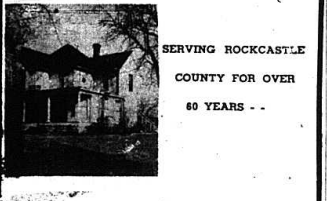

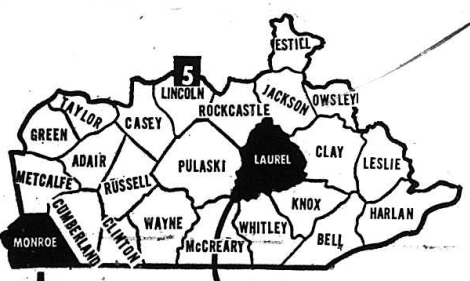

The distance from the junction of KY 80 and KY 461 directly to Mt. Vernon on KY 461 is 19 miles.

Another problem that confronted Spindletop was the fact that the cost of construction of the two routes was two or three times as much as by KY 80 to London, including the construction of a high bridge over the Rockcastle River.

How Spindletop arrived at a favorable report via KY 80, probably will never be known.

Said one Rockcastle resident: "I think they ought to change the name of Spindletop to Spindletop."

Since the road was first proposed, residents in counties through which the new road passes all prefer the shorter route to Mt. Vernon.

The Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce proposed through a resolution earlier this year, that the new road follow KY 80 to its junction with KY 461 just west of Shoville, and then up KY 461 through Valley Oak, Plato, and Elrod to Mt. Vernon and I-75.

Most clubs and organizations in Rockcastle County have also sent resolutions to the Appalachian Regional Commission and the Highway Department approving the KY 461 route.

Commissioner Ward said the department's final report was filed with the commission three or four weeks ago.

"I have no way of knowing when that crowd will reach a decision," he said. "They have taken months on two

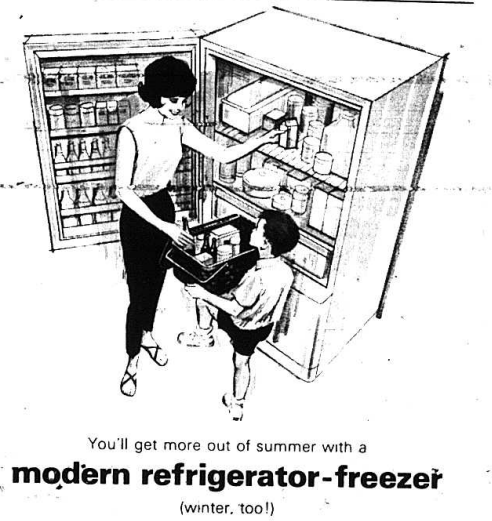

John 13:2-17

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, AUTHORIZING THE FINANCING OF A WATER PROJECT FOR THE CITY OF MT. VERNON AND THE SURROUNDING AREA, CONSISTING OF A 470-ACRE WATER RESERVOIR, TREATMENT PLANT, WATER STORAGE TANKS AND ADDITIONS TO THE EXISTING WATER DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM OF THE CITY.

WHEREAS, it has been determined to be advisable and in the best interests of the City of Mt. Vernon that it proceed with the financing of a water project for said City and the surrounding area, in accordance with preliminary plans of the City Engineers, Crawford & Crawford, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1. That it does hereby authorize and approve a proposed water project for said City and the surrounding area, consisting of a 470-acre water reservoir, water treatment plant, water storage tanks and additions to the existing water distribution system, to be financed by a Federal grant in the amount of approximately \$710,000, and by revenue bonds in the amount of approximately \$470,000.

2. That the actions heretofore taken by the Mayor and other City officials of the City in filling an application on behalf of the City for a proposed Federal grant in the amount of approximately \$710,000, and for a proposed Federal loan in the amount of approximately \$470,000, be and the same are hereby authorized, approved, ratified and confirmed.

3. That the Mayor, the City Attorney and all other authorized officials of the City be, and they are, hereby authorized and empowered to proceed to take the necessary action to acquire the appropriate sites, rights-of-way and easements, as may be necessary and as may be required in order to enable the City to proceed with said project and to obtain said Federal grant as provided by law.

4. That this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.
