Planning a cook-out?
The mouth watering prosct of sizzling brown meat
illing slowly over an open fire can lure anyone into be-coming an outdoor chef — as well as an outdoor eater. Bewell as an outdoor eater. Be-ware of the pitfalls, however. that lie on the road to per-fect barbecues. Here are some ways you can avoid Ce most common barbecue



get in your eyes if you know what you're doing. If the barbecue equipment is movable, orient it so that smoke will blow away from both chef and guests. If it isn't movblow away from both chef and guests. It is not moveable, arrange tables, chairs and cooking paraphemalia on the windward side of the fire – and hope for a cooperative, one-way wind.

Start the fire an hour before you're ready to cook. It takes that long to lay a glowing bed of cools and eliminate much of the smoke.

2. It's no raw deal. Meat that's "underdone, overdone or both can put a damper on your cookoit. Be sure to

make allowances for high humidity and cool air — both slow excking. You can tell what kind of temperature you're dealing with by this rule of thumb: Hold your hand at cooking level and briskly count -"One-thousand, two-thous-

and, etc." If you get up to "five-thousand" before the heat forces your hand away, the fire's not ready.

3. "Smart" grills make the biggest hit. If several seasons of wear and tear show on your grill, don't fret; all may not be lost. 


