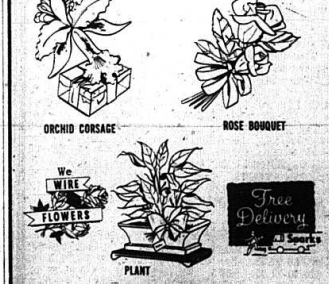

Kentucky's Delegation Votes 6 To 1 For Medicare

Washington, Kentucky's House delegation divided 6 to 1 on the Medicare vote yesterday, with only Rep. Tim Lee Carter of Tompkinsville against it.

Carter, the only Republican in the delegation, is a medical doctor. "I could not go against my profession," he said after the 318-to-115 vote for passage.

"I voted against the bill out of loyalty to my profession - the majority of whom are against this."

Carter, a liberal Republican, the John Sherman Cooper type, he said he was not entirely sorry he had passed because he believes it will help alleviate some of the medical problems of his Southeast Kentucky district.

The first vote was on recommitting the Medicare bill and substituting the Byrnes bill - the Republican bill which would be basically an extension of Kerr-Mills.

Voting with Carter to recommit were Reps. Stubbfield of Murray, William Natcher of Bowling Green, Frank Chelf of Lebanon and John Wats of Nicholasville.

Voting against recommitting were Reps. Charles P. Farnsley of Louisville and Carl Perkins of Hindman, both Democrats.

On final passage however, all the Democrats voted for the administration bill and Carter voted against it.

The Indiana delegation's voting was split along party lines.

On the first vote Republicans E. Ross Adair of Fort Wayne, Charles C. Bray of Ellettsville, Charles A. Hallack of Rensselaer, Ralph Harvey of New Castle and Richard G. Roubertus of Noblesville voted for the Byrnes bill.

Democrats John Brademas of South Bend, Winfield Denton of Evansville, Lee H. Hamilton of Columbus, James J. Jones of Indianapolis, Ray J. Madden of Gary and J. Edward Roush of Huntington voted against the bill.

On the final roll call all the Republicans voted against the administration bill, and all the Democrats for it.

Loxox, at two pounds an acre, gave 70 percent control of grass weeds and 85 percent of unwanted weeds when combined with Loxox at one pound of each, it got 80 percent control of grass weeds and 100 percent of unwanted weeds. Freeman noted, Loxox used alone at 1 1/2 pounds an acre gave 80 percent control of grass weeds and 98 percent of broadleaf weeds. However, Loxox is not a recommended material. Some farmers have reported stand injury from the material. A new material, Ramrod, at four pounds an acre, showed better control of grass than of broadleaf weeds. However, when combined with Loxox, it controlled 85 percent of the grass weeds and 90 percent of the broadleaf weeds. This mixture had one pound of Loxox and two pounds of Ramrod an acre. Some experimentalists, Freeman said, controlled 100 percent of the broadleaf weeds. Use of this 2, 4-D material at planting time gave 75 percent control of grass weeds and 70 percent of broadleaf weeds for four weeks, Freeman said.

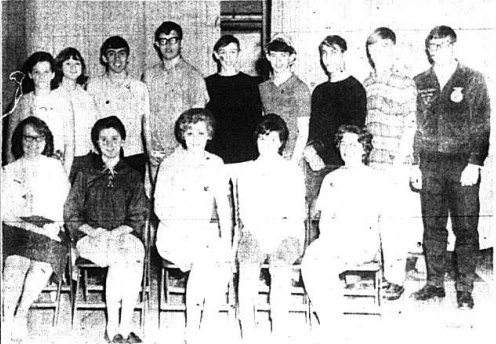
ALL IN THE FAMILY

Carter Sues To Get On Ballot

A suit was filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court last Thursday asking, among other things, that the office of Rockcastle Tax Commissioner be declared open in the May Primary election.

Filing the suit was Clarence Carter, Mt. Vernon merchant, and former Rockcastle County Clerk.

Defendants in the suit are Mr. Carter's wife, Tax Commissioner Louise Carter, County Clerk Clifford Bales, and Mrs. Grace Ann McCowan, who filed along with Mr. Carter as a candidate for Tax Commissioner post.

On Apr. 7, Mr. Carter filed for the office on the Republican ticket, followed on Apr. 9 by Mrs. McCowan, David Henderson also filed on Apr. 9 as a candidate on the Democratic ticket.

Later, Atty. Gen. Robert Matthews ruled that since there is no county election this year, the Office of Tax Commissioner should remain with Mrs. Louise Carter until the November 1967 election, or the May 1967 primary, whichever the other candidates could file.

In his suit, Mr. Carter states that more than three years ago, Mrs. McCowan was elected to the office by voters at the occurrence of the vacancy and the next succeeding annual election, and that the vacancy occurred more than 70 days prior to the May 24, 1966 primary election, thereby causing the office to be vacant and open for election in the May 1966 primary.

He also states that the Office of Tax Commissioner is a state office, not a county office, and that state offices are to be held this year in Rockcastle county, including a school board election, which is considered a state office.

The plaintiff also points out that he holds a certificate issued by the Department of Revenue following an examination, and that it is valid until the 1966 election.

"The plaintiff is qualified to hold office and on Apr. 7 to get on the ballot as a Republican candidate. Plaintiff possesses all qualifications for nomination and election," he says.

Mr. Carter's complaint states that Grace A. McCowan, who also filed as a candidate in the Republican primary May 24, does not possess the qualifications because she was a registered member of the Democratic Party.

He noted that two Republican candidates have filed (Carter and McCowan), and since "Grace A. McCowan" is not qualified, then the plaintiff is the only candidate so qualified.

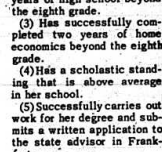
He says in his suit that he then demanded that the defendant, Clifford Bales, immediately issue and file a certificate of nomination showing plaintiff as a Republican candidate, and he (Bales) has "wrongfully refused to issue said certificate of nomination even though the plaintiff is legally entitled."

Mr. Carter then asked Circuit Court to declare:

(1) The Office of Tax Commissioner be declared open for the first semester.

State Opens Highway Bids

The State Highway Department Friday began a study of more than \$12,000,000 in road bids for improvement of roads and bridges in Kentucky, including three projects in Rockcastle.

R. C. Durr of Independence, and Greer Brother and Young, London, were apparent low bidders on grade and drain work on 3.166 miles of Interstate-75 from the south end of the US 25 interchange at Renfro Valley.

The bid on the stretch totaled \$4,990,670.57.

It was reported this week that a stretch of Interstate-75 between Renfro Valley interchange and Green Hill interchange and Wald-Jones Creek Road was to be bid until July, thereby extending the time for a decision to be made on the Renfro Valley Dam. To date, the federal government has not approved a grant for the \$1,185,000 water project.

Three bids were awarded in Rockcastle County during the bid opening session.

Apparent low bidder on 2.4 miles of bituminous surfacing of Brush Creek Road, and 3.215 miles of Wald-Jones Creek Road was Cantrell Construction Co., of Lexington at a bid of \$72,342.35.

Baker Named Hospital Boss

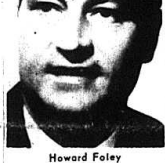
Charles T. Baker of Mt. Vernon has been named administrator of the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital by the Board of Directors.

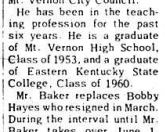
