Report Greenspan Program Here

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, has invited representatives to investigate the opportunity afforded by a new "Greenspan" operation of the Cropland Adjustment Program. Under the program farmland can be acquired for use as open space and parks. Descriptive material about the CAP is being sent to Governors and to county and city governing bodies.

Grants are available to cities, counties, and state governments to increase the amount of cropland to certain noncrop uses. The authorized uses are preservation of open spaces, natural beauty, and development of wildlife and recreational facilities, and the prevention of air and water pollution.

The program can apply to eligible cropland acquired by a state or local government after Jan. 28, 1966. Shellie Mullins, Rockcastle chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, is in charge of administration of the program in the county, explains that primarily the CAP is intended to encourage farmers and farm owners to take cropland out of production under agreements of five to 10 years duration.

Farmers who divert the entire allotment or base acreage of one crop may also retire additional cropland of the farm under the CAP agreement.

The "Greenspan" phase of the program provides authority for grants to local and state agencies, both for the acquisition of land and for conservation work on the land. Grants to those agencies may not exceed the funds that could have been paid to farmers on the same land through Cropland

Adjustment Program, no more than 50 percent of the cost of the land.

Sign up under the program is now under way at the ASCS office. The final date a request for agreement may be signed is May 13.

And on the cross, when loved ones were standing by weeping their hearts out, he wept with them. But most of all, he wept because of a lost world which was rejecting that he was doing for them and going to a Devil's hell when there was no need of it if they would only accept him as their Saviour and the thousands of others who would do the same thing they were doing.

He wept so much then that the eyes could not shed all the tears so they gathered around his heart and were later released by a soldier's spear.

How about you, are you causing him to weep because you are rejecting him? Then accept him now and save his tears now and yourself tears later.

We are living in a world of tears. We are crying over our wiped away, you must sign up and get your name on the book while there is room (Rev. 20:15).

Withdraw Accounts From Post Office

Postmaster James O. Smith today urged depositors with postal savings certificates to withdraw their accounts from Post Offices as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by Pres.

Lyndon B. Johnson. Postmaster Smith pointed out that as of April 30, 1966, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. He said that interest will end on the anniversary date of each certifi cate.

The Postmaster said that the "stand counts" held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

The Postmaster said that unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, would be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund which would be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

TAX INSPECTION HERF ON MAY 16

Governor Edward F. Breathitt advises those taxpayers who do not list their property with the county tax commissioner during January and February to check on their own property tax assessments during the upcoming inspection period.

The inspection will be in the county tax commissioner's office in Mt. Vernon on May 16 through May 20.

Assessments will be higher, Breathitt said, "but because of a law we passed last October, the tax rates will be lower."

According to Breathitt, "Now is the time to check on your assessment, not after tax rates are set and your tax bills are made out. By then it will be too late. I am asking you to do this so that the transition to fair valuation will not work a burden on any individual taxpayer."

The new law directs that local authorities cannot use the new assessment to increase total tax collections above what they were in 1965.

Breathitt said "If you have been paying extra taxes because someone else was under-assessed, your taxes will not be lower. The property owner who has been under-assessed compared to his neighbors will now pay his fair share. You can check your assessment and compare it with others. It should be no more than fair cash value on today's market."

Funds For Recreation Areas

Kentucky has been declared eligible for matching Federal grants to acquire and develop State and local outdoor recreation areas.

State Finance Commissioner Felix Joyner in announcing the grants, said that to qualify, a state is required to develop a statewide outdoor recreation plan and planning program and submit it to the Interior Department's Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. Kentucky's plan was found adequate for initial qualifications for the 25-year program.

Joyner said Kentucky's share of the fund for fiscal years 1965 and 1966 is \$1,337,232. Kentucky's initial period of eligibility lasts until May 10, 1967, according to Joyner, who administers this cooperative Federal-State program in Kentucky.

He said Kentucky's plan calls for initial emphasis on State Park planning, acquisition and development. It also emphasizes a State program for protecting free-flowing rivers and scenic streams, and recommending scenic highways.

State outdoor recreation plans evaluate supply, demand and need for areas and facilities for significant outdoor recreation activities.

Corn Disease Check Should Be Made

University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Serpentine pathologists are starting a campaign against maize dwarf mosaic (MDM), a particular county.

Dr. Donald Poole, plant pathologist, says one operation underway is to determine if the MDM is in a particular county.

He is using special test plantings which his department will monitor during the season. The test plantings will be made by local farmers under supervision of county agents.

MDM was identified in a number of Kentucky counties the last two years. It is a destructive disease of corn. It had not been reported in the state previously.
