, and a well-known author in her own right, may also autograph the book for those who wish.

On hand to greet him will be Miss Margaret Wiles, Kentucky State Librarian from Frankfort, and Miss Col. Era Sewell, regional librarian.

Mr. Lewis will be at Renfro Valley during the day to tape an interview with John Dayton.

The author is now a resident of Dayton, Ohio, where he is a maintenance engineer with the U.S. Army. He is a member of the Air Force. He was born at Mareburg in a house now occupied by Mrs. Geneva Kellner. He spent most of his early life around the Rockcastle-Laurel counties line north-east of Lamerco.

Smokey Now Horseshoeing

Construction is underway near Martinsville, Va., on a federally financed trade school designed to put the village blacksmith back under the spreading chestnut tree, according to a story in a recent issue of *Gift*.

The school is being in May at the resident school in a fairway. Fairway is the name for the trade of horseshoeing.

Using a \$15,000 government loan, the school, Ward, 52, one of the best known horseshoers in the southeast, is setting up the school on a six-acre tract.

Rockcastle residents will remember Smokey. He built Belly Acres Restaurant; he built his wife Little Ellen, who died in 1954, and he was in the Renfro Valley Bandstand. They left Renfro about 15 years ago.

"It's a fact there are more horses in the country than in years—and fewer farriers," Ward commented, who shed his first horse at 12 under the tutelage of his father. "And when a horse needs a pair of shoes, he can't wait."

Questions about the school have come from persons in several states and Canada, Ward said. Graduates of his school will be able to set up a shop on the blacksmith shops. Tuition will cover room and board and an occasional trip to horse shows.

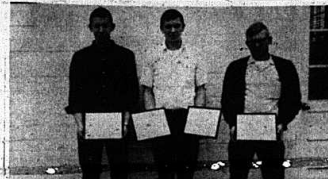

 1/4 teaspoon salt
 Generous dash each crushed marjoram, pepper, crushed thyme
 6 tablespoons butter or margarine
 1 cup small dry bread cubes
 3-pound whole striped bass, boned
 2 cups (16-ounce) condensed cream of mushroom soup
 1/3 cup water
 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
 1 tablespoon sherry (optional)

In saucepan, cook mushrooms, 2 tablespoons onion, 2 tablespoons parsley, celery, and seasonings in 1/4 cup butter until vegetables are tender. Remove from heat; stir in bread cubes. Lightly stuff fish; fasten with toothpicks or skewers. Place on rack in shallow baking pan; brush with 1 tablespoon melted butter. Bake at 350°F. for 1 1/2 hour or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Meanwhile, in saucepan, cook remaining onion and pimiento in 1/4 cup butter until onion is tender. Gently blend in remaining ingredients. Heat, stir now and then. Serve over fish. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
