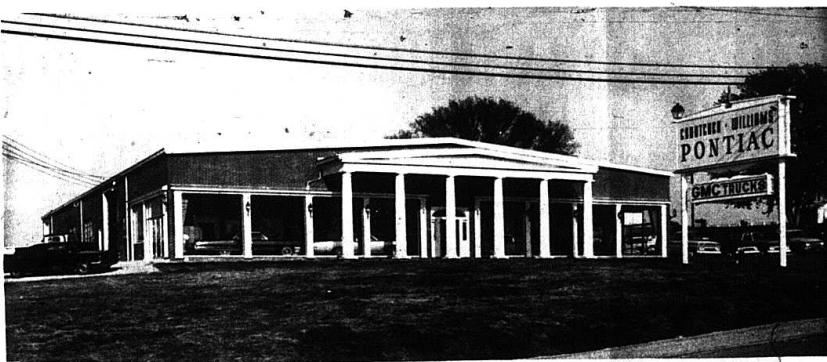

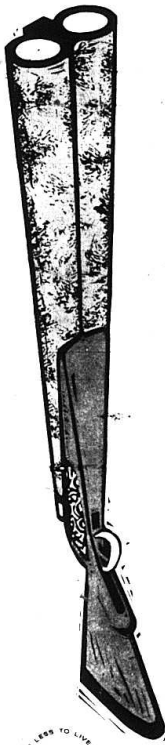

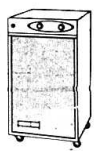

Appalachian Commission will take it into consideration. But remember, Norris' land is also part of the Appalachian area and is also in need of upgrading."
He also pointed out that the State has worked diligently and longed to help Mt. Vernon get a lake at Renfro Valley. The lake along with the Renfro Valley Barrandance and two interchanges at Mt. Vernon, should make Renfro Valley an surrounding area again. The State Highway undoubtedly recognizes this fact and is working diligently on that area with the extension of highways through Mt. Vernon. Of course, some businesses will be affected, but others will benefit. "I would say," he continued, "the decision on the connector road has definitely been made. It will be made until mid-June or until the commission meets. I do not believe the commission got into mid-June. What they finally decide is anybody's guess."

Peach, Cherry Or. Control Measures: Brown rot disease will attack peaches, cherries, and plums just as the fruit is getting ripe, says Dr. E. M. Johnson, University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station plant pathologist.
The disease can wreck a home dooryard fruit crop. Control: Proper pruning helps. It allows air circulation and more rapid drying of foliage in rainy times, plus reducing chances of twig punctures. Mummified fruit should be removed from trees and those on ground should be picked up or covered with soil.
For the home orchard use wettable sulfur at three tablespoons per gallon of water (a) when blossoms are opening, (b) at "shuck" fall, (c) two weeks after this shuck fall, (d) in mid-July, and (e) then two to three weeks later. If rot is bad, spray more often.
The publication "No. 521B, "Sprays for Home Fruit Plantings," or Circular 544B, "Spray schedules for commercial Fruit Plantings" gives full details. It describes appearance of the brown rot, how it attacks the fruit, gives spray materials, mixing directions and application information.
Pastures Need A Top Dressing: Most pasture fields in Kentucky need an annual top-dressing of phosphorus and potash, says George D. Cordes, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service specialist.
Spring is a good time, he says, especially if such fields did not get fertilization last fall.
The recommended application is about 30 pounds of phosphate (P2O5) and 60 pounds of potash (K2O) per acre.
If pastures have 25 percent or more legume content, nitrogen applications are not needed. If there is less legume than this, about 30 pounds of nitrogen per acre in the spring and again in the fall will pay dividends.
Considerable nitrogen may be lost to the air when fertilizers containing urea are top-dressed on hay and pasture fields, he says. Hence, other forms of nitrogen fertilizers should be used.

## Week-Long Drilling Ends With Dry Hole

It was another of those little experiences that help add up to a lifetime. That is about all the Burgess Abney family could claim this week after the big rotary drill stopped spinning 2,750 feet under their farm at Red Hill.

There was oil under their land, said the geologist for the Ken-Ark Oil Co., of Worthington, Ohio after he had taken pictures of the bottom of the hole.

But to get to the oil would mean going at least 5,000 feet and there was no contract for that depth, no equipment, and perhaps, no desire by the company to go that far into the earth at this particular place.

So Howard Atha of Worthington, owner of the biggest rotary drilling rig ever in Rockcastle County, began pecking up to take the drill to Wolfe County for another try on another farm.

Gathered on the porch on the former Uncle Dick Morris farm deep in a hollow, the Abneys and their friends and relatives waited and watched hopefully day by day as the clatter of the big drill and yell of workmen filled the quiet spring air.

For the Abneys, the moments became like years as the drill went 500 feet, then 1,000 feet, then 2,500 feet, then headed for 3,000 feet. The excitement increased inch by inch and second by second.

Then came the ominous silence as the geologist lowered his camera. Obviously there was no oil at that level.

With the proper equipment, and another contract, they could assure them of oil at around 5,000 feet. So, under the circumstances, and rather than waste time going beyond 2,750 feet, best the operation cease.

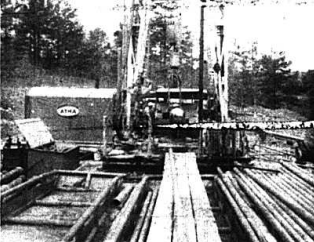
"We were hopeful right up to the last turn of the drill," Mrs. Abney said. "Of course we're disappointed, but it was quite an experience and we were prepared for it."

No doubt the Abneys, like other persons in Rockcastle County who have gone through the oil stage of their lives, thought as the days wore on, they would be able to follow along enough to reach China. It's always that way, the oil men say. Because at the bottom of the hole could lie the end of the rainbow, and the hopes and dreams of a lifetime.

It surely meant this for the Abneys, but they took the announcement of the dry hole

with a smile and a shrug. "We couldn't do otherwise but take it lightly. Everyone who has gone through this kind of thing has to be ready for the bad news as well as the good news," Mrs. Abney said. And they were ready.

Next day, it was back to tobacco and the garden once again. "Would it rain? Water became more important than oil. Would the weather turn cold? Although it's doubtful the Abneys will ever have another oil derrick on their farm, their lives have been made more varied and richer by their seemingly unpleasant week than their lives would have been if the big drill had never come to the hollow at Red Hill.

Those expected to win in Tuesday's primary election did exactly that. Sen. John Sherman Cooper, Rep. Tim Lee Carter, and Atty. John Y. Brown all scored relatively easy victories in an election that saw a record number of voters staying away from the polls.

In the Fifth District Representative race, with almost all precincts reporting, Rep. Tim Lee Carter was leading his opponent Gene Hoff, 1,120 to 9,423. In the Republican Senatorial race, Sen. Cooper handily defeated his opponent, with 2,669 precincts out of 3,039 reporting, Cooper had 62,573. Sam Ward 2,545, and Thurman Hamblin 1,120 to 9,423.

In the Democratic Senatorial race, with 2,656 precincts out of 3,039 reporting, Rep. Tim Lee Carter was leading over three other opponents. Brown had 67,571; Gaines Wilson, 12,217; Demarcus, 1,493, and Jesse Cecil 4,611.

In Rockcastle County, the only race was between Rep. Tim Lee Carter and Gene Hoff. Carter managed to carry Rockcastle by 58 votes. Carter got 505 votes and Huff 447. In the Democratic race, Carter and Huff broke even, each carrying seven precincts. Huff carried 17,130 to 9,423. Wilson, East Livingston, West Livingston, Bullock, and North Brothead, and North Brothead, West Mt. 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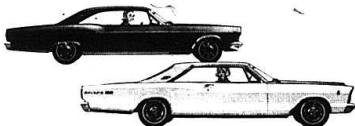

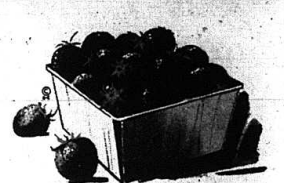

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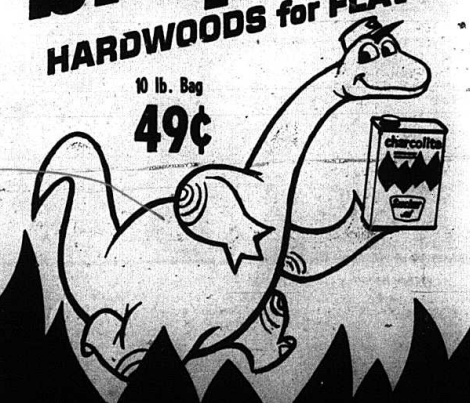

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO THE PRESENT CITY BOUNDARY.

As an incentive to the physician who wishes to start practice in critical counties in the state, the Fund lends \$2,000, repayable at the rate of \$500 a year. For each year of practice in a critical county, \$500 of the loan will be waived, Dr. Howard said.

### Don't Disk Corn If May Recover

Don't disk up your corn fields because above-ground portions of new plants show frost damage, says S.H. Phillips, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service agronomist. "The important parts of the corn plant are under the surface of the ground at this time of year," he says, "and these probably were not injured by the recent unexpected freeze. However, a few farmers are disked up their corn and replanting. This is probably not necessary." Phillips said many corn plants showed blackened parts and leaves from the cold, but said this probably will not be a problem since such frost-damaged corn will recover eventually. He said it is better to let the existing plants recover than to replant. "Replanting costs the farmer money. Also later plantings have reduced yields. Disking and replanting probably will cost the farmer more than letting frost-damaged corn recover." There was frost damage throughout the state but last week's extremely low temperatures—a record low for May in many areas—did the most in the eastern part of the state. Much corn was already growing well when the freeze hit.
