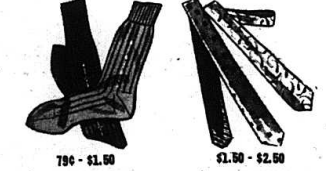

WITHERED
John 15:6

Jesus said unless we abide in him we will wither like a branch that has been cut off from the body which is the source of life. Now we all know what happens to a branch when it is cut off from the body.

We hear someone say, I can live as good a life out of the church as I can in it. But Jesus says you can not. He says you will wither and become unfruitful. Who ever saw a person, who was not connected with the church, winning souls to Jesus? None.

You say the church is not Jesus, but the Bible says different, (Eph. 1:22 and 23). The church is the representative of Christ here on the earth. It is carrying on the work Jesus started (John 15:8). Jesus says in substance that out of church you are unfruitful, verse 15, which puts one on a very dangerous ground, (Matt. 21:19 and Luke 13:6,7).

It is often said that many church members are like wasps. They are much larger when first born than later, because they wither up a lot. Some are like wasps in another way they have sting and like to use them. We have many church members today who are withering up very fast. Some have already withered so much that they cannot be found. They have blown away to parts unknown.

How said some are sickly and some sleepers. Now how does the branch become separated from the body? There are at least three ways. First, by a little unnoticed worm—we will call it sin. It gnaws its way into the branch and causes it to weaken and fall off. Small sins that we may think don't amount to much can soon destroy one. (Songs of Solomon 2:15)—so they wither.

Second: Storms will call troubles blow and shake for awhile and they break off, quit the church, or say they don't want to get involved. They are like soldiers who like to hide out until the fighting is over. They are poor soldiers. How would we ever win the wars, if soldiers were like some of these church members?—and so they wither.

Third: The husbandman cuts off every branch that does not bear fruit, (John 15:2). Luke 13:7, Then he said unto the dresser, this fig tree, and this fig tree—years, I come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and find none; cut it down. Are you, as a church member, bearing any fruit for the master? If not you are in great danger. Heb. 10:25, 26. Roy Dean, Clover Bottom, Ky.

Nationally, the sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds were \$426 million for the month. The cash value of both series outstanding reached \$49,483 million for a gain of \$236 million since the first of January.

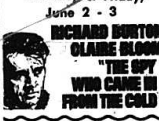

The grant will pay for a staff of 30 professional workers and 16 non-professional workers who will develop programs including education and job training programs for residents of the counties who are seeking to make themselves job-ready. File 5 Suits For Land

Five condemnation suits involving land needed for the proposed Renfro Valley Lake have been filed in Rockcastle County Court by the City of Mt. Vernon.

The suits involve actual land to be covered by water and easements for land needed in case of flooding. The suits were the first filed as a prelude to the construction of a dam and lake at Renfro Valley. The suits were filed against Monroe Purcell, Jones Hiatt, Christine Girt, Esther Griffin, and a joint suit against Mitchell Abney and Cleveon Abney. The defendants live, or heirs to the property live, out of state. To date the federal government has not approved a grant and loan to the city for the lake. However, officials believe the money will be made available shortly, or before the suits are called for trial.

Playground

The Mt. Vernon summer Recreation Program opens June 6 at the Mt. Vernon High School playground.

Paul Thomason, playground director, asks that team captains and alternates to come to the playground Monday night, June 6 in order to draw up and distribute schedules. Assistant directors are Billy George Griffith and David Nicely.

Head Start

Project Head Start, a child development program for pre-school children from low income families, will be getting underway soon.

There will be five centers this year including Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Roundstone, Livingston and Maple Grove. A total of 16 classes are planned. Classes are scheduled to begin Wednesday, June 15, at 9 a.m. Children will be dismissed at 1:45 p.m. each day. The program will run for eight weeks.

Transportation has been set up to reach each child except those in town. The head start program will provide in addition to very helpful training, free lunches, milk, snacks, insurance, health services, social services, and all classroom supplies needed by the child.

An effort will be made to discover and correct in so far as possible any physical defect or abnormality that might hinder the child's progress in school.

The school officials hope parents of all eligible children will take advantage of the opportunity to give their child a head start in first grade so that they can compete with fellow classmates.

Parents should recall the comments made earlier by first grade teachers concerning the progress that head start children had made in first grade. First grade teachers as a whole are very complimentary of the head start program.

Parents are urged to enroll their child on June 15, even though they might not have registered the child.

PRICE NEARLY QUARTER-MILLION

Seven Arts motion picture and television production company and film distributor of Hollywood, has purchased the movie "The Renfro Valley Bardance" from JamArt Pictures and John Lair for national and international distribution.

The movie's price was near a quarter-million dollars. The company set the world premiere tentatively for July 20 in Louisville with the Renfro Valley folks appearing in person.

Gov. Edward Breathitt is expected to open the premiere program. The theatre in which the movie will play is yet to be decided, but it will be a downtown movie house.

A week later it will open at the Preston Drive-In Theatre along with two other movie houses in the Louisville area. The company said it would play at Mt. Vernon at an early date, but would not speculate. As noted, all plans are tentative.

The announcement of the sale followed weeks of condensed early dates, but was finally consummated last week in New York.

Both Seven Arts and United Artists bid on the film, with Seven Arts getting the final nod. United Artists, however, will use its world-wide facilities to help distribute the movie.

The announcement that Seven Arts, a company in which Frank Sinatra reportedly has a big voice, was the biggest boom for Renfro Valley to date in that both distributors reach into the far corners of the world and would give Renfro Valley an international reputation.

The company said it hoped, depending on the success of the movie, to run it as a movie for three years, in television for two years, and send it to Europe, especially Germany, where country music is enjoying widespread popularity.

Seven Arts officials were so impressed with the movie they said they did not plan to make changes. They noted, if the movie is successful, they would be willing to make a second movie at Renfro Valley.

It was also announced that John Lair would keep the rights to the sound track of the movie. Sound tracks from movies are usually made into record albums for sale.

The Renfro movie was shot last summer in the big barn and surrounding area. All the Renfro folks, plus a few guests, appeared in the film.

The movie was made by JamArt Pictures, with Arthur Stannish and James Sullivan of Louisville, principal stockholders. John Lair also has a financial interest.

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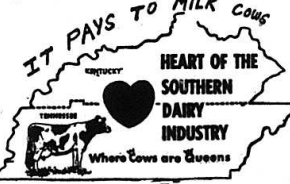

producers and consumers alike - providing better comes for farmers and balanced abundance for consumers."

Breathitt predicted that even greater accomplishments in agriculture and dairying are expected in the future.

"Kentucky farmers are right now making a special effort to accelerate progress in agriculture to participate in the national prosperity and all other benefits to be realized from a sound and prosperous farming and dairy industry," Breathitt said.

Quoting US Department of Agriculture statistics, Breathitt said that the productive capacity of our farms is one of the economic wonders of

the 20th Century. He said that despite large acreage and commodity diversions, the total output of US farms increased by almost 10 percent over the past five years.

"Because food is a bargain," the Governor said, "American consumers have over eight billion dollars more to spend on other things than was the case in 1960."

Breathitt urged all Kentuckians to reflect on and recognize the importance of agriculture to our economic, social, cultural and spiritual well-being.

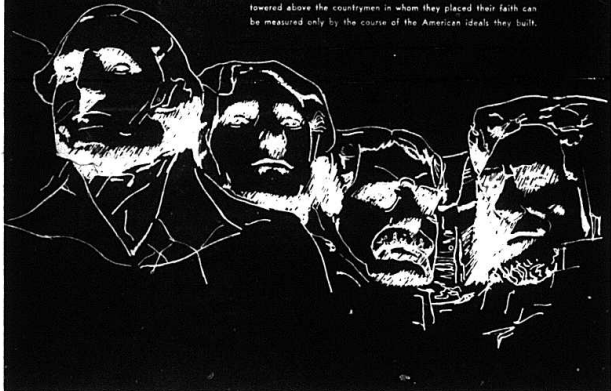

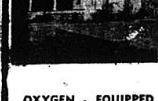
