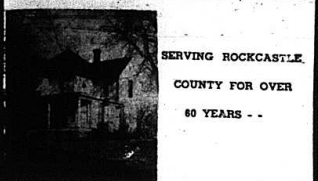

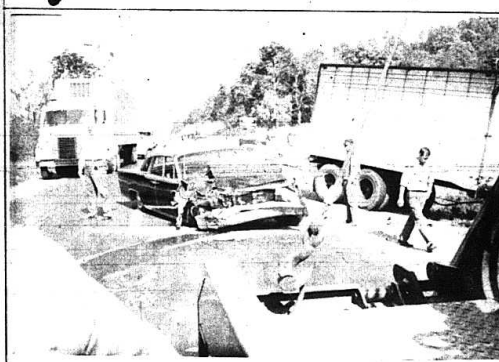

Ward Says Road Routing, Ky 461 Plans Not Decided

Highway Commissioner Henry Ward said this week he did not recall indicating he would "substantially upgrade" KY 461 between Mt. Vernon and Somerset as a north-south access road to the corridor for a new Cincinnati to Chattanooga highway, should the access road be routed from Somerset to London.

Commissioner Ward was commenting on a letter sent the Signal last week by John C. Sweeney, federal co-chairman of the Appalachian Regional Commission in Washington.

In his letter Mr. Sweeney said: "The State of Kentucky has submitted to the commission a request for designation of the Somerset-London route as a part of the Appalachian Development Highway Corridor. The state has categorically indicated to the commission that the highway between Somerset and Mt. Vernon is to be substantially upgraded to provide north-south access to the corridor."

As you know, the states have the primary responsibility for determining the location of development corridors subject to review of the commission of their implications for the region. It appears that the state is legitimately the concern of the State of Kentucky and I would suggest that you direct to the governor."

The Signal checked with Mr. Ward on prints raised by the sentence indicating the state would substantially upgrade KY 461.

Commissioner Ward said he does not know what Mr. Sweeney means by the statement. He said he could not remember that he had indicated the upgrading.

"I think," Mr. Ward said, "that time and increased traffic will demand that KY 461 be substantially improved, but at this time we are interested in getting a decision on the 72 corridor from the commission before all the Appalachian money is gone."

He said he did not read into Mr. Sweeney's letter that the final word had been said on the route.

"Of course you know I have not been informed that (in actual fact) the state has the power to do what it wants with the route. At this point, I only wish they would make up their mind one way or the other."

He went on to say that the commission could establish an east-west route along KY 80, and also establish a north-south route along KY 461, and ask that KY 461 be substantially upgraded.

If possible, all children will be accepted. However, the enrollment contains over 10 percent of children from high income families, then some children from high income families will by necessity have to be refused.

The Head Start Program is a child development program for children from low income families.

6 Rabies Clinics Scheduled

A series of rabies clinics, under the direction of the Rockcastle County Health Department and Dr. Rudolph Burdette, veterinarian, have been scheduled in Rockcastle during June.

Dr. Virginia Wallace, county health doctor, urges all pet owners to have their dogs and cats vaccinated against rabies. Rabies, once developed is always fatal in both man and animals. It is a constant danger because the virus is frequently transmitted by wild and stray animals, she said.

Last year, there were 104 confirmed cases of animal rabies in Kentucky. Foxes were the leading victims with 42 cases confirmed. Dogs were second with 28 cases, and cats, third with 15.

If you hear of rabies in your community, keep your pet in a secure place, she said.

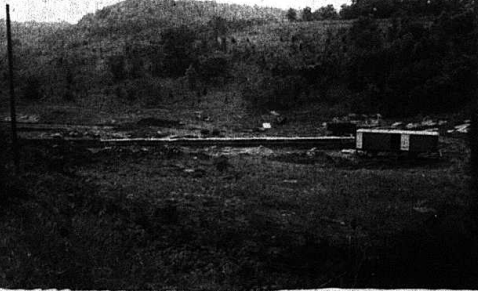

An Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 282

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO THE PRESENT CITY BOUNDARY.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

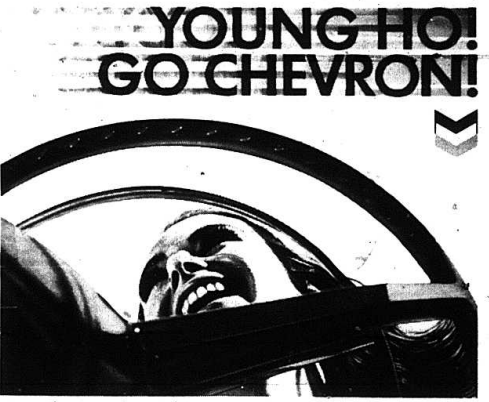

Beginning at an iron pin in fence, corner to lot of Jack St. Clair in line of School street; thence northerly 150 feet with St. Clair to St. Clair's corner in Walkie Bollinger's line; thence westerly 33 feet to Williams Street Extended; thence northerly 109 feet with Bollinger to an iron stake in right of way of Williams Street Extended, Bollinger's corner; thence easterly with Bollinger, 119 feet to iron stake, corner to Bollinger in Roy Cummins' 'Heav' line; thence N 30 degrees 30 minutes E 180 feet more or less to a cherry tree on Estill Bullock's line; thence N 53 W 860 feet more or less to western right of way of proposed street; thence southerly with western right of way of proposed street approximately 220 feet to northeastern corner of Lot No. 21; thence westerly 120 feet to northwestern corner of Lot No. 21; thence southerly 112 feet to northern right of way of Greenway Drive; thence westerly with north right of way of Greenway Drive to line of Hysinger, thirty feet north of Bill Bailey's northwest corner; thence S 6 E 335 feet to a stone near fence corner, corner of Bill Bailey; thence S 62 E 604 feet to an iron pin, corner of Bailey; thence S 62 W approximately 150 feet to a stone in fence corner, corner to Hammond; thence N 30 E 121 feet to fence corner; thence S 59 degrees 30 minutes E 416 feet to a

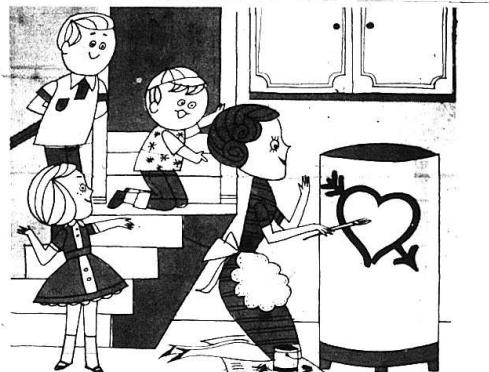

Vernon who are near the present route to KY 461, felt that upgrading the highway and keeping it through Mt. Vernon would be more beneficial than a new access route west of town, granted

signs were placed on the Interstate at Renfro Valley and Burr indicating that Lake Cumberland, Chattanooga, Mt. Vernon, Somerset and Renfro Valley were "next exit."

Commissioner Ward said a decision on signs would have to be made at a later date, but said he felt adequate signs could be placed along the Interstate. "Let's talk about signs after we find out what is going to happen on the new access route." Mr. Ward noted he was always willing to do everything possible to increase tourist traffic to Lake Cumberland and Renfro Valley, and other points of interest in Kentucky. "Any signs we consider helpful to tourists, including those indicating short distances to our recreation areas, is always of interest to the Highway Department and are usually erected. But it is just too early to talk about signs on I-75 and the other highway."
