A bit of glamour, a big beat, and expert musicians with a slick professionally, were the ingredients that greeted a packed house Saturday night for the Renfro Valley Barndance.

The ingredients were in the persons of singer Ray Price and the Cherokee Cowboys, along with singers Linda Flanagan and Ray Pennington all on hand to open a "new" phase of the Barndance.

There was little doubt the group was expert, and there was little doubt Hal Smith, Product, had wisely opened the first of what will become a long series of Saturday night "same" acts, with a group that is well known in the country Western music field. Singing such hits as "Together Again" and "Make the World Go Away" Price kept his audience spellbound from his opening to his closing act. The tempo and the applause was unmistakable. The audience had come to hear Ray Price and they certainly did not let him down. He added a treat when balladeer Billy Ed Wheeler, there to see the show, was applauded to the stage to sing "The Little Brown Shack Out West."

Locally, it was not so much that the group was so talented. Everyone hereabouts knew that. It was the fact that for the first time in the history of the Barndance John Lane had called to "big names" to headline the show.

To be sure, the Saturday night show was not the usual Renfro Valley Barndance in several respects. Besides the big names, there were costumes never before seen on the stage. There was even a set of drums. There was also an aura of "new" glamour. In the past, Mr. Lane has stayed closely to the term "old-fashioned." The costumes have been of days gone by. The songs have been rally, mountain ballads. The instruments have been confined very nearly to guitars, banjos, and fiddles. The aura of Barndance has been an aura of naturalness as grandpa and grandma knew it and, of course, loved it.

Ruling Made On Candidates

Three candidates who filed last week for the post of Rockcastle County Tax Commissioner cannot be candidates until the May primary, 1967, according to a ruling by Kentucky Attorney General Robert Matthews.

Filing Apr. 9 for the post were Grace Ann McCowan and David Henderson. Filing Apr. 7 was Clarence Carter.

The Rockcastle Tax Commissioner post is now held by Mrs. Clarence Carter under an appointment in February by County Judge Wayne Van Hook.

At the time of her appointment, she succeeded Homer Hale who resigned. Mrs. Carter was appointed under conditions set up by the State Department of Finance, to serve until December, 1967.

Atty. Gen. Matthews said in his ruling on Apr. 13 that "Since there is no regular election to be held in Rockcastle County in 1966 embracing the entire county, there can be no election this year to fill the vacancy in the Office of County Tax Commissioner until the 1967 general election for state-wide offices and whoever is elected at that time will be entitled to assume the office of Tax Commissioner immediately upon receiving his certificate of election and upon his qualification."

The Attorney General cited Section 152 of the Constitution as the authority on which he based the ruling.

He also pointed out that there are "school board races to be held at the November 1966 election, however, these elections do not embrace the entire county within the meaning of Section 152 of the Constitution."

Writer Lewis Enjoyed The Day

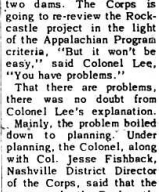

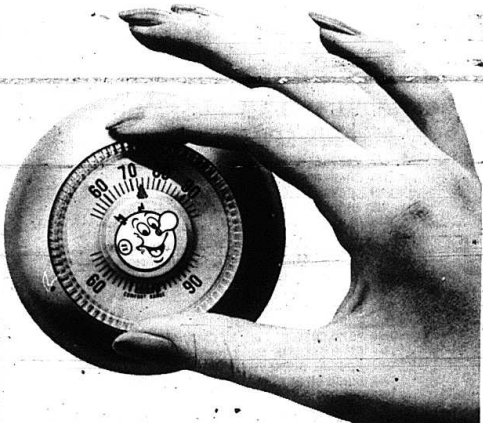
