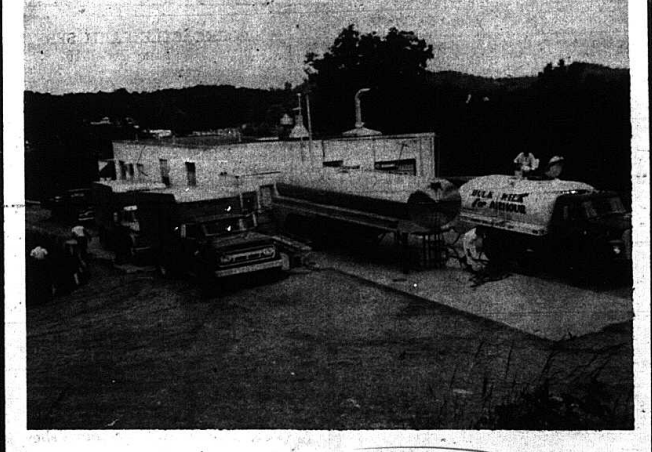

Rural Consolidation Ending



Consolidation of all one-room schools in Rockcastle County into five rural school centers has been approved by the Rockcastle County Board of Education.
The second phase of the rural consolidation will take place at the beginning of the fall term, according to Clyde Linville, assistant superintendent.
The first phase of the program was completed during the past term of school. At that time, Buffalo, Gum Springs, and Whitaker were consolidated into a two-room school at Blue Springs.
Sowder School was consolidated with Sand Springs School to form a two-room school at Blue Springs.
Orlando and Maple Grove Schools were consolidated into a four-room school at the school at Orlando burned.
The second phase of the school consolidation will involve two schools.
Well Hope will be consolidated in the two-room New Chestnut Ridge School. The Hill and Cave Ridge children will go to Livingstone.
Poplar Gap, Owen Allen, Johnetta, and Cove, students will go to the four-room Climax School.
The new line-up has been approved by the two school terms. If it is successful, the plan will be extended and enlarged, Mr. Linville said.
On the asset side of the consolidation, Mr. Linville said there are fewer grades to the room. A remedial reading program will be taught at each school. All centers will have a regular lunchroom, music service, library service. There will be fluorescent lighting and running water.
Gone will be the pot-bellied stove, replaced by fuel oil, Mr. Linville reported.

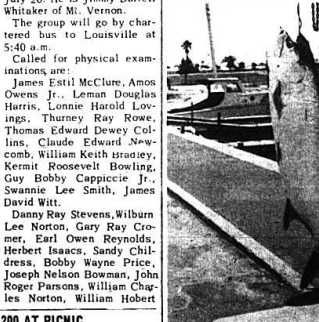

So the officers get the idea this man is a dangerous man, and they prepare for him—so they think. They get their lanterns and weapons, determined to take no chances that he escape them.

The disciples have two swords that night also. When the officers come with so many weapons, Peter draws his sword and strikes at a man with the sword. Peter hits and cuts the man's ear off. The other disciples, seeing so many weapons, run off. But Jesus had the greatest weapon of all (The Word). He also said it there that night, verse 6, and they all fall to the ground. And he could have used it again and not one of these men could ever have gotten up again.

We have in the world today many dangerous weapons, powerful weapons that could destroy the whole world in a few minutes of time. But the most powerful weapon of all is the word of God. It can save or destroy the world in less time than it takes to tell it. And he will use it someday to destroy all people off the face of the earth that have and are rejecting him. In Rev. 19:11 through 21 we find the Word will strike dead in a moment of time every living human being on the face of earth. We also read in the Book of the Law war called the Battle of Armageddon when God will rain a hail storm on his enemies the hail stones weighing 100 pounds each.

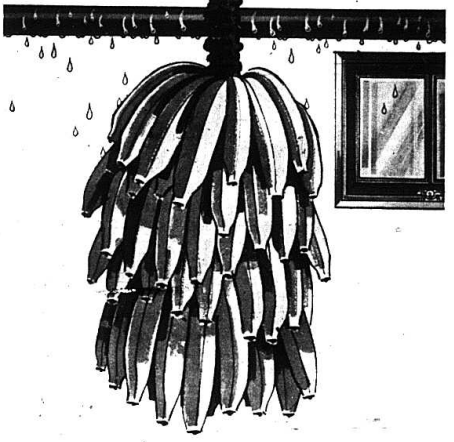
